2 Popular San Diego Bowling Centers Closing

SAN DIEGO – Two popular San Diego bowling centers will be closing permanently, the manager of both locations told ABC 10News.

Johnny Humble came to Kearny Mesa Bowl on Tuesday and was greeted by some of his devoted league bowlers who came to say goodbye. Kearny Mesa Bowl and Mira Mesa Lanes had been "surviving on vapors" this past year due to the coronavirus pandemic, only able to open for about two weeks in 2020.

Humble was visibly upset, thinking of his employees. For many, he said, this was their only job, and they had loyally been with him for decades in some cases.

Neal Methvin is one of the longtime bowlers who said he'd been coming to Kearny Mesa Bowl since 1984, two nights per week, as part of a large recreational league. Methvin said he **USING STATE** enzie - KGTV Humble dutifully signed pins for bowlers to keep as a souvenir. They stood and hugged, fighting back tears, as though saying final

goodbyes to family. The locations were able to open for just two weeks this past year, abiding by safety requirements, but after the shutdown in December, they haven't been able to reopen.

Humble explained that he tried to hold on as long as he could, but the land is just too valuable.

He said both lots are to be sold to make way for development, and he is preparing for an auction of some of the items later this month. <u>WATCH MORE</u>



JUPITER, Fla. – Jillian Martin and Spencer Robarge became the first PBA Jr. National Champions, each earning \$7,500 in SMART Scholarships along with their titles. Martin won the girls division with a victory over Victoria Varano and Robarge defeated Nate Purches to win the boys division.

After 16-year-old Varano finished with a 246 game, Martin, also 16, needed two strikes in the 10th frame to win the girls division. Martin rolled all three strikes, giving her six in a row to finish with a 257 game and the title.


Francois Lavoie, The Face-Masked Crusader Of Bowling

If you met Francois Lavoie in person at your local bowling center, you would probably be reminded of a resigned, shy character reminiscent of Bruce Wayne, the alter ego of Batman, rather than the famous Caped Crusader of comic book and motion picture fame.

The quiet, unassuming professional bowler from Quebec City, QC, weighs in at a mere 128 pounds distributed on a chiseled lacks in stature, he more than makes up for with his intense concentration.

I sometimes wonder if the face-mask mandate has made Lavoie a better, or more confident bowler, similar to the reserved character of Bruce Wayne, who becomes the Dark Knight whenever he dons the cowl of Batman. Lavoie was already off to one of the best starts of any professional kegler in history, with two U.S. Open titles (2016 and 2019) and a Rookie of the Year accolade in 2016.





"What Might Have Been" – LIZ JOHNSON As The All-Time Winningest Professional Female Bowler by Frank Weiler



Liz Johnson

LISA WAGNER is universally recognized as being the ALL-Time winningest female professional bowler. She accumulated her record total of 32 Professional Titles during a two decade career in the 1980s and 1990s. Nicknamed the "Rocket" she was a power player known for the velocity of her bowling ball. While Lisa's record of 32 Titles may stand forever, I believe that Liz Johnson and Leanne (Barrette) Hulsenberg would have surpassed her on the Titles List if the PWBA/LPBT Tours had not suspended operations for eleven years from 2004 until 2014.

My believe is based on calculations using an algebraic equation which factors in the age of the bowlers studied, the number of titles won per year prior to the LPBT shutdown and the number years these bowlers would be expected to compete beyond 2004. This projected number of Titles would then be added to the number of tiles won prior to 2004 and after 2014. The equation looks like this: ([A] The average number of tournaments won per year prior to 2004 mul-

tiplied by [B] the number of years expected to compete after 2003 plus [C] the actual number of titles won before 2004 and after 2014 equals [D] The projected total of titles that might have been won). In algebraic terms the equation would read: $A \times B + C = D$.

Since Lisa Wagner retired at age 39 and runner-up Titleist Aleta Rzepecki-Sill retired at age 40 I used the age 40 as my cut-off age for the bowlers studied. I made exceptions for Hulsenberg, Kulick and Johnson because they have continued to successfully compete to this day while being in their mid 40's (Kulick and Johnson) to their early 50's (Hulsenberg is 53).

Liz Johnson was Bowler of The Year for 2017 at the age of 43! Hulsenberg won the Women's US OPEN in Dallas in 2011 at the age of 44 and continues to compete on Tour. Kulick won her latest title during the 2018 WPBA season at age 41.

The table below reflects my findings and is my rationale for declaring that Liz Johnson would have surpassed Lisa Wagner and become the winningest female professional bowler of All-Time:

An examination of my theoretical calculations show that if a Professional Tour (PWBA or LPBT) was active from 2004 through 2014 Liz Johnson would today be the winningest female professional bowler of All-Time. The All-Time winners list would look like this:

While Liz Johnson sits at the top of my "Virtual" Titleist List there is still a possibility that she could end up at the top of Bowling's Actual List of Titleists when she retires. She is still active and may easily add to her actual total of 24 PWBA Titles and 3 PBA Titles (One National and two Women's Series Titles).

Old timers might wonder how many Titles MARION LADEWIG might have won had there been a full blown Women's Tour during her hey day. Remember, Marion won eight (8) Women's US Open Tournaments from 1949 to 1963. She also won five (5) World Invitational tournaments during that period. That's 13 Championships in 14 years (there was no US Open in 1954) with only one or two tournaments a year. Her winning percentage (about 50%) during those years when applied to a season of 14 to 20 tournaments a year would translate into 7 to 10 wins a year during those 14 seasons. That would translate into 98 to 140 lifetime Titles! Those numbers would be "RUTHIAN" and unapproachable.

Okay, you have heard the evidence and now you can judge for yourself who should be Bowling's All-Time winningest female professional bowler.

*For purposes of my projections, Kelly Kulick's average number of Titles won per year takes into account her wins before 2004 and after 2014 because she only competed for two years prior to 2004.

**For purposes of my projections, Kelly Kulick's actual number of Tournament victories include her wins between 2004 and 2014.

The Wichita State women and Calumet men made their runs through match play to win their respective brackets last weekend at the Lions Classic in St. Charles, Missouri,

The 2021 edition of the Lions Classic welcomed 11 varsity women's teams and 15 men's programs.

The women's division featured three traditional games and 16 Baker games to determine seeding for bracket play. All teams advanced to the bracket, with teams being divided into three four-team brackets. The winner of each best-of-three Baker sub-bracket advanced to the stepladder finals.

Seeding in the stepladder finals was determined by match-play average and featured a best-of-five Baker format to determine the champion.

In qualifying, Wichita State paced the women's division with a 5,573 total, while Oklahoma Christian was second with 5,233. Lindenwood was third with 5,174. Each of these schools advanced from their respective sub-brackets in match play to earn spots in the stepladder finals.

Wichita State earned the top seed after averaging 202.5 in match play, setting up an opening match of Oklahoma Christian against Lindenwood.

Oklahoma Christian defeated Lindenwood, 3-1, to advance to the championship match and found the early momentum against Wichita State, taking a 2-1 lead into Game 4. Wichita State found the right look down the stretch, however, posting wins of 233-160 and 254-168 to claim the victory, 3-2.

In the women's individual standings, Barton Community College's Angelina Leeper was the only player to average over 200 for the three-game set, posting a 607 total to lead the way. Lincoln's Jaylyn Linder (595), Wichita State's Madison Janack (582), Oklahoma Christian's Morgan Pelkie (570) and Wichita State's Sierra Ciesiolka (545) also finished in the top five.

The men's qualifying portion included six traditional games to determine the seeding for the bracket. The men's bracket featured four four-team subbrackets. The winner of each sub-bracket advanced to the bracket semifinals, with the winners meeting in the championship round.

The sub-bracket format featured best-of-three Baker matches, while the semifinals and finals expanded to a best-of-five Baker format.

The top three teams from qualifying in the men's division were Calumet (6,159), Wichita State (6,136) and Oklahoma Christian (6,025). Lindenwood qualified fourth with 5,945, and each of the top four teams emerged from their sub-brackets to reach the semifinals.

Both Calumet and Wichita State rallied in their respective matches against Lindenwood and Oklahoma Christian, coming back from 2-1 deficits to win the deciding game and advance to the title match with 3-2 victories.

Wichita State claimed the opening game, 194-





184, but Calumet collected the next two games to take a 2-1 advantage. The Crimson Wave left no doubt in Game 4, cruising to a 253-158 win to secure the title. 3-1.

Oklahoma Christian's Joshua Imhoff rolled a 300 game and captured the top spot in the men's individual standings, posting a 1,421 six-game total, a 236.8 average. Lincoln Memorial's Michael Rachal finished second with 1,382 and was followed by Lindenwood's Andrew Sacks (1,372), Oklahoma Christian's Larry Butler (1,352) and Calumet's Dylan Dobran (1,330).

In other collegiate action:

- At the East Coast Conference Championships in Mineola, New York, the Chestnut Hill women claimed the victory by 24 pins.

- At the Ohio Bowling Conference III in Columbus, Ohio, the Notre Dame-Ohio men and women swept the top spots.

- At the Kohawk Invite in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, the Mount Mercy women and St. Ambrose men put together impressive wins.

- At the Spring Hill Fall Tournament I and II in Mobile, Alabama, the Emmanuel men and Webber International women finished at the top of the standings in the traditional block, while the Baker standings were topped by the Webber International men and Emmanuel women.

PBA Playoffs Return to Fox April 24th

The PBA Tour's top 16 bowlers to compete for first place prize of \$100,000

NEW YORK, NY - The Professional Bowlers Association has released more of the 2021 Guaranteed Rate PBA Tour season, with the highly anticipated return of the PBA Playoffs on FOX Sports starting April 24th.

The PBA Tour's high-stakes event is back for a third-year in a row with Bill O'Neill and Kris Prather as champions in 2020 and 2019, respectively. The Playoffs will once again feature a \$100,000 first place prize and a title on the line as the Tour's top 16 players compete head-to-head in a bracket style, raceto-two-games elimination tournament. Ties will be determined by a 9th/10th frame roll-off.

The top 16 players will earn their spots in the Playoffs based on 2021 points accumulated at the PBA Players Championship, Tournament of Champions, World Series of Bowling (inclusive of all five events), U.S. Open, and the USBC Masters.

The PBA Playoffs will take place from April 24 -

May 16, location to be announced at a later date. Five Titles Up For Grabs At 2021 PBA World Series Of Bowling

One of the most important stretches of the PBA Tour season is taking place starting March 7th when the 2021 PBA World Series of Bowling gets underway.

JOIN NOW to watch the 2021 World Series of Bowling.

With five PBA Tour titles on the line, including the season's third major, there will be action from AMF University Lanes in Tampa, Florida, every day from Sunday through March 17.

FloBowling will provide live, exclusive coverage of every qualifying and match play round of every event. The finals will be broadcast by FOX Sports (U.S.) and FloBowling (international).

The 96 players in the field will compete for titles in the PBA World Championship (a major), the PBA Cheetah Championship, PBA Chameleon Championship, PBA Scorpion Championship and the Mark Roth-Marshall Holman PBA Doubles Championship.

Kuhlkin earns USBC High Average Award for 2019-2020 season

ARLINGTON, TX -Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour champion and Team USA member Liz Kuhlkin of Schenectady, New York, again finds herself in the spotlight, this time earning the United States Bowling Congress National High Average Award for recording the highest women's average during the 2019-2020 season.

Kuhlkin, a 27-year-old right-hander, averaged 240 for 69 games during the Reis Group Kim Brown Memorial league at Schenectady's Towne Bowling Academy.

The 2018 U.S. Women's Open champion won the USBC National High Series Award during the 2016-2017 season. Kuhlkin set the national record for the highest three-game series by a woman when she rolled games of 300, 300 and 290 for an 890 series.

The men's high average winner for the 2019-2020 season is Charles Easton of Sylvania, Ohio, who posted a 256.5 average for 84 games at the Oakie Schroyer III Memorial league at Jug's Bowling Center in Toledo, Ohio.

Easton's average ranks as fourth on the all-time average list, with Jeff Carter of Spring-field, Illinois, holding the record with a 261.7 average during the 2000-2001 season.

To go along with his 256 average, Easton, 29, averaged 252 in 2017-2018 and 249 in 2018-2019 at the Oakie Schroyer III Memorial league.

Both youth USBC National High Average Awards are headed to Pennsylvania, as Zachary Trimmer of Lebanon and Alyssa Breidegam of Sinking Spring collected the 2019-2020 awards in the Youth Male and Youth Female divisions, respectively.

Trimmer, 19, averaged 235.5 for 84 games in the Dutch Majors league at 222 Dutch Lanes in Ephrata, Pennsylvania.

Breidegam, 18, finished the season with a 227.5 average for 75 games at the Tuesday Jr. Scholarship league at Sinking Spring's Berks Lanes.

Former Team USA member Wesley Low Jr. of Palmdale, California, earns the men's USBC National High Series Award for rolling a 900 series during the 44th Annual Ponderosa Singles Classic at Glenfair Lanes in Glendale, Arizona.

Low, a 23-year-old left-hander who uses a two-handed approach, became the 36th bowler to roll a 900 series, and his performance on July 19, 2020 was the 37th USBC-approved 900 overall.

Angi Whitley of Platte City, Missouri, earned the women's USBC National High Series Award after throwing games of 279, 299 and 300 for an 878 series on Jan. 24, 2020 at Gladstone Bowl in Gladstone, Missouri.

Whitley, 48, put together her series during the GL 11 - Northland Mixer league.

The youth USBC National High Series Awards were earned by Madelyn Lathrop of Sycamore, Illinois, and Cody Brunner of Middletown, Pennsylvania.

Lathrop, 18, won the youth female award after posting her first USBC-certified 800 series with games of 299, 249 and 278 for an 826 set at the Pepsi Zone 1 Tournament at The Cherry Bowl in Rockford, Illinois. Lathrop's performance took place Feb. 29, 2020.

Brunner, 19, rolled games of 300, 297 and 269 for an 866 series to win the youth male award. His award-winning series was Feb. 15, 2020, at the North Scratch 2019-2020 league at ABC North Lanes in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania.

pins in the 10th frame, left the 4-7 on his first shot.

Following the PBA Jr. National Championship victories by Martin and Robarge, Purches teamed with Kyle Troup to win the Pro/Jr. Doubles Championship, combining to roll the first eight strikes in the title match before Purches left a 10 pin in the ninth frame.

Troup and Purches defeated Clara Guerrero and Martin in the championship match. In a five-frame semifinal match, Troup and Purches beat Jesper Svensson and Robarge by two pins, 98-96. Guerrero and Martin were one shot away from five-frame perfection, rolling 148 to eliminate Danielle McEwan and Varano.

The PBA Jr. National Championship began in September of 2020 with youth bowlers competing in five regions around the United States. The top 20 bowlers (two boys and two girls from each region) advanced to match play, held Feb. 20 in Jupiter, Fla. After 10 games of match play, the top seeds from each division (Robarge and Varano) advanced to the televised finals. Their opponents, Purches and Martin, advanced to the finals through a modified stepladder following match play.

done since the face-mask mandate has made him destined for PBA royalty. In addition to his recent win at the PBA Tournament of Champions, he also rolled his second televised 300 game in the 2020 PBA Tour Playoffs and has more than doubled his lifetime earnings that are now slightly above \$350,000.

Many people do not realize how popular bowling is in Canada. That's because there's more than one bowling game! In addition to the recognizable ten pin bowling, there's also duckpins (or petite quills), candlepins, and the extremely difficult five pin bowling that originated in Canada in 1909.

My only exposure with bowling in Canada was in the province of Ontario, where I was involved in a few remodels and grand openings of new facilities for AMF in the 1980's. The one that I remember most was the Grand Reopening of O'Connor Bowl West in suburban Toronto, the precursor to all of the remodels that took place (and continue to take place) in the United States, thanks to the efforts of the Bowlero Corporation and others.

But my fondest memories are at the Grand Opening of Southland Bowl, where the general manager (and professional bowler), Conn Casey, specified that he wanted me to be a part of the festivities; and to roll against my childhood hero, Dick Weber, in an exhibition match. As I reported in a previous article for this publication, Weber "allowed" me to win the match by a few pins (658-647), something that I'm sure he did for me on more than one occasion... including a couple of ties! (Yes, he was that good!).

In addition to the face-mask mandate that could be providing Francois with an enormous amount of encouragement, I also wonder if the Canadian government might be a source of his attentiveness. You see, in Canada, the government income tax is exorbitant when compared to the United States — and especially in Lavoie's home province of Quebec.

While no one likes paying taxes, just take a look at these statistics provided by a computer search of taxes in Quebec, Ontario, and Wichita, Kansas, where Mr. Lavoie now resides. Quebec's rates are the highest, with 16% of income up to \$41,000 going to the local provincial government; and if you're lucky enough to make more, the next \$40,000 is taxed at 20%, with anything over \$81,000 taxed at 25%.

Ontario chimes in with much lower numbers, but still higher than Kansas. Their numbers are 5% (up to \$41,000); 9% for the next \$40,000, and 12% for anything over \$81,000. Compare that to Kansas (6.5%), and you can see that Lavoie just might be applying for U.S. citizenship, if he hasn't already!


