MALDONADO, JOHNSON ADVANCE AT KIA PBA PLAYOFFS

LAKE WALES, Florida - With the top overall seed Jason Belmonte already knocked out of the 2022 Kia PBA Playoffs, No. 2 Anthony Simonsen took to the lanes inside the Kegel Training Center against No. 15 Maldonado.

Simonsen had a three-pin advantage through three frames in game one but then in the fourth frame Maldonado experienced a medical scare after delivering his first shot.

“Right as I was about to release it something locked

up on my right lower back, which is why it didn’t hook at all,” Maldonado said about leaving the 1-2-4. “My mobility was limited. I felt like if I did move, I had to go slow.”

The two-hander had felt

SVENSSON, JONES MOVE FORWARD AT KIA PBA PLAYOFFS

LAKE WALES, Florida - Another top-seeded player falls in the first round of the 2022 Kia PBA Playoffs.

Two powerful players seeking to advance into the quarterfinals were No. 3 EJ Tackett against No. Jesper Svensson.

This match was filled with new bowling pins being demolished inside the Kegel Training Center. Svensson never missed the pocket throwing nine strikes in the opening showdown against Tackett’s eight strikes, as the

lefty earned the 258-223 win.

“The way the pins fall in this place helped me out that first game on some of my off hits,” Svensson said about his pin reaction in game one.

PBA50 TOUR COVERAGE MOVES TO BOWLTV FOR 2022 SEASON

ARLINGTON, Texas - The Professional Bowlers Association and United States Bowling Congress have agreed on terms to offer exclusive livestreaming coverage of the 2022 PBA50 Tour season on BowlTV.

The agreement will include coverage of every PBA50 event of the season, starting with the PBA50 Lightning Strikes Lanes Open, which gets underway Tuesday, April 19, and concluding at the PBA60 Tristan's T.A.P.S. Memorial on Aug. 22.

"We're glad PBA50 Tour fans will be able to watch live coverage of the full 2022 season on BowlTV. The action and level of competition on the PBA50 Tour is compelling and features some of the greatest players of all time." PBA Tour Commissioner Tom Clark said.

The 17-event schedule will include over 500 hours of livestream coverage on BowlTV, starting with the qualifying rounds and concluding with the stepladder finals for each event.

BowlTV offers monthly subscriptions for \$9.95 and an annual subscription for \$79.95, plus transaction fees. Current subscribers will receive the PBA50 coverage at no additional cost. Event tickets also will be available for each PBA50 event on BowlTV for \$12.95, plus transaction fees.

Coverage will include multiple channels at each event, so fans can follow their favorite PBA50 competitors. The broadcasts also will include professional commentary, interviews and analysis featuring top bowling experts.

The Greatest Bowler Of All Time

A recent article in *Bowlers Journal International* ("Completed It, Mate," by George Wooten) got me wondering about that age old question... who really is the greatest bowler of all time? What caught my eye was a chart near the end of the column that bestowed the elite eight — those that have completed the Triple Crown in bowling.

But what may be even more interesting to ponder are the famous players that are NOT on the list. Five of the most famous bowlers of all time are not included. There's no Dick Weber or Don Carter from the golden age of bowling (the 1950's and 1960's), and there's no Walter Ray Williams Jr., Mark Roth or Earl Anthony from more contemporary years (1970's to the present).

The Triple Crown is made up of the PBA Tournament of Champions, the U.S. Open and the PBA National (now known as the World Championship). Billy Hardwick was the first to complete the trifecta in 1969, and he remained the only bowler to accomplish the feat for more than a decade, when Johnny Petraglia joined him in 1980.

It was almost another decade before Pete Weber joined the duo in 1989. Since then, another five professionals have joined them: Mike Aulby in 1995, Norm Duke and Chris Barnes in 2011, Jason Belmonte in 2020, and the most recent member Dom Barrett, when he won the Tournament of Champions this year to complete the run of wins in the three events.

Until Belmonte burst upon the scene in 2014 with his first win in the Triple Crown events at the Tournament of Champions, you would be hard pressed to argue against Pete Weber when it comes to dominating the big events. Weber started his run at the Triple Crown when he, like Belmonte, first claimed a victory at the Tournament of Champions, way back in 1987.

Pete, who recently announced his retirement from the national tour, is the only player to complete the Triple Crown... twice! He also has five victories at the U.S. open — considered by the players to be the most difficult event because of a premium on accuracy to make good shots.

I first met a young Pete Weber when AMF was negotiating to purchase Dick Weber Lanes from his father. He had heard of my 300 games and 800 series exploits and was eager to challenge me when I arrived at the center. Once I had convinced him that I had no interest in challenging him, and that I was content just to bowl once a week in a league at Deer Park Bowl on Long Island, N.Y., we became fast friends in a relationship that has lasted until this day.

Pete's record of nine victories in Triple Crown events is being challenged by Jason Belmonte, who has a total of seven in just eight years. What no one can ever challenge is Pete's longevity factor — he has won those nine events over the course of 26 years! Add to that the fact that he's won a total of five U.S. Open events, while none of the other Triple Crown holders have totaled more than one, and you can begin to see why Pete Weber could arguably be the greatest bowler of all time.

I remember when AMF first signed Pete to the AMF Staff of Champions and everyone wanted Pete to come to their center for exhibitions, learn to bowl clinics, and the like. "There were so many benefits to having Dick Weber at an exhibition," I wrote in an article for *BCM Magazine* in August of 2018. "His personality. His coaching expertise. His ability to motivate bowlers to want to get better. But times were changing, and most of the managers wanted the younger, brash 'PDW' to ingratiate their lanes."

It took awhile, but I was able to locate an old article from some press clippings titled, "Weber, Williams Slated for Celebrity Bowling." Pete and I were scheduled to roll against TV and radio celebrities from throughout the state of South Carolina and northern Georgia. A couple of future nationwide celebrities were included in the list of teams that would be rolling against us... J.D. Hayworth and Mike Seidel.

Both Hayworth and Seidel were working for WYFF-TV in Greenville, S.C., at the time. Hayworth went on to a successful career in the United States Congress as a representative from Arizona (1995-2007), and then as host of *Newsmax Prime* on cable television. He now owns The Great 48th Group, a consulting company. Seidel also has enjoyed national success as a reporter for the *Weather Channel*, where he has excelled for more than 30 years.

Mike O'Barr, the manager of AMF Anderson Bowl in Anderson, S.C., was the first to come up with the unique doubles format to gain maximum exposure with the media, while at the same time capitalizing on Pete's competitive energy when confronted with a challenge. The learn to bowl and exhibition clinics just did not fit his style, unlike Father Dick Weber, who was at his best when conversing with individuals that came to watch and learn from the master.

So, who is the greatest bowler of all time? In terms of absolute numbers (titles and earnings), the nod would have to go with Walter Ray Williams Jr., whom Pete Weber often referred to as "the only one that had my number." And as for looking to the future, there's no question that Jason Belmonte, or perhaps Anthony Simonsen will receive the approval of most.

But as for me, I think that it would be safe to say that the greatest bowler of all time comes from the Weber household — Pete for his ability to win the big ones, in addition to titles and earnings exceeded only by Walter Ray; or Dick, the greatest ambassador for bowling that the world has ever known, and one exceptional human being.



this pain before dealing with back issues over the years, but this time the discomfort didn't dissipate quickly and it lingered, leaving him concerned his back was going to go out and he wouldn't be able to finish the match.

During the commercial break he got advice from tour roommate Tom Daugherty who was on-site and has experienced similar back issues. Daugherty encouraged him to sit differently in the chair or to stand up and tried to reassure Maldonado his back wouldn't give out.

"It shut my ball speed down a lot, and I think it benefitted me," he said. "To hurt my back on TV and have to pull out on TV, that would have been terrible for me. I would have been devastated." Maldonado took game one, 204-192, and dominated game two starting out with nine straight strikes before leaving a 2-pin. If Maldonado had shot 300, he would have earned \$10,000 from the PBA. He swept Simonsen, 267-174.

"I was still going for the \$10,000 saying, 'Come on, old man,'" Maldonado told himself. "The fact that I was able to finish and perform was pretty incredible for me."

After upsetting Simonsen, Maldonado said his plan is to visit a sports doctor when he returns home to Texas to find out what is really going on with his back, so he doesn't have to "keep going on this rollercoaster of pain and emotion." For now as he advances to the quarterfinals, he is going to use muscle relaxers and try to visit a chiropractor for a temporary fix to get him through the tournament.

The second match of the day featured No. 7 Jakob Butturff against No. 10 AJ Johnson. Butturff started with a four-bagger to take an early lead before his Team USA teammate closed out the game with nine consecutive strikes as Johnson earned the win, 270-232.

Johnson decided to switch to a Motiv Venom Shock in the first frame of game two, leaving a 3-pin and quickly changed back to the Motiv Jackal Ghost he used in game one. Johnson had a few double dribbles on the left lane holding a two-pin lead through four frames. The righty then rolled a five-bagger for the 245-224 win.

"On the left lane I had to make sure my speed was a little softer and that I got it going to the right so I would get around the urethane traffic from the match before," Johnson said about dealing with the lane transition. "When you are bowling on something like this you want to be aggressive and play as close to your 'A' game as possible."

This was Johnson's first time bowling at the Kegel Training Center, which is home to Webber International. Johnson thrived on the energy from the contingent of collegiate bowlers in the crowd.

"The college kids love to bring energy and I love to bring it when I am on TV," the former McKendree University bowler said. "It makes me feel more comfortable out there and allowed me to throw some really great shots."

Johnson, who is seeking his first career PBA Tour title, will face Maldonado at noon ET May 1 on Fox Sports' FS1 in the quarterfinals.

The winner of the Kia PBA Playoffs will earn \$100,000 and a PBA Tour title.

Tackett knew he needed to strike more in game two, so he relied on his Motiv Ripcord, while Svensson stayed with his Storm Pitch Black urethane. Svensson led by 17 halfway through the match before Tackett finished with seven straight strikes for the 242-227 win to force extra frames.

In the 9th and 10th frame roll-off, Svensson struggled to carry, leaving three single-pins for a score of 38. Tackett rolled a strike and needed a mark to advance, but instead left the 2-4-6-10 split, which he failed to convert.

"I am still glad I won but it is a little rough when you win by somebody else's mistake," Svensson said. "You would love to just go up there and throw the shots you need to win. You know that is bowling and I will take it. I was on the right side this time."

The final match of the Round of 16 on the right side of the tournament bracket featured No. 6 Tommy Jones against No. 11 Kyle Sherman.

Over the first four frames in game one, Sherman had two opens while Jones had one. Both players then seemed to settle in as Jones went on to win 237-198.

"Not bowling on the fresh (oil) it seemed safer to play to the right with urethane as opposed to getting into the middle where there was a little bit a traffic from EJ," Jones said about the lane conditions following Tackett. "I got away with a couple of shots. He (Sherman) didn't have a great reaction the first game."

Jones kept using his reliable Brunswick Purple Hammer to start out with a four-bagger in game two holding a 19-pin lead halfway through. Sherman trimmed his deficit to three pins heading into the foundation frame.

Sherman's shot went wide right leaving the 1-2-4, which he chopped. Jones posted a double and 8-spares over the final two frames for 233-221 to earn the sweep.

"I just got fortunate that he made a bad one in the ninth and I was able to get away with the win," Jones said.

With a loud and supportive crowd inside the Kegel Training Center filled with bowlers from Webber International, Jones said they are the future of the game.

"We want to keep them passionate about the sport of bowling," Jones said about the collegiate players in the audience. "Anything we can do to pay it forward to keep them engaged and want to continue this and maybe do this one day and get the chance to bowl on TV and see how much fun that is."

Svensson will face Jones at noon ET May 1 on Fox Sports' FS1 in the quarterfinals.

The winner of the Kia PBA Playoffs will earn \$100,000 and a PBA Tour title.

Joseph LeVan Miles was born on December 22, 1945, in Queen City, Texas to Mary Hannah Mae Miles and James Robinson. As a young child, he lived with his mother and grandparents, Alvie and Sam Miles, Sr., in Odessa, Louisiana. His mother would later move to California and at age five, he and his grandparents also relocated to California. Joseph spent his youth living between his grandparents' house and with his parents, Mary Hannah Mae Martin and Miller B. Martin, Sr., and three siblings, Irene, Miller, and Albert, who resided on 62nd St. in South Los Angeles.

Many bowlers came to know and love their time around the man known as "Papa Joe," who was always ready to share his wealth of wisdom with you, and help any bowler take their game to the next level.

Papa Joe was more than just a bowler and a friend, though; he was a family man as well. His wife's name is Flora. They had one daughter named Kellye, one granddaughter named Vanniase and three great grandchildren: VaNae, Terrell Joseph and Vanessa.

Some of Papa Joe's favorite bowling centers included Del Rio Lanes and Keystone Lanes. He was a proud member of the Del Rio Tournament Club (DTC) for many years. Some leagues he participated in included the Baker League and Paint League.

Still, there was more to Papa Joe than just bowling.

Joseph was educated in the Los Angeles Unified School District and loved playing baseball. He attended Miramonte Elementary School, Edison Junior High School, and Fremont High School, where he graduated and received his Industrial Arts Certificate in Woodshop in 1964. In school, he was smooth, down to earth, and gained the nickname, "Smiley" because he was always smiling.

Did you know that he was a fine catcher back in the 70s? He was a great baseball player, playing for Millie's Tigers alongside his brother Miller and cousin Charles Miles at Slauson Park in Los Angeles.

Together with his brother Miller, Papa Joe created a sports club, where they played baseball, football and track and field.

Around 1974, Papa Joe and Miller volunteered to be a coach for basketball and baseball teams at Bethune Park in Los Angeles.

Bowlers, you can see why coaching was always in Papa Joe's blood. He knew how to pass along skills and information to those who were willing to receive it and nurture their game.

Papa Joe was also a business owner. At one point in time, he owned a "You Buy, We Fry" style fish market called S&S.

A lover of music, he also once owned a record shop on 111th and Figueroa.

In 2013, he helped to form a DJ service called KJ's United. It helped him to share his love for music with anybody who came around him. He set the ambiance for any crowd he led – picking music selections from every genre. He was the DJ at most family gatherings and participated at The Taste of Soul and the Los Angeles County Fair. He spent hours listening to all types of music and music groups on his computer.

Papa Joe shined off the bowling lanes, but the knowledge he passed onto other bowlers was not unmerited. Papa Joe shot eight 300 games, last shooting one on April 4, 2011. He had one 299 ring and five 11-in-a-row plaques.

He earned the nickname "Papa" while on camping trips. The name was fitting, and it stuck to him, and it spread from the various music venues he performed at and onto the bowling centers.

Camping was a big passion of his. He loved to be with the children and groups of individuals with boats that could be launched into the Colorado River. He provided rides for the children that were on the camping trips.

Joseph got to embark on many cruises, which allowed him to interact with individuals from all walks of life and of many different age groups.

Joseph Miles was a man who loved staying busy by camping, bowling, cruising, performing karaoke, eating foods he enjoyed, being an entrepreneur and working on other jobs.

Among his favorite foods were BBQ, rice, greens, peas, cornbread, fried oysters, buffalo fish, Mexican food, Chinese food, smothered turkey wings, steak and lobster, peach cobbler, sweet potato pie and Diet Coke.

He had quite the car collection as well, which included: an Avalanche, two Suburbans (white and blue), a Cadillac and a Monte Carlo.

Some jobs Joseph held throughout his life included working as a service station attendant, customer service representative, carpet mill worker, salesperson at AutoZone and as a staff member of Barbour and Floyd Medical Associates.

We will miss you, Papa Joe. You truly were one of a kind. Your lessons will live on forever. Thank you for everything.






FOREST LANES OFF TO 10-0 START IN BRUNSWICK INVITATIONAL THE SPRINT TO THE FINISH IS ON AT 8-2, U.S. FOODS HAS SET UP AN EXCITING BATTLE ON THE TOP PAIR NEXT WEEK

DOWNEY — In the final round of the Brunswick Invitational, it is the final chance for teams to lock in a spot for the playoffs that will be starting in a few short weeks. While the round winners battle each other for seeding, the remaining take the lanes in a round featuring all of the patterns from the season in play. On this Monday, the league would bowl on the third round long oil pattern.

Last week, three teams got off to 5-0 starts for the round. Two of those teams, Forest Lanes and the Professional Approach would do battle on the first pair of lanes. Forest Lanes used a 208 game from JT Diso to take an early 1-0 lead, 735-637. The middle game was a little closer, but Jon Diso came up big for Forest, posting a 229 game leading Forest to another victory. A new leader in game three led to the same result, as Tony Brunning topped the pair with 214 giving Forest Lanes a five game sweep and a 10-0 start to the round. Jon Diso was the only bowler on the pair to break 600, shooting 601 for the night.

The other 5-0 team from the opening night was Bowling Guys, and they drew 4-1 U.S. Foods. A 236 game from Bobby Campagnale got the Bowling Guys off to a quick start, winning 740-711. Game two went to U.S. Foods, as Gabriel Martinez shot a 229 game to lead the team. After game two, the match was even at one game each and total pins was within eight pins with Bowling Guys having a slim lead. The match wouldn't end closely though as U.S. Foods pulled away in the final game. A 258 from Gabriel Martinez was certainly the difference and a 212 from Charlie Kinstler helped the cause. At 8-2, U.S. Foods will move to the top pair next week to take on Forest Lanes.

Threadworks improved to 8-2 for the final round with a 5-0 sweep of WBPI. WBPI was outmatched in this one from the jump, with Threadworks winning total pins by close to 400. Kevin Jones led all scorers with a 222/614 set.

Westminster Lanes and TDI Refrigeration squared off in the fourth match. Both teams started the round 2-3 and needed a big night to get back into contention. Westminster Lanes started quickly with a 50 pin win in the opening game. Jaime Ferry was the only bowler over 200 in the opener, shooting a 212. Game two was big for Westminster, as they won by over 120 pins, opening a commanding lead for total pins. Ray Minter topped the team with 203, while Jonathan Gale was right behind at 201. In the final game, Michael Barnett got locked in for TDI, shooting a 231 game. While that was enough to win the game for TDI, they were not able to make up the difference for totals. Westminster ended the night with four wins, improving to 6-4 for the round.

DV8 and J.A.T. did not get off to good starts last week and were need of wins on this night. DV8 has led the wildcard standings all season. And, while J.A.T. had been in contention, an 0-5 start last week did not help matters. This match was never close as J.A.T. started strong and never looked back. The 80 pin win in the opener was the closest game of the night as J.A.T. won all five games, getting back to even at 5-5. Anthony Santos was the top scorer, shooting a 234-209-202 for 645. At 1-9, DV8 will need to get will quickly as their wild card lead has been erased and they now are looking up at other teams.

On the final pair, Team Hu\$tle took four out of five from California Timberline in a very close match. Team Hu\$tle won the opener by 16 pins. Timberline evened the match at 1-1 with a 48 pin win in the middle game, as Will Hinckley shot a 210 game. Team Hu\$tle came back in the finale, posting a 58 pin win to take totals by 20. Jelly Gray led the final game with a 228 to top the pair with a 588 series.

For the round winners, it's a different story. Their spots in the playoffs are clinched, but total wins will determine the seeding. For the fifth round, they will battle it out to determine the order of bowling in the stepladder finals.

The Forever Hope Foundation is currently in the top spot and has a commanding lead. Family Ties is in 2nd and not giving up hope on catching the leaders. On Monday night, Family Ties closed the gap just a bit with a 4-1 win in the match. They took the opener by 50 pins, as Steve Gurrieri topped the pair with a 222 game. Forever Hope got even in the middle game, winning by 30 pins behind a 218 game from Vernon Adams. In the final game, Mikey Villarreal got going for Family Ties with a 224 game. That was enough to get the win and totals for Family Ties. Villarreal's 224 was enough to give him the lead for the pair as well, shooting 615.

Going into the night, Bowlium sat in the third position, while Cal Bowl had fourth. Nothing will change there, as Bowlium won the match 4-1. Bowlium took the first two games. Cal Bowl won the third and final game, but came up nine pins short for totals in a very tight battle. Billy Myers Jr. had the top score for Bowlium, shooting 210/591. Ramon Torres also had a 232/591 for Cal Bowl, but his team could only manage a single win. Bobby Campagnale took the first sidepot with a 236 game. Kevin Jones shot a 222 to earn runner up money. In the middle game, 234 was enough to get Anthony Santos paid, while Gabriel Martinez got second place money with 219. In the final game, a 269 for Joe Smith won the superpot for \$102. Gabriel Martinez was once again second, this time with a 258, for \$51.
