



Junior Team USA Wraps Up Successful Week at PABCON Youth

Palmdale's Wesley Low Medals in All Six Events Entered

PANAMA — Junior Team USA had a strong showing at the 2015 Pan American Bowling Confederation Youth Championships in Panama, winning eight of a possible 12 gold medals.

The U.S. boys squad dominated the tournament, winning all six gold medals as well as three silver medals and four bronze medals in Panama City. The Junior Team USA girls earned two gold medals, four silver medals and two bronze medals.

"I am extremely proud of this team's performance this week," Team USA head coach Rod Ross said. "The girls fought hard and never gave up, just coming up short at the end in team event. The performance of the boys during the trios and team was inspiring. I have seen many record-breaking performances before, however, the boys were at a level rarely seen, and it was a joy to be part of."

In the final event of the PABCON Youth Championships on Friday, the U.S. boys swept all the medals in matchplay Masters, while the girls took three out of four medals.

Greg Young of Viera, Florida, defeated Michael Tang of San Francisco, 2-1, in the best-of-three Masters final to take the gold medal. Tang earned the silver for the runner-up finish and teammates Kamron Doyle of Brentwood, Tennessee, and Wesley Low of Palmdale, California, shared the bronze medal after losing to their teammates in the semifinals.

In the girls Masters, Sydney Brummett of Fort Wayne, Indiana, defeated Gazmine Mason of Cranston, Rhode Island, 2-1, to win the gold medal. Mason took the silver, while Breanna Clemmer of Clover, South Carolina, and Puerto Rico's Kristie Lopez shared the bronze. Stephanie Schwartz of Racine, Wisconsin, lost to Lopez in the quarterfinals.

The Junior Team USA boys came away with every gold medal, winning singles, doubles, trios, team, all-events and Masters.

Doyle earned the singles gold and teamed up with Tang to win the doubles event. In trios, Doyle, Tang and Low combined to dominate the field to win the gold before joining Young to take the team gold. The all-events gold went to Low.

In addition to the Masters gold for Brummett, the Junior Team USA girls also took the gold medal in singles as Mason turned in a stellar performance.

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DANIELLE DAUGHERTY STEPS INTO PRO RANKS AND MAKES BIG STRIDES

SACRAMENTO - A not-so-funny thing happened to Danielle Daugherty of Fresno in the midst of competing in her first pro tournament - the Professional Women's Bowling Assn. Sacramento Open last weekend at Steve Cook's Fireside Lanes.

One of her shoes fell off. Actually, it was the right heel. And it was torn off - by a fellow bowler who accidentally stepped on it.

What was she to do after she was bowling so well and didn't have another pair?

Fortunately for Daugherty, her coach and significant other witnessed the proceedings and sprang into action.

Said Daugherty: "My coach [Steve Johnson] runs all the way to the paddock area to find Super Glue, runs into the pro shop, gets the shoe glued and runs back to me in time for me to bowl my next turn. I would say it took him about a minute to do all of that.'

Shoe problem or not, Danielle Daugherty showed that she fit in at the professional level. Her total score ranked as high as 16th at one point during Friday's qualifying session in which each of the 80 participants bowled 12 games.

Daugherty, 33, reached that high-water mark by smoking a 248, which included strikes on her final eight shots, in her fifth game. With the top 16 bowlers advancing to match play, Daugherty was right on the cusp of qualifying.

Daugherty ended the first block of six qualifying games in the 25th spot, higher than many Hall of Famers who were competing against her. She, however, couldn't maintain that pace and finished in a tie for 47th, averaging 192.33 for the 12 games.

Still, it was a rousing and encouraging performance because she finished ahead of so many topflight seasoned pros.

'For it being my first pro tournament, I would say I did a great job of staying with the pack," Daugherty said. "I made pretty good shots, lived in the pocket and picked up most of my spares.

"I missed a couple of 10 pins I shouldn't have. In about my 10th game, fatigue really started to set in and I simply ran out of gas."

Elysia Current of Ephrata, Pa., won the title by defeating top-seeded Kristina Wendell of Kingston, N.Y., 246-194, in Saturday's championship match of the four-player stepladder finals before an overflow crowd.

The Sacramento Open was the first regular-season event on the PWBA Tour in more than a dozen years.

Elysia Current, seeded second, reached the championship match by outscoring third-seeded Missy Parkin of Laguna Hills, 248-233, in the second match of the stepladder finals. Parkin defeated Rocio Restrepo of Louisville, Ohio, 216-202, in the stepladder first match.

Current earned \$12,000 for winning the title. Wendell won \$6,000, Parkin \$4,500 and Restrepo \$3,500

Twenty-seven players from California took part in the qualifying round. Besides, Parkin, Kimberly Power of San Leandro was the only other Californian to reach match play. Power finished 15th and earned \$1,550.

Power was one of only two senior bowlers to qualify for match play. The other was Anne Marie Duggan of Edmond, Okla., who finished ninth and picked up \$2,100.

Daugherty bowled with Power as part of a group of five. Another player who was part of that group was Wendell, the top qualifier.

Daugherty said there wasn't much interaction among the five, adding "but from time to time, we all needed a little motivation to keep going so we would encourage each other."

As for Daugherty, it's been an exciting year already. In April, she was notified that she had been selected as captain of the Central California USBC women's all-star team.

The 5-foot-10 Daugherty also blistered a 300 game Jan. 25 at Valley Bowl in Madera. That was a noteworthy event because it was the first sanctioned perfect game by a woman at that bowling center, which has been open for more than 50 years.

Daugherty will be bowling next at this week's Modesto Queens Tournament. She also has plans to bowl in another pro tournament in late August at the PWBA Detroit Open in Canton, Mich.

Said Johnson, her coach: "Danielle proved to herself what I already knew. She can compete with the best women and do so well. Unfortunately, she ran out of gas, which is her coach's fault, a mistake we won't let happen again."

Daugherty drove the three hours to the tournament with her two children and Johnson.

As for the highlight of the event, Daugherty said: "When I turned around after throwing a strike to see my kids hold up signs with words of encouragement on them saying, 'I Love Your Bowling, Mommy,' and 'We Are So Proud of You,' it was a totally awesome moment.'

BRIGHAM CITY, UTAH Storm Products announced this morning that they've agreed to contract terms Sweden's lefthanded, two-hander Jesper Svensson, who will join fellow Swede Martin Larsen as SPI brand ambassadors in their native country.

20-year-old Jesper Svensson, born February 15, 1995 in Vimmerby, Sweden, is a left-handed Swedish professional bowler who holds the Swedish record, 2122 points (with 78 strikes), for an eight-game series. A record he broke when he was just 15 years old. In 2014, Jesper was named to the Swedish National Team.

Svensson the current men's European Bowling Tour points leader, shot a 299 in the early rounds of the III Brunswick Madrid Challenge dominating the tournament from start to finish, claiming a fourth career EBT title. The III Brunswick Madrid Challenge was the 10th stop of the 2015 European Bowling Tour season and the third and last EBT "Silver" tournaments this season. The tournament was held from June 27 - July 5 at Chamartín Bowling Center in Madrid, Spain.

Svensson's win gives him 521 points (100 points/Madrid), putting him in front of Joonas Jehkinen (Finland) at position 2 with 403 points (80 points/Madrid) and Martin Larsen (Sweden) at position 3 with 386 points (60 points/Madrid).

'Jesper is a very talented young man whose stock has been on the rise catching our eye back at the World Championships last year", Storm international sales consultant Wes Pye said. "We've been fortunate to play a small part in his success while getting to know him on a personal level", added Pye. "There are not many left-handed, two-handers in our sport and he (Svensson) along with Wesley Low, Jr., have us beyond excited about the future of our sport from the port side of the lane".

Back in March, the southpaw capped a dominant run claiming another title the PBA-WBT 13th Kingdom of Bahrain Open Bowling Championship at Ozone Bowling Centre in Sitra Mall. The Swede seemed to be in a class of his own as he won Round 2, 3, 4 and 5 finals before beating Jason Belmonte of Australia 258-244 in the stepladder final.

Svensson will now bowl full-time on the PBA Tour including the new PBA Fall Classic October 19-26 and GEICO PBA WSOB VII December 7-19, 2015 in Reno, Nevada. In addition to PBA stops, he will continue to bowl a vigorous international schedule including the JBC Round 1 World Open July 9-16, 2015.

Storm Adds Swedish Two-Handed Southpaw to National, International Staff

All coaches love to be blessed with natural-born athletes; they make championships possible. For the 2014-15 Metro League season here in Erie, the East High School bowling team was blessed to have a young lady with more God-given ability than anyone I have ever met. Unfortunately, her talent had nothing to do with the delivery of a bowling ball.

Her name is Alyssa and she is.....petite. My best guess is 4' 8" tall, 70 pounds soaking wet. She is not a physical specimen capable of overpowering a lane condition. Indeed, some of her teammates are twice her size. I gave Allyssa a lot of credit for joining this team, thinking it was probably her parents idea. Shy and quiet, she seemed the type that doesn't make friends easily. I gave her parents a lot of credit for encouraging her to do so; it's the perfect game for getting timid youngsters out of their shell.

When we first met, she was carrying a tablet. She opened it to display an amazing assortment of drawings. More amazing was the speed at which she created them. In seconds she transformed a blank sheet of paper into an image of a smiling princess in full costume (I wondered if she had joined the team after hearing rumors of free pencils).

As a coach, my job is to develop competitive skill-sets. My first thought concerning this young lady was, "Will bowling damage the fine dexterity required for her artistry?" After all, one of the first tenets of bowling is to use the heaviest ball possible. Of the twelve girls on this "Warriors" team, six compete (based on highest averages). I refer to them as the "A-Team"; the other six are the "B-Team" (developing). Unable to handle even an eight pound ball, Allysa seemed destined for the latter.

Boy, was I wrong! Another tenet of bowling (probably the most important) is that it's a game of skill, not power. Using a ball that weighed merely six pounds, she quickly learned to hit her target with it. She made the A-Team!

Like most of her teammates, she was either new to this game or may have bowled a few times in her life. Any coach will tell you it's a challenge to develop competitive skills in a ten-week season. Incentives help. During practice sessions I offered a homemade chocolate-chip cookie for a mark followed by at least a seven pin-count. Early in this season, I dispensed very few.

The severe lack of experience on this team called for drastic measures. I added another incentive; a new ball, bag and shoes for the first rookie to achieve a score of 175. Eyes lit up. Most vowed to win it, but didn't understand what I was demanding. Achieving that score requires averaging a bit more than a spare followed by a seven-count.....TIMES TEN, IN ONE GAME! (I was pretty sure my wallet was safe.)

Halfway thru the season, Allysa upgraded to an eight pound ball. She needed both hands to control the straight-down push-away and the arm-swing was severely restricted by the demands of the extra weight, but she continued to be accurate with it. Two weeks later she shot a $1\overline{79}!$ I got a hug and her father beamed with pride! It takes a couple weeks for a ball to be ordered, come in and be drilled. By the time Allysa's would be ready, the season would be over. She won't use it until next year. When I reminded her of this, she smiled and whispered, "Can I get a ten-pounder?"

As I said, "All coaches love to be blessed with natural-born athletes." But given a choice between coaching twelve gifted athletes or a dozen Allysas......I'll pick the latter every time! I no longer worry about the effect bowling may have on Allysa's drawing ability. Additional hand strength will produce bolder lines in her art, reflecting the new-found self assurance of this fine young lady.

P.S. At the beginning of this season, "East" was not expected to win a single match. When it was over, we had won one, tied one, and lost one by a single pin. Eleven other girls took part in the success we experienced. Each has her own story. I wonder what effects this game will have on them. One thing is certain; those effects will be positive! That's another reason I call it, "The Perfect Game."

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14 Years Later Olympia Lanes to Host Revival of PBA/PBA50 Doubles Championship Rising stars to team up with established stars live on PBA's Ktra Frame video-streaming channel

HAMMOND, Ind. – After a 14-year absence, the Professional Bowlers Association's top senior and contemporary stars will converge on Olympia Lanes in Hammond Aug. 5-7 for the Xtra Frame PBA/PBA50 South Shore Doubles Championship.

The PBA/PBA50 doubles event, last held in Reno, Nev., in 2001, historically gave the rising stars of professional bowling an opportunity to bowl as doubles partners with "senior" players, many of whom had already achieved hall of fame status. The revival of the doubles event, hosted by a long-time PBA50 Tour host center, will continue that tradition with many of the PBA's brightest young stars destined to bowl doubles with some of the PBA's most highly-decorated champions, including Hall of Famers Walter Ray Williams Jr., Norm Duke, Pete Weber, Amleto Monacelli, Parker Bohn III, Tom Baker, Johnny Petraglia and others.

The competition will be covered live from start-to-finish, exclusively on PBA's Xtra Frame online video-streaming service. In the end, both the PBA and PBA50 Tour partners will be rewarded with titles and shares of the projected \$20,000 first prize.

The last staging of the event, called the National Bowling Stadium Senior/Touring Player Doubles, was won by senior partner Rohn Morton and his Touring Player partner, Parker Bohn III. Morton is now 64 and Bohn is now a PBA Hall of Famer with 34 PBA Tour titles, competing on both the PBA and PBA50 Tours.

In the 14 previous PBA/PBA50 Doubles events, the only players to win a title more than once were New Jersey native Teata Semiz who won in 1986 with Joe Berardi, 1991 with Rick Steelsmith and 1993 with Rich Abboud; PBA Hall of Fame legend Dick Weber, who won in 1989 with Marc McDowell and 1992 with Justin Hromek, and PBA Tour member Rowdy Morrow, who won in 1987 with Mickey Spiezio and 1990 with Hall of Famer Dave Soutar.

The tournament also is unique in that players have no idea who their partner will be until qualifying is over. This year, after practice and pro-am squads kick off the tournament on Wednesday, Aug. 5, all PBA50 players will bowl their first eight-game qualifying round at 8 a.m. ET, and the PBA Tour players will bowl their first round at 3 p.m. Friday, the squads will be reversed, with the PBA players bowling another eight games at 8 a.m. followed by the PBA50 players at 3 p.m.

Then, based on 16-game pinfall totals, PBA50 and PBA players will be paired based upon where they qualifying: top No. 1 qualifiers will become partners, the No. 2 qualifiers from each group will be paired together, etc. all the way to the No. 32 qualifiers (based on full fields of 96 in each division). The top eight teams will earn byes through two single-elimination match play rounds, while teams nine through 16 will earn one bye.

Saturday's finals will begin with best-of-five-game Baker format single-elimination match play for teams qualifying 17th through 32nd place at 8 a.m. In Baker format doubles, each player will bowl five frames to complete a game. Round One winners and qualifiers 9-16 will bowl best-of-five matches at 10:30 a.m., with winners joining the top eight qualifiers for the Round of 16 at 2 p.m. The eight survivors will bowl a best-of-three-game round at 4:30, followed by the one-game semifinal round at 7 p.m. and the championship match immediately following.

For entry information, PBA members and non-members should visit pba.com and look for the PBA/PBA50 South Shore Doubles under the "schedules" tab. The tournament is limited to 100 "standard" and 100 "50-and-older" players on a first-come basis. For pro-am entry information, contact Olympia Lanes at (219) 933-6677. Citrus Heights, CA--The only California stop for the PWBA (Professional Women's Bowling Association) was July 9-11, where they bowled in the PWBA Storm Sacramento Open at Steve Cook's Fireside Lanes in Citrus Heights. A field of 80 women bowlers representing 20 States, 1 US Territory and 5 Countries participated. California had the highest number of players (27). Among the 80 entries was Lake Isabella's Gabriella Mayfield. Mayfield was bowling this event as a Guest and joined 58 others bowling as Guests along with 21 PWBA members to complete the field. Among those noteable PWBA members competing were Lynda (Norry) Barnes, Anne Marie Duggan, Tish Johnson, Diandra Asbaty, Darris Ruffner, Paula Vidad, Leanne (Barrette) Hulsenberg, Wendy MacPherson, Shannon Pluhowsky, Robin Romeo and Missy Parkin.

The excitement was brewing at Fireside Lanes for this event. The 32-lane center was packed and ready to host this prestigious event that is one of ten events on the 2015 Re-Birth PWBA Tour that has \$60,000 in guaranteed prize money per event with a \$10,000 first-place prize. This is the first PWBA Tour since the it ceased in 2003 and was rejuvenated this year thanks to the bowling industry including BPAA (Bowling Proprietors' Association of America).

Event was kicked off on Thursday with a practice session from 5pm-6pm, followed by a Welcome Reception at 6pm. Then an Optional Sweeper of six games was held that night at 7:30pm. Friday started early with another practice session from 8am-9am and the first of two Qualifying Rounds of six games was at 11am. The second Qualifying Round was at 4:45pm. At this point, CUSBC 2015 Hall of Fame inductee, Debbie Ayers, who early shot to the top of the leader board, was hanging in there with the top ten leaders. Then, again at 2pm, the Top 16 had another round-robin Match Play after which the field was cut to the Top 4 finalists who competed in the Stepladder Finals at 6:30pm that night.

When all was said and done, the Top Four Finalists were fourth seed Rocio Restrepo (Louisville, OH), third seed Missy Parkin (Laguna Hills, CA), second seed Elysia Current (Ephrata, PA) and top seed Kristina Wendell (Kingston, NY). Five Bowlers Seek Honda Prize in July 26 Competition

WINNETKA – After more than a year, one month and a few weeks, the winner of Winnetka Bowl's "Win a Honda" tournament will soon be crowned.

Five bowlers will compete at 1 p.m. Sunday, July 26 in the stepladder finals at the Winnetka bowling center in an effort to drive off into the sunset with a new \$20,000 car.

Those five are Kelly Manuel, Mark Alvarino, Patrick Manalo, Tyler Baker, and Shoji Takeshima, who were the last players standing after the June 28 semifinal.

The fivesome posted the highest scores (with handicap) in the 84-player field. Manuel scored highest so she will enter the stepladder finals as the top seed, needing only one victory to take home the shiny red Honda Civic that will be parked outside the bowling house.

Baker, the fourth seed, and Takeshima, the fifth seed, will bowl against each other in the first match. The winner will meet third-seeded Manalo. Second-seeded Alvarino will take on the winner of that match. Manuel will bowl in the fourth and final game of the day, which will be the championship match.

The "Win a Honda" event started June 1, 2014, and picked up qualifiers through its monthly tournaments. Top-scoring individuals from Winnetka Bowl's various leagues also earned their way to the semifinals.

Manuel earned the No. 1 seed when she turned in a torrid effort in the semifinals. She blasted scores of 228, 200 and 235 for a 663 series, five pins above her personal best. Manuel, a 171-average bowler, catapulted to the top spot with a handicap-aided score of 849. Manuel finished 39 pins better than Alvarino, who also turned in a powerful performance with scores of 242, 169 and 267 for a 678 total, 810 with handicap.

Baker had the highest scratch total. He rolled games of 289 (the highest in the tournament), 186 and 221 for a 696 series, or 801 with handicap.

AUSTIN VETETO Del Rosa Lanes Youth Leader

SAN BERNARDINO — Del Rosa Lanes Youth Director LEE FITZGERALD contacted me recently with information about her top youth league bowler. Soon thereafter I had the privilege of meeting her top bowler, Austin Veteto, when he acted as a volunteer scorekeeper at the Citrus Belt Annual Open Tournament.

I am impressed with Austin and let me tell you why. First and most of all he is so composed. As he worked as a Citrus Belt tournament official I saw him exhibit a calm demeanor under pressure. He stayed calm in situations where I have seen adults unravel.

Next, when we spoke I could tell that Austin had an in depth knowledge of our sport. He is familiar with all of todays PBA stars and a fan and student of all without singling out a favorite. Why? In his own words: "because all bowlers have strengths and weaknesses and you can learn from all of them". Pretty profound stuff from a young bowler.

On the lanes Austin is also pretty impressive. He is a seventeen year old senior at Pacific High School with a league average of 212. He recently used his Roto Grip Cell to score a 746 series, his highest three game series to date. His high game is 276, which he bowled with a Columbia Power Drive ball.

Austin's favorite ball is the Ebonite Salute. While his highest scores have been accomplished with other balls he likes the Salute best because it has a snappy hook at the backend.

The young Mr. Veteto started bowling when he was four and a half years old. His aunt, Sherry Sapp, got him started and his parents have been encouraging him ever since. He has always looked at our sport as a vehicle. A vehicle which allows him to have fun, a vehicle that allows him to challenge himself and a vehicle to the thrill of victory. Thanks from Austin goes to his coaches Lee Fitzgerald and Bobby Lyons. He is also grateful that his family supports his bowling pursuits and wants them to know that he appreciates their doing so. Most Memorable Performances in First Half of 2015: Here are 3.

Now that that the bowling season is rolling into the second half of the year, perhaps it's time to pay tribute to the most memorable California bowling achievements of the first six months of 2015. We'll come back at the end of the year and see if any second-half feats can rival those of the first half. It won't be easy. The following three 2015 accomplishments will be difficult to beat. So here is my list of the three most memorable feats so far this year in the Golden State:

1 - March 26: Paula Vidad claims the "triple crown" in senior women's bowling.

Vidad won the title of the 25th National Golden Ladies Classic in a four-day tournament in Las Vegas to give her championships in all three majors in senior women's bowling. She previously had won the United States Bowling Congress Senior Queens championship in 2011 and the Senior U.S. Open championship in 2013 and 2014.

To put this historic feat in context, this was the first time a player had earned this lifetime "triple crown" in senior women's bowling. What makes this achievement even more impressive is that the Golden Ladies field was a star-studded group with Hall of Famers everywhere. Vidad, of Sun City, Calif., notched the Golden Ladies title by outdueling one such Hall of Famer in the championship match.

That was Tish Johnson, the top-seeded player in the stepladder finals who raced out to an early 30-pin lead against Vidad. Undaunted, Vidad put together five strikes in a row beginning the third frame and eventually overtook Johnson in the ninth frame. Needing a mark in the 10th frame to essentially clinch the victory, Vidad rolled a no-doubt-about-it strike and was reduced to tears upon realizing that she had just earned the "triple crown" that she had pursued so vigorously.

Vidad's tenacity was acknowledged by fellow bowler Jackie Wycoff of Campbell, Calif .:

"Paula is a tough competitor on the lanes and a great friend and promoter of everything bowling off the lanes," Wycoff said. "Even though she started the [championship] match with a nasty split, she never gave up. By keeping it close, she was able to come back and win the match."

2 - May 19: Robin Romeo wins consecutive USBC Senior Queens titles.

Less than two months after Vidad turned in a historic performance, it was Romeo's turn.

The Newhall bowler became the first women to claim back-to-back USBC Senior Queens titles, defeating fellow Hall-of-Famer Tish Johnson in the championship match for the second consecutive year.

Making history is nothing new for Romeo.

Three years earlier, Romeo claimed the 2012 U.S. Senior Women's Open title to become the first woman bowler to win both a U.S. Women's Open and Senior U.S. Women's Open championship.

Romeo defeated Johnson with clutch strikes in the ninth and 10th frames. "I was just focused on making the best two shots of my life," said Romeo, who claimed her fifth women's major title.

Romeo was a dominant performer at the 2015 Senior Queens, which was held at The Ashwaubenon Bowling Alley in Green Bay. She led qualifying by more than 80 pins en route to becoming the fourth bowler to win the Senior Queens event multiple times, joining USBC Hall-of-Famers Sandy Postma (three), Shirley Levens (two) and Lucy Sandelin (two).

Said Romeo afterwards: "I still can't believe it happened. It's still a blur to me. It's very exciting."

3 – April 19: Silver Lake (Calif.) Atom Splitters defeat L.A. X to win back-to-back PBA League Elias Cup titles.

This was "The battle for L.A." – for the second straight year. Once again Silver Lake – a neighborhood in the central region of L.A. – took on rival L.A. X for the vaunted Elias Cup, the prize the league's eight teams were chasing. The Atom Splitters proved dominant again with a 5-1 victory. In 2014, Silver Lake defeated the X, 4-2.

The Silver Lake 2015 team sported a considerably new look from its previous championship team. Before the season began, the PBA League forced all its teams to re-draft new rosters from scratch. It was a controversial decision because it was feared that the re-draft would break up the continuity of the rosters and lose the teams' identification with their fans.

Silver Lake manager Mark Baker made some savvy choices in the re-draft, bringing back franchise player Chris Barnes and surrounding him with newcomers Mika Koivuniemi, Dick Allen, Tom Daugherty and Craig Nidiffer.

The Atom Splitters found a winning chemistry and then cruised past the Jason Belmonte-led X in the Elias Cup finals at Bayside Bowl in Portland, Maine.

Though Belmonte is generally considered the top player in the world, Barnes defeated Belmonte, 223-211 in the singles match at the Elias Cup.

In the 2014 Elias Cup, Belmonte scored a 279-259 victory over Barnes in the singles match.

In 2015, Barnes' victory over Belmonte in the opening match of the day seemed to energize his team. It all came together in the Baker Trios when the Silver Lake team of Allen, Nidiffer and Daugherty was nearly perfect in posting a 297-246 victory.

Allen, Silver Lake's anchor who had made clutch sudden-death roll-off shots to give his team wins in both the quarterfinal and semifinal rounds, was named the league's Mark Roth most valuable player.

After this trip down memory lane, I truly do not know why I came into the crazy room to begin with but one thought comes to mind...is bowling addiction hereditary? If it is, I'm sure glad I had the dad I did!

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Teen Masters High School Championships in Las Vegas So. Cal Gal Ashley Dunn Places 5th

LAS VEGAS — Brandon Soedarmasto of Levittown, N.Y., and Brigitte Jacobs of Freeport, Ill., captured the boys' and girls' titles in the Teen Masters Championships at South Point Bowling Plaza Friday, each earning \$7,500 scholarships.

Socdarmasto and Jacobs also earned berths in the Teen Masters Grand Championship match that will be contested as part of the Professional Bowlers Association's PBA Challenge Finals during GEICO PBA World Series of Bowling VII at the National Bowling Stadium in Reno, Nev. The PBA Challenge Finals also will include PBA50 Tour, PBA Regional and PWBA-PBA Women's Regional Challenge matches. The finals will be held on Dec. 19 and will air on ESPN in early 2016.

Soedarmasto, 17, took the lead in the second round of qualifying and never looked back, averaging 231.52 for 42 games while winning 13 of his 18 match games for a 10,114 pinfall total, and a 165-pin margin of victory over Trey Brand of Battlefield, Mo. Brand, a 13-year-old two-handed player, also won the boys' 14-and-under title. Pablo Cerda of Sunrise, Fla., finished third with 9,904 pins, 45 behind Brand.

Soedarmasto, in his fifth Teen Masters, said experience in the past four events was a big help.

"The previous years I wasn't as sharp with my spare game or my mental game, so those were what I worked on the most," he said. "I wasn't really watching the scoreboard, but I was watching the players around me when I struggled to see what they were doing. From block to block, I didn't feel like I was as focused as I needed to be, but when I got the distractions out of my head, I was able to bowl to the best of my ability."

Brand, who bowled in his first Teen Masters, said he didn't expect to win at age 13, but "I was expecting to make match play. I'm happy I did as well as I did."

Jacobs, 17, who trailed Paige Beeney of Salado, Texas, by 181 pins after 24 qualifying games, won 12 of her 18 match games and averaged 207.69 to finish with 9,083 pins, including match play bonus pins, to defeat Beeney by 243 pins in the girls' competition.

"After qualifying, I kept telling myself, you can do it, you can do it, so I just concentrated on making good shots and picking up my spares," Jacobs, a first-time Teen Masters competitor, said. "I wanted to bowl the tournament because the playing field is level with the bowling balls and condi-

tions, and it went really well."

The U14 Division girls' winner was 14-year-old Allie Leiendecker of Wooster, Ohio, the only U14 player to qualify for match play on the girls' side.

"I did a lot better than I thought I was going to do," Leiendecker said. "I practiced a lot on house shots with the bowling balls, but not on the tournament patterns. It worked a lot better than I thought. I did a lot better than I did last year (when she finished third in the U14 division)."

The Teen Masters, created in 1997 by Killer B Promotions founder Gary Beck as an elite challenge for high school age boys and girls, drew an open-entry field of 160 boys and 76 girls to Las Vegas. All qualifying rounds were conducted on PBA-caliber short- and long-oil lane conditions. In match play, the short-oil pattern was applied to one lane and the long-oil pattern to the other. All players were required to use special PBA Skill Balls 2.0 (polyester) and 3.0 (urethane), emphasizing player skills rather than exotic equipment.

Teen Masters champions who have gone on to become PBA Tour titlists include Mike Fagan (1997), Jason Sterner (2003), Ryan Ciminelli (2004), and Jake Peters (2006).
