



2023 U.S. OPEN TO **GETS UNDERWAY IN INDIANAPOLIS**

ARLINGTON, Texas – There is nothing quite like the start of a new bowling season.

That's because whether you're a league bowler or a touring professional, each new season provides the opportunity to catch up with old friends, get back in the swing of competition and pursue challenging goals designed to take your game to the next level.

For members of the Professional Bowlers Association Tour, the season-opener is even more special because it happens to take place at one of the sport's most-prestigious major championships, the U.S. Open.

The 2023 U.S. Open presented by Go Bowling!, a major championship on the Professional Bowlers Association Tour schedule, started Sunday at Royal Pin Woodland (formerly Woodland Bowl) in Indianapolis and will wrap up on Feb. 5.

The week long tournament is sure to be chock full of intriguing action. With that in mind, here are some unique storylines to keep your eye on during this

JONES, BELMONTE TO CAPTAIN USA VS. THE WORLD TEAMS by Nolan Hughes

One of the highlights of the 2023 Guaranteed Rate PBA Tour is the return of the USA vs. The World event at the World Series of Bowling XIV.

During a pair of FS1 telecasts on April 15-16, four Americans will compete against four international stars for the right to the Hall of Fame Cup, which will reside at the International Bowling Museum and Hall of Fame in Arlington, Texas.

Tommy Jones is set to captain the Americans, while Australia's Jason Belmonte leads the World team. The remaining players will be determined during the 2023 PBA Tour.

On Feb. 13, before the PBA Shawnee Classic, each captain will select one player to join their team. Belmonte can



choose any international player, while Jones can tab any American.

The final roster spots will be determined following the Tournament of Champions based on the 2023 PBA Tour points list. The top two Americans and international players in points through the Tour's first six tournaments will join the USA and World teams, respectively.

Jones is an 11-time Team USA member, and one of five players to win PBA Rookie and Player of the Year during his career. The 44-year-old South Carolinian owns 20 career titles, including two majors, and was inducted into the PBA Hall of Fame in 2020.

"I've always enjoyed bowling with USA on my jersey, whether it's been for the Weber Cup or bowling for Team USA,' Jones said. "This is a little bit of a different animal and something that is pretty cool, bowling and coaching some of the greatest guys throwing the ball these days."

The 39-year-old Belmonte is still at the peak of his powers, earning a record-tying seventh PBA Player of the Year award in 2022. Belmonte continued on page 10

Since all 108 bowlers in this year's U.S. Open field will be looking to reach the top of the mountain, it's probably best to begin by looking at the man who currently resides there.

In this case, that would be Anthony Simonsen of Las Vegas.

Simonsen won last year's tournament, which was also held at Woodland, by defeating E.J. Tackett of Bluffton, Indiana, 232-165 during the live TV finals on Fox Sports' FS1.

The victory earned Simonsen the tournament's \$100,000 first-place prize and the distinction of being the youngest player in PBA history to win three majors at just 25 years and 31 days old. USBC and PBA Hall of Famer Dave Davis held the previous mark (25 years, 43 days).

Not one to rest on his laurels, a little over a month later, Simonsen became the fastest to record four PBA major victories when he won the 2022 United States Bowling Congress Masters in Las Vegas.

Simonsen can rewrite the record book once again by capturing major No. 5 in Indianapolis this week. However, to do so, he'd have to complete the first successful U.S. Open title defense since Dave Husted accomplished the feat in 1996.

It's sure to be a tall task, but Simonsen has already proven time and time again that he's more than up to the challenge.

Belmonte aims to break own record

Speaking of being up to a challenge, no bowler in the world has proven himself more capable of rising to the occasion than has Australian superstar Jason Belmonte.

Belmonte has been the consensus pick as the world's No. 1 bowler for the better part of the last decade, and it's easy to understand why as a seven-time PBA Player of the Year and the tour's all-time leader in major championship victories with 14.

The two-hander already has one U.S. Open title under his belt. That win came when he defeated Simonsen (226-201) during the stepladder finals at the 2020 event held at Sun Valley Lanes in Lincoln, Nebraska.

That victory was especially sweet for Belmonte as it allowed him to become just the second player in PBA history to capture the elusive Super Slam, which means a player has won five different major championship titles. PBA Hall of Famer Mike Aulby is the only other bowler to have accomplished the feat.

Belmonte comes to Woodland looking to add to his already-legendary resume by starting the 2023 season with U.S. Open win No. 2 and major title No. 15.

If past history is any indicator of things to come, Belmonte is almost certain to be in the mix all week long at Woodland.

MLB's Mookie Betts, country music's Jimmie Allen to take part in U.S. Open activities

The Bowling Proprietors' Association of America recently awarded Los Angeles Dodgers outfielder Mookie Betts and country music headliner Jimmie Allen exemptions into the main field at the 2023 U.S. Open.

Betts and Allen have served as advocates and ambassadors for the sport of bowling, and both still compete in high level events across the country as much as their busy schedules will allow.

Allen will participate in Sunday's pre-tournament qualifier after being forced to decline his exemption in order to perform at this year's Grammy Awards in Los Angeles on Feb. 1.

Betts, meanwhile, will compete in the tournament proper as a member of A Squad, which kicks off this year's event Tuesday morning at 8 a.m. Eastern for the first of three eight-game qualifying blocks.

The Dodgers' all-star outfielder has been an ardent supporter of both USBC and PBA tournaments through the years, maintaining an average of right around 200 during 11 career PBA events.

Betts' crowning PBA achievement to date came in 2017 when he recorded a perfect game during qualifying-round action at PBA World Series of Bowling IX at the National Bowling Stadium in Reno, Nevada.

Regardless of how Betts and Allen perform on the lanes, just having them on site is sure to add even more excitement to an already-thrilling week of action on the lanes in Indianapolis.

Malott's son Jordan, also of Fort Wayne, is in this year's field as well. The younger Malott, a current member of Junior Team USA, is no stranger to success at Woodland as he has authored strong performances there in years past while competing at the Junior Gold Championships.

Nevertheless, fan-favorite honors may very well go to Indianapolis natives Brent Boho and Zach Weidman, who will have the advantage of bowling in their own backyard and being able to sleep at home throughout this year's tournament.

Despite having to travel a bit farther, Kevin McCune of Munster, Ronnie Russell of Marion and Matthew Sanders of Evansville will also feel at home and should garner plenty of support this week at Woodland.

A family affair

Competing for a major title is always a nerve-wracking experience. As such, it's nice when a bowler can count on the support of family to help weather the storm. Several 2023 U.S. Open competitors will be able to continued on page 4

get that support not just from the stands but from the settee as well since they will have family members bowling right alongside them.

As already discussed, father-son duo Wes and Jordan Malott are in this year's field as are PBA Hall of Famer Chris Barnes and his son Ryan, both of Denton, Texas.

Aside from the father-son pairs, two sets of brothers will compete together this year as well.

The first is Darren Tang of Las Vegas and brother Michael Tang of Pickerington, Ohio, and the second is the Lavery-Spahr brothers, Sean and Anthony, both of Pasadena, Texas.

It remains to be seen how the family units will fare in the final standings, but just being able to share the competition experience is sure to make the 2023 U.S. Open one they won't soon forget.

Tournament action began Sunday morning when 108 bowlers take to the lanes at Royal Pin Woodland for the eight-game PTQ.

A minimum of 21 players will advance out of the PTQ and be added to the tournament's main field, which also will feature a total of 108 bowlers.

Tournament play will officially begin Tuesday morning at 8 a.m. Eastern when the bowlers on A Squad hit the lanes for their first eight-game qualifying block. B Squad and C Squad will follow at 1 p.m. and 6 p.m. Eastern, respectively.

All competitors will complete 24 games of qualifying over three days and three lane conditions before the field is cut from 108 to 24 for three rounds of round-robin match play, which will be contested on a fourth oil pattern.

Pinfall totals for 24 games will determine the 24 players for round-robin match play, and 48-game totals, including 30 bonus pins for each win in match play, will decide the nine bowlers who advance to the two live televised rounds.

The first round will feature seeds No. 5-9 battling it out on FS1 on Feb. 4 at 4 p.m. Eastern. The bowler who wins that stepladder will join seeds No. 1-4 for the championship round Feb. 5 at 2 p.m. Eastern on FOX.

The 2023 U.S. Open will be a collaborative effort between USBC and BPAA and again will be considered a major on the PBA Tour. The total prize fund for the event will exceed \$275,000.

Another Look At Closed Bowling Centers

In response to our question about closed bowling centers, we have received four thoughtful replies, and rather than take bits and pieces and mold them into one article, I've decided to take each one as a separate story. Yes, there is that much information in each response.

The first of these responses that we'll focus on comes from Rich LaChance of Ohio, who previously lived in California, and before that Arizona. If nothing else, you would certainly have to say that Rich is following a recent trend, first by moving from Arizona to California about 45 years ago, and then fleeing California for Ohio, where he has been for the past 30 years. But he is still able to keep up on all the bowling news by following The Desert Bowler and California Bowling News online.



The bowling center that he brought up from his childhood was Golden Pin Lanes in Tucson, Ariz., a 48 lane facility that originally opened in 1960, like so many others, with the advent of the automatic pinsetter, eliminating the need for pin boys. They would finally close in 2019. The last professional event (there were many over the years, including 27 national PBA tourneys), was held by the PWBA that summer, and Shannon O'Keefe came away the victor with a 259 final game on television, good for a \$10,000 payday.

Unlike so many bowling centers that have closed due to real estate values in recent years, Golden Pin Lanes fell victim to another fate that has been around just as long — failure by the immediate family to show an interest in the business. In my travels with AMF, American Recreation Centers (ARC), and Nationwide Bowling Centers, I witnessed this phenomenon almost as often as the real estate conundrum.

In fact, it carried right to the board room, where the sons of both ARC and Nationwide Bowling Centers owners became lawyers, after witnessing the long and hard hours devoted by their parents to make the bowling centers thrive. In the case of Golden Pin Lanes it was the age of Don Allan, 85, which ultimately led to the decision to put the lanes up for sale, according to Caryn Bustos in an article posted by KGUN Channel 9 in Tucson, an ABC affiliate.

Bustos, the general manager who had been with Golden Pin Lanes for 24 years, said that it was difficult to see the place close. When no one stepped forward for the asking price of \$2.8 to \$3.0 million as a bowling center, it was ultimately purchased by Pima County for \$2.85 million. The property is still vacant today, but the elaborate brick entrance, and

joyed a professional career that included 2 PBA titles as well as the USBC Masters in 1968. It seems as though Tountas won many more PBA events, perhaps because of his familiar mustachioed face and heavy Greek accent... and no slide! How did his knee survive all those years on the PBA tour?

There's no question, however, that Paul Colwell was the most famous bowler to come out of Tucson. He was one of the first professionals to sign with Columbia 300, along with superstars Don Johnson and Betty Morris. His "frisbee" release was envied by many competitors, but no one ever came close to duplicating the unusual delivery.

Sidewalk Bowling

"People say that Paul got his release from throwing a frisbee," said childhood friend LaChance. "In reality it came from bowling on a cement alley his dad had poured in their back yard." Rich would meet up there with Colwell, John Menche and Jim Zook. "We would spend a lot of time bowling there, two on each end to set up the pins and take our turn on the approach."

LaChance remembers that the bowling balls didn't last very long, so they were always looking for a few leftover or discarded bowling balls at pro shops. "I think that's where Paul developed his approach also - his lack of slide," said Rich. It could have also been influenced by the planted foot release of Tountas, who had left the tour by this time to focus on his management duties at Golden Pin Lanes.

It's interesting how children find ways to entertain themselves. I shared with Rich my own sidewalk bowling tour experience that 3 of my friends and I devised in our backyards. We would travel to each of the four homes that had cement walkways that could be used for bowling. We used plastic pins and a softball as a bowling ball. Our mom's would never have agreed to using real bowling balls!



Java Lanes in Long Beach

Fast forward 15 years, and Rich had made the move west, like so many Americans, for sunny California. His favorite bowling center during those years was Java Lanes in Long Beach, which opened in the mid-1950's, and closed their doors for good in 2004. They featured the famous "googie" architecture that was beginning to take place across the nation by firms such as DeRosa, Daly and Powers... the same organization that designed the largest bowling center in the world when it opened, the Willow Grove Park Lanes in Pennsylvania (116 lanes).

Rich had a humorous story about a seagull that fits in nicely with the stories I've told about the curious birds that have been a part of the lives of myself and Dick Weber. LaChance recalls: "Java Lanes had a 5 game sweeper every Friday. Well one week I got there at least an hour early, paid my entry fee and side pots, and I think I had \$4.00 left over. I needed gas in the car and I was hungry."

Rich said that his hunger pains won out over the gas concern, so he took a walk down the hill and across a traffic circle to a small deli at the end of a strip mall. "I went in and ordered a sub with potato salad and a lemonade. It came to \$3.95. I figured I would eat at a table outside and still have time to get back to bowl. As I was carrying my lunch to the table a seagull 'crapped' right in the middle of my plate!"

LaChance said that he just kept walking and dropped his lunch in the nearest trash bin, and headed back up the hill to the lanes. "I sat there pouting and complaining to myself until it was time to bowl. However, I not only won the sweeper that day, but four of the side pots. I filled the car with gas, and ate indoors at a fancy restaurant. Later that same weekend, I won a 10 game marathon and an ABA Tournament."

It's interesting how the seagull took Rich's immediate troubles away, and he was better able to focus on the tournament. I have also witnessed this same experience when I've bowled some of my best scores while feeling a little under the weather. Famous book writer Hal Lindsey has often said not to sweat the little stuff. His 'eleventh commandment' is: Thou shall not worry (Philippians 4:6-7).

of course the road sign (why do they always save the sign?), have been spared and will be incorporated into the new building which will provide city services such as healthcare.

Golden Pin Lanes was not without its share of celebrities. Pete Tountas was the general manager of the center for many years. Prior to that, Pete en-

Years later when a couple of us had driver's licenses, we discovered a chicken coop along the railroad tracks south of Sebastopol, Calif., with a bowling "alley" inside! Along with the single lane, there were pins (with spikes in the pit to set the pins), bowling balls — everything was there. A local farmer said that it was something the farmer's used to do when they had free time, or at night after being in the fields all day. He told us it was okay to use it as long as we didn't hurt anything. We spent many summer days there, bowling for nothing! We called it Chicken Coop Bowl.

Rich put his good fortune into other words: "I guess I owe my good weekend to a bird with 'crappy' aim. I sure do miss that sea gull."

owns 30 career titles, including a PBA-record 14 majors.

"I can't wait to captain the World team against the USA," said Belmonte, who was a member of the victorious World team at the last USA vs. The World event in 2019. "I have a few players on my radar I'm looking at for my selection, but before that I'm excited to bowl TJ for the seeding at the historic Holler House."

Milwaukee's Holler House will host a one-game match between Jones and Belmonte at the World Series of Bowling. Its two wood lanes are the oldest sanctioned pair in the United States. To this day, oiling, scoring and pinsetting are done by hand.

"I've been there a couple of times just to see the place and it's pretty nostalgic," Jones said. "I'm really looking forward to bowling a match there. I'm not sure that either one of us have had a whole lot of experience with that. I'm hoping that straighter is going to be greater and that we'll be able to prevail."

The winner of the match will earn the top seed for the TV finals and lane choice for every match of the finals. The match will be livestreamed on the PBA's You-Tube channel for free. Any proceeds will be donated to the International Bowling Museum and Hall of Fame.

The two-part TV finals will be held at Bowlero Wauwatosa, kicking off the seven-telecast World Series of Bowling XIV. Both shows will air live on FS1.

On April 15, the teams will square off in four singles matches with five points up for grabs (one point per match and one point for total combined pinfall).

Teamwork becomes crucial on April 16 as doubles and baker matches take center stage. Two points will go to the winning teams of an alternate shot doubles match and best ball doubles match. A Race to Two team baker match worth five points will close out the competition.

The team with the most points will claim the Hall of Fame Cup.

"As competitive bowling continues to grow globally, we aim to make USA vs. The World the ultimate international team event," said PBA Commissioner Tom Clark. "With this year's twists of Tommy and Belmo as the playing captains, a new trophy and its spot at the International Bowling Museum and Hall of Fame, the captain's match at historic Holler House and two days of live multi-event coverage on FS1 from the WSOB, we will reintroduce and elevate this annual competition."
