BOND... JULIA BOND WINS FIRST MAJOR AT 2021 USBC QUEENS

RENO, Nev. - Julia Bond of Aurora, Illinois, capped a dominating performance this week at the National Bowling Stadium by winning her first major championship Tuesday at the 2021 United States Bowling Congress Queens.

The 25-year-old right-hander went undefeated through the double-elimination bracket and recorded her second win of the 2021 Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour season by defeating 2011 USBC Queens champion Missy Parkin of Laguna Hills, California, in the title match, 238-154.

Bond claimed the coveted tiara and the \$20,000 first-place prize. Parkin

earned \$10,000 for her runner-up finish.

The finals of the 2021 Queens were broadcast on BowlTV.com.

"This feels great," said Bond, who won her first career national tour title in January at the PWBA Hall of Fame Classic. "It's a very validating feeling to see that I'm on the right path, making good choices and learning. That's been the goal since my rookie season, and this win is very special."

Bond, who had to be defeated twice as the top seed for the stepladder finals in the true double-elimination format, quickly took the lead in the title match, with

CBS Green Lights Tom Smallwood Comedy

CBS announced this week it gave the green light to a series around the life and career of PBA player Tom Smallwood.

In March, news came out that a CBS had ordered a pilot for Smallwood, a comedy based on the life of PBA player Tom Smallwood. This week, CBS announced it has given the green light the series.

Smallwood is planned for a mid-season release with the date to be determined. The multi-camera comedy will star Pete Holmes as Smallwood.



The show will revolve around Smallwood’s personal story of being laid off as a GM factory worker only to chase his dreams as a professional bowler.

Since making that decision, Smallwood has found success on the lanes, winning two major titles along the way.

Smallwood’s story is an inspirational one and one that is well known within the bowling community. However, the opportunity to tell that story to a wider audience while at the same time promoting professional bowling could prove positive for the sport.

Here’s how CBS described the comedy in a news release this week:



It’s not easy to bowl a perfect game, but Tom Smallwood is certainly going to try.

CBS has announced a brand new comedy set for a mid-season debut called Smallwood, based on professional bowler Tom Smallwood’s life.

The series stars Pete Holmes as Tom, a stoic Midwest husband and dad who gets laid off from a car assembly line

and makes the extraordinary decision to provide for his family by following his dream of becoming a professional bowler.

As a skilled player, Tom knows in bowling you get two chances—no matter what you do with the first ball, you get another one to make it right. The ultimate second chance. Keeping that in mind, Tom begins his new career with the loving okay from his wife, Jen (Katie Lowes), and the unfaltering support of Archie (Chi McBride), his mentor and the proud owner of Archie’s Lanes: Home of the Curly Fry.

It remains to be seen if Tom will strike it big on the Pro Bowler circuit, but right now, the pins are set, he’s taking his second shot and it’s 300 or bust!

Mark Gross, David Hollander, and Brian D’Arcy James serve as executive producers for CBS Studios. Mark Cendrowski directed the pilot from a script by Gross.

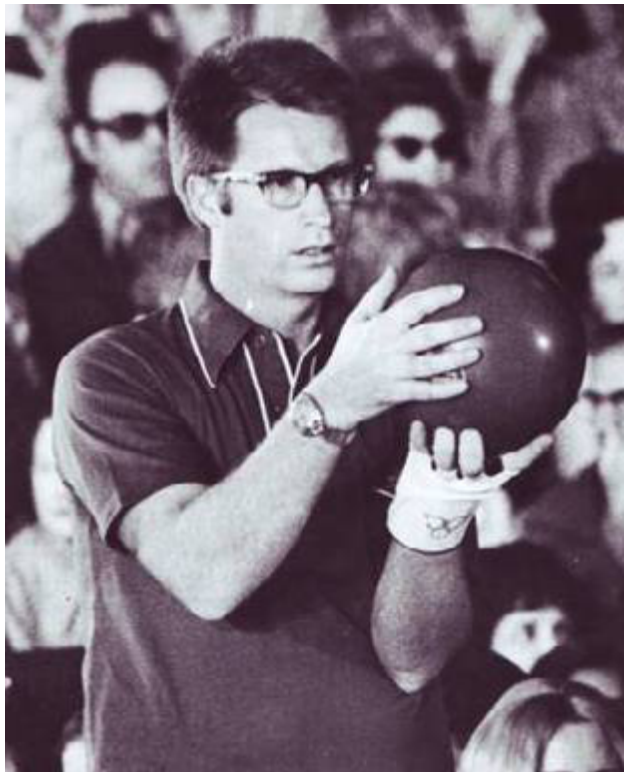

The More Things Change, The More They Stay The Same

vidual tournament sponsors: Midas, Showboat Hotel, King Louie Apparel, Monroe Shock Absorbers, Ford Motor Company, Ebonite, AMF, Brunswick, Firestone, and The Miller Brewing Company, to name but a few.

Today, there seems to be only two major sponsors on the pro bowlers tour - Kia Motors and Guaranteed Rate Mortgage. Although this arrangement appears to be somewhat different than in 1975, the sponsorships that are necessary to improve the prize funds are still there... with an incredible assist from Bowlero, the mammoth bowling center conglomerate that's obviously under-writing the whole process.

What I found most interesting were the player profiles near the center of the publication. Missing from the prominent players were both Pete Weber and Walter Ray Williams Jr., who had not yet begun their illustrious careers. The top player in earnings was Earl Anthony, who had just come off his best year in 1974, with five titles and a total of \$96,160 in earnings.

Earl's total may not seem like a lot compared to the numbers being flashed about today. At last count, Kyle Troup had earned \$469,000 so far in 2021, eclipsing the one year record total of \$419,700 set by Walter Ray Williams Jr. in the 2002-2003 season. However, if you adjust Earl's winnings from 1974 for inflation, that amount equates to \$541,245 (dollartimes.com). Walter Ray's number is not as dramatic in change but does clock in at a record \$618,681 when adjusted for inflation.

Taking a closer look at the player profiles, it is apparent that there's a learning process that must take place before a player joins the elites of the game. In a regular job, it's better known as "paying your dues." Mark Roth provides a perfect example. The talented right handed bowler from New Jersey had five years under his belt at the time of the PBA publication in 1975, and showed a gradual improvement each year: 1970-\$1,132; 1971-\$2,520; 1972-\$12,103; 1973-\$19,900; 1974-\$35,779.

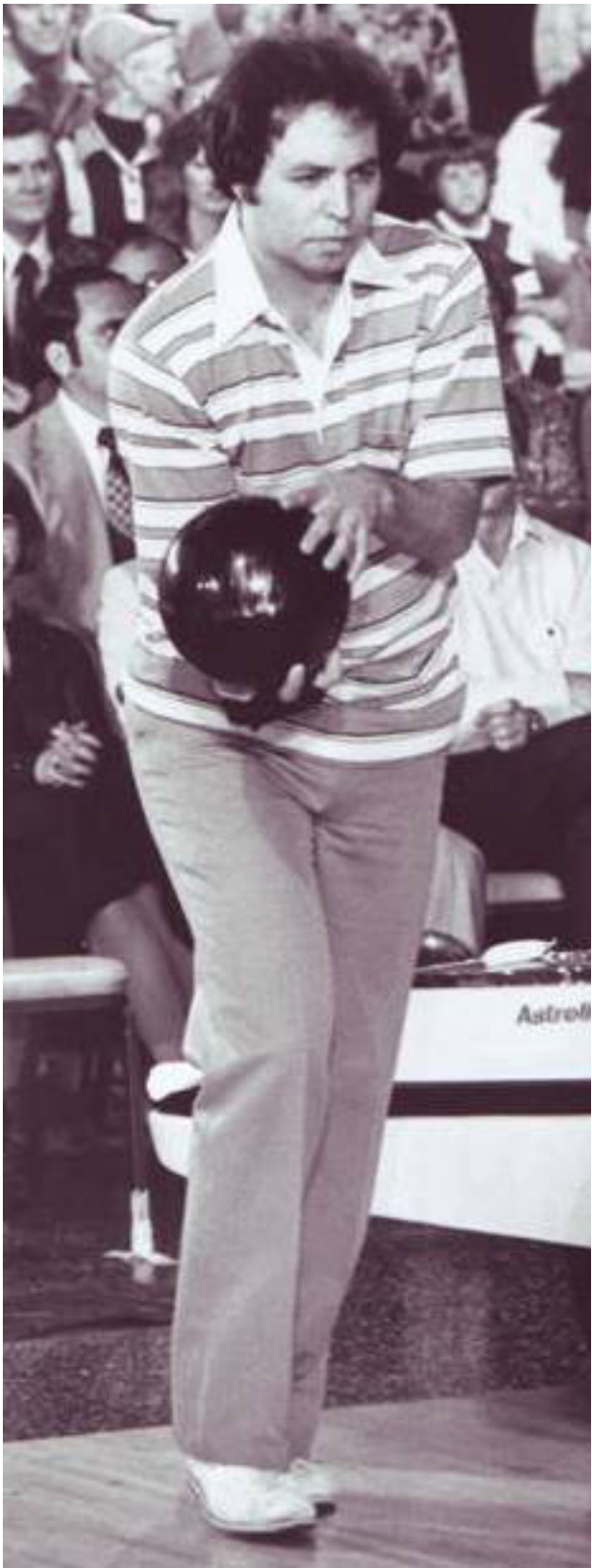
And yet, there are exceptions to this rule. Appearing next to Roth in the yearbook is Eddie Ressler, a nineteen year old from Allentown, Pennsylvania. In only his second year on the tour, Eddie had claimed his first title in the Winston-Salem Classic at Major League Lanes in Winston-Salem, North Carolina. Another exception outlined in the 1975 yearbook is Mike Durbin, who won two titles in his inaugural season of 1967 on the PBA Tour (Tampa, Florida and Youngstown, Ohio), and a total of \$23,035 in earnings (adjusted for inflation, that would equate to \$182,371 today).

Durbin never seemed happy on the tour, often expressing his displeasure with the extensive travel. He originally hailed from Burbank, California, where his parents owned a six lane bowling center. Over the years, Mike tried his hand at managing a very large bowling center for Don Carter in the Fort Worth area, then spent a brief time as the PBA50 Senior Tournament Director, and finally found his niche when he teamed with Denny Schreiner to form what is arguably the greatest broadcast team that bowling has ever known.

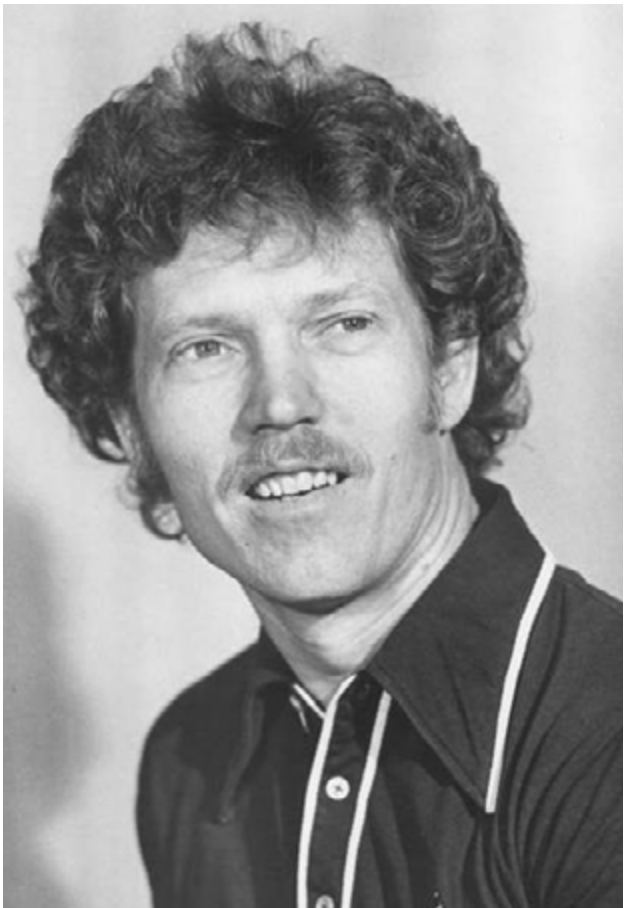
Another similarity that I noticed while thumbing through the pages of the 1975 Yearbook is in the scheduling of televised events. In 1975 the winter-spring events were televised on ABC, which originally began in 1962 as part of ABC's Wide World of Sports. Then in 1974, Home Box Office (HBO) began airing the PBA's Summer Tour with a slate of ten telecasts (ESPN did not begin television broadcasts until 1979 and aired their first PBA event in 1985). Today, it is Fox and Fox Sports (FS1) that have taken the reigns of the PBA telecasts with phenomenal results.

It's too bad that Mike Durbin isn't still competing on the PBA50 Tour. Since most of the events are now broadcast from just a few locations, and then rebroadcast at a later date, one of his major complaints about the travel has been eliminated. And no one was better at framing a shot, and making the same delivery over and over, once he was lined up at one of the tours stops. I'm not sure about Mr. Durbin's health, or even his whereabouts, but if there's anyone that could make a comeback at the age of 80, that person would be Mike Durbin!

RENO, NV - California’s top female professional bowlers showed they are capable of competing and defeating the best female bowlers in the world.

Eight of the 109 entries at last weeks QUEENS TOURNAMENT were from California. All of our ladies bowled well with three cashing and making the cut to the Top 64 and Match Play. Our California ladies finished as follows after 15 games of qualifying:

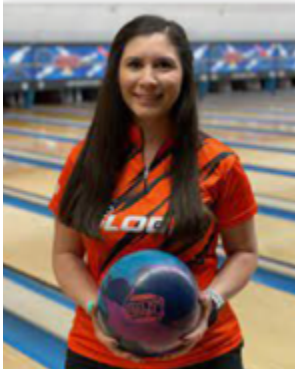

ALEJANDRA URRUTIA was the unluckiest bowler of the week missing the cut by one pin! That’s one pin after fifteen games of qualifying. Making the cut would have meant a check and the opportunity to win the title. Once in Match Play anything is possible. Win six consecutive matches and you would be Top Seed on the step ladder finals. That’s what Julia Bond did after finishing tenth after fifteen games of qualifying.

MISSY PARKIN was California’s Top Finisher ending up in Second Place to Champion Julia Bond. After finishing 44th during qualifying Missy proved she is a great Match Play bowler. She won five one-on-one three game matches losing just one match to Liz Kuhlkin. Missy won matches over Bryanna Cote, Aseret Zetter, Jordan Richard, Lindsay Boomershine and Top Seed Danielle McEwan.

In the four for three semi-final series Missy rolled the Top Series of 688 to earn the third seed in the step ladder finals. Diana Zavjalova rolled 683 for the fourth seed, Verity Crawley shot 598 for the fifth seed while Erin McCarthy shot 583 to be eliminated from the competition.

Missy defeated Verity Crawley and Liz Kuhlkin during the step ladder finals before losing to Julia Bond in the Championship Match. It was a great run for Missy and her best performance since winning the Queens in Syracuse, New York in 2011.

Parkin opening in two of her first four frames.

Bond stayed clean through the first six frames and then tossed six consecutive strikes to seal the victory.

Bond noted how quickly the 42-foot oil pattern was transitioning during her warm-up shots as she waited for the opportunity to start the title match, and she was able to see the path she wanted to take.

“Every time I was able to take a couple of practice shots, I would mark down where I finished,” said Bond, a five-time Team USA member. “When I returned to pair, I would start there and see how much it changed. I think we did a good job of tracking the transition and moves, so it didn’t take me too long to figure out where I needed to be after a few small tweaks. Staying in the pocket was the name of the game.”

The three-time PWBA Regional champion also was able to rely on things she learned Monday in the final match in the winners bracket against Liz Kuhlkin of Schenectady, New York. Bond rolled 257 in the final game of that match after making a jump to the left. She recorded the win and earned the top seed, 663-620.

“In the match against Liz, I had to change my game plan, and it gave me confidence to know I could make the jump into that zone,” Bond said. “I had tried to see what was out farther right, which had been my path to success for most of the bracket, and it looked like by the time it was going to be my turn in the title match, it wasn’t going to look too great. A lot of it was reading my ball motion and trusting what I saw. I made some quick decisions and trusted it, and fortunately, it worked.”

Parkin won two matches to advance to the final, but she also knew she would have to make some moves to stay ahead of the transition in the title match.

Parkin defeated England’s Verity Crawley, 236-220, before striking out in the ninth and 10th frames of her semifinal match to defeat Kuhlkin, 223-211.

Kuhlkin had the chance to double in the final frame to advance to the championship match, but she left a 2 pin on her first delivery.

“They were transitioning very quickly, like they had all week,” said Parkin, who made her third championship-round appearance of the season and collected her second runner-up finish of 2021. “Even before the final match, I had grabbed another bag because I was anticipating what was going to happen. Unfortunately, I made the wrong move to start and didn’t figure them out quick enough.”

The 39-year-old right-hander took away a lot of positives from her time at the NBS, knowing she made some strides in her execution during the week.

“I’m extremely proud of my execution,” said Parkin, a 12-time Team USA member. “Starting the week, I didn’t really have a great look. I ended up drilling a few bowling balls, which made a big difference, and I feel, especially yesterday, I physically executed really well during the matches. I’m very proud with how I bowled this week.”

Tuesday’s stepladder finals started with Crawley defeating Latvia’s Diana Zavjalova, 197-172.

Zavjalova was looking to become the third player to win three Queens titles after capturing the tiara in 2013 and 2017. USBC and PWBA Hall of Famers Mildred Ignizio (1967, 1970, 1971) and Wendy Macpherson (1988, 2000, 2003) are the only players to win the event three times.

The 2021 event started with 110 competitors. After 15 games of qualifying over three days, the top 63 players and Ukraine’s Dasha Kovalova, who was guaranteed a spot in the bracket as the defending champion, advanced to match play.

Kovalova won two matches at the NBS before she was eliminated Monday by Josie Barnes of Hermitage, Tennessee, 629-609. Kovalova finished tied for 25th place.

The PWBA Tour season will resume May 27-29 at the PWBA BVL Open in Farmingdale, New York.


