



2015 WORLD BOWLING Senior Championships To Kick off in Las Vegas

ARLINGTON – The top senior players from 33 countries will make their way to Las Vegas to compete at the 2015 World Bowling Senior Championships starting Monday.

The 2015 event will feature more than 200 men and women age 50 and older vying to take home medals in singles, doubles, team, all-events and Masters competition at Sam's Town Bowling Center.

All rounds will be broadcast live on BOWL.com's BowITV.

The U.S. men's team features Lennie Boresch Jr. of Kenosha, Wisconsin, Bob Learn Jr. of Lantana, Florida, Ron Mohr of North Las Vegas, Nevada, and Johnny Petraglia of Jackson, New Jersey.

The U.S. women's team includes Tish Johnson of Colorado Springs, Colorado, Robin Romeo of Newhall, California, Lucy Sandelin of Tampa, Florida, and Paula Vidad of Sun City, California.

The World Bowling Senior Championships debuted in 2013, also in Las Vegas, and the U.S. squad claimed a total of six gold medals at the inaugural event.

Mohr, a two-time Professional Bowlers Association 50 Player of the Year, is the only returning player on the men's side after winning gold medals in doubles and all-events, while a trio of United States Bowling Congress Hall of Famers, Johnson, Romeo and Sandelin, return for the women's team.

Romeo captured the allevents and Masters titles at the 2013 event, while Sandelin took home a medal in every event, including gold in singles.

Both the men's and women's U.S. teams fell short of winning gold in the team event in 2013. Sweden swept the titles as the U.S. men took silver and the U.S. women earned bronze.

"I was proud to medal in every event, but was a little disappointed we came up short, winning the bronze in the team event," said Sancontinued on page 6

Zavjalova Wins PWBA Minnesota Open

WELCH, Minn. — Latvia's Diana Zavjalova delivered four clutch strikes in the championship match Saturday to win the 2015 Professional Women's Bowling Association Minnesota Open.

Zavjalova, the 2013 United States Bowling Congress Queens champion, defeated Rocio Restrepo of Colombia, 216-208, in a pressure-packed title match at Island Xtreme Bowl.

Finishing the match first, Zavjalova struck in the ninth frame and threw all three strikes in the 10th frame to put the pressure on Restrepo. Needing a double and nine pins in the final frame to win, Restrepo struck on her first shot but left a 7 pin on her second shot to lose.

"I just had a feeling this was going to be my week and it was," Zavjalova said. "I feel like I have been so close and to finally break through and win feels great."

Trailing in the match at the



halfway point, Zavjalova made the decision to make a ball change that ended up paying dividends down the stretch. "I didn't use that ball all week," Zavjalova said. "I was struggling with the transition and I had to figure out a way to strike. So I tried something different and it worked. Go big or go home."

Zavjalova entered the stepladder finals the No. 3 seed and had to win three matches to take the title. In the opening match, she started with the front nine in a 279-205 victory over Kelly Kulick of Union, New Jersey. In the semifinal, Zavjalova blew past Kayla Bandy of Salisbury, Maryland, 247-209.

Zavjalova earned \$10,000 for the title and a spot in the season-ending PWBA Tour Championship presented by GoBowling.com, which will be contested in Arlington, Texas, next month.

At the last PABCON Men's Championships in Las Vegas in 2012, Team USA took gold medals in singles, doubles, team and all-events. Janawicz is the defending singles champion, O'Neill is the reigning allevents champion and O'Neill teamed with Jones to win the doubles gold medal that year. O'Neill, Jones, Janawicz and Kent were a part of the goldmedal winning team.

PBA's 2015-16 ESPN Schedule Kicks Off Live in Prime Time on December 17 36th consecutive season on ESPN includes four major championships, 17 telecasts

CHICAGO – On the heels of a break-out viewership season, the Professional Bowlers Association returns to ESPN for the 36th consecutive year with a live prime-time telecast on Thursday, Dec. 17, as part of a 17-event schedule that includes four major championship live telecasts.

The 2015-16 schedule, released today by the PBA and ESPN, begins with two hours of live coverage of the PBA World Championship from the National Bowling Stadium in Reno, Nev., at 7 p.m. ET on Dec. 17, and concludes with the PBA League Elias Cup finals on Sunday, May 8, from Bayside Bowl in Portland, Maine. In between, the schedule includes three consecutive Sunday telecasts in February featuring live coverage of major championships: the PBA FireLake Tournament of Champions originating from Shawnee, Okla., live on Super Bowl Sunday (Feb. 7) at 2 p.m. ET; the United States

Bowling Congress Masters on Sunday, Feb. 14, at 1 p.m. from Indianapolis and the PBA Players Championship on Sunday, Feb. 21, at 1 p.m. from Columbus, Ohio.

The February schedule concludes at 1 p.m. on Sunday, Feb. 28, with Chris Paul's CP3 PBA Celebrity Invitational which in 2015 garnered the highest PBA TV viewership (averaging more than 1.1 million viewers) for any event since 2012.

Across the schedule, ESPN will provide PBA fans with 30 hours of world-class bowl-

Donald Benner Captures Central Valley Masters Title Aug. 16, 2015 – AMF Southwest Lanes

Bakersfield, CA--Credit his smooth delivery, steady pace and keen awareness to ever-changing lane conditions all added up to a great day of bowling for former local youth standout, Donald Benner, who won his first Central Valley Masters title on August 16th in front of family and his new baby girl, Kiera, at AMF Southwest Lanes.

The Central Valley Masters One-Day Tournament drew a total of 118 entrants (60 in the first qualifying squad and 58 in the second) for their first event back in Bakersfield after holding a couple tournaments up north. This event also had 76 brackets between the two squads which set the pace for a day filled with some great scoring.

Benner qualified second during the first squad using his Venom Shock all five games. He returned in the afternoon after the second qualifying squad had finished to compete in the Top King-of-the-Hill for-16 mat. Using his Hyroad all four games, he had (2) 268 games in the round of 16 and picked up the big split

conversion in his round of 8 and was the first one in the tenth to make it through to the round of 4. A 258 game in the finals sealed the deal for his title. Benner would like to give special "thanks to Zack Newman, Ian Byers and the rest of the Central Valley Masters group for an excellent ran tournament. Handicap/scratch, house/ tough shot, I don't care what you do if you get 100+ entries for a 1-day event, you are doing something right!" Benner won \$1,000 for his title plus a beautiful trophy.

Other honor scores shot at this event were (1) 300 game shot by Kiel Jordan and an 827 series shot by Zack Newman and an 808 shot by Andrew Svoren.

The next Central Valley Masters event is scheduled October 17-18 at Regency Lanes in Bakersfield. It is the CVM 2015 Open and will have a Team event, Doubles event and Singles event with \$2,000 guaranteed for 1st place Team, \$1,000 for 1st Place Doubles and \$500 for 1st Place Singles. Teams will be comprised of 4-person teams.

Entry fee will be \$30 per event per person. Optional Side Pots and Brackets also available. They will also be running an Optional 3-Game Sweeper that Saturday night at 7pm. The flyer for this event is posted on their Facebook page and you can download this form off of the website. They are currently taking early entries and this event is on a first-come, first-serve with full payment (check or money order is the only form of payment accepted at this time). If you are paying by check or money order, payment and entries must be received at least two weeks in advance (by Oct. 2) in order for these payments to clear before event. 1943-1944 BLASTS FROM THE PAST (Volume III)

NORWALK - Jumping to 1944 we noticed that "places to bowl" were named either ALLEYS, CENTERS, BOWLS, RECREATION, ACADEMY or PIN PALACE. The builders choice.

Acme Beer was a big advertiser. 82 years old and "the beer with the high I.Q.'

A Long Beach center advertised "Out of Gas? The Red Car Stops at the Corner." I remember my dad owned a Mobile Gas Station during the war. Only farmers and doctors got gas. 19 cents a gallon plus a gas stamp. He traded our gas (we didn't have a car) for eggs, chickens, etc. Even squirrel, rabbit or fish.

Over 300 service men and women were sent the Bowling News every week (thanks to bowlers donations). Almost as good as a letter. Wonder if there were any SECRET MES-SAGES in the stories ??? 150 Bowling Alleys received papers also.

Ping Pong was added to the sports available at Cinema Sport Center. Singles and Doubles tournaments weekly.

Premier Rec advertised "SCORE CAST". Does anyone know what that was? Call me!

The BOWLERS VICTORY LEGION was on the job. (We now call it B.V..L.) In 1944 \$70,000 was raised by bowlers for the over-seas recreation fund. League bowlers pledged 5 cents each per week. 100,000 decks of cards and 25,000 fishing kits were purchased by those nickels from 132 city associations.

Mrs. Jeanette Knepprath, President of W.I.B.C. christened the first A 20 HAVOC BOMBER - "MISS W.I.B.C.". The bomber was purchased by women bowlers, and was used as a flying ambulance.

NEW MOTTO FOR BOWLING NEWS:

KEEP 'EM FLYING — PINS AND PLANES"

A Bowling Pin signed by numerous movie stars was auctioned off for \$130,000 in war bonds. The money went to "Bomber Bonds". Another event "NAME A BOMBER" raised \$194.368

Auction items at fund raisers helped sweeten the pots. A ham went for \$1,100.00 A goat skin wallet, \$1,000.00. Another \$1,000.00 bought a bowling shirt. The prize of the night were pairs of women's silk hose. \$500.00 a pair!

Oh Boy! Another great beer ad. "Put Eastside on the Inside". Buy quarts in the glass bottles, help save metal".

Here's one you would NEVER hear after the 1950's. "BRING YOUR OWN PINSETTER AND SAVE 5-CENTS A GAME." Professional pinsetters were often older, homeless, men who actually lived behind the pinsetting machines. Bunk beds were provided and sometimes a meal or two. Alcohol was a problem!

Help Wanted ads were run when big tournaments were scheduled. "Regulars" could survive being a pinsetter male and females. They could even "knock over an extra pin" for a prize!! How about the pin boy who added the colored pins in the right hole at the right time??

I'm sure some old timers have good stories. Ask a bowling friend about the "olden days". We love to spin a yarn!

NEW! A tournament challenge, called the California State Singles. Four centers were picked to hold the event. Simple rules. Bowl five games in each center. Winner from each center competed in a roll-off. Entry fee \$8.00.

The Lockheed Aircraft tournament drew 1,500 entrants. Popping into action was Clubs - 500, 200, and 700 both male and female. Seems like there were just as many women bowlers as men. Equal leagues and tourneys. No mention of kids playrooms yet. With so many husbands in the service, women had a chance to participate in a sport formerly dominated by men.

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2016 USBC MASTERS MOVES TO INDIANAPOLIS, **SENIOR MASTERS HEADS TO LAS VEGAS**

ARLINGTON - For the first time in more than 40 years, the United States Bowling Congress Masters will head to Indianapolis when the 2016 event is held at Woodland Bowl, and the 2016 USBC Senior Masters is set to take place in Las Vegas.

The 2016 USBC Masters, a major event on the Professional Bowlers Association Tour, will take place Feb. 7-14 at the 80-lane Woodland Bowl. The center has been the site of more than 30 PBA Tour events, including the 2015 Barbasol PBA Tournament of Champions.

"In recent years, we have seen interest in the Masters grow with sold-out fields and millions of television viewers." USBC Executive Director Chad Murphy said. "Woodland Bowl in Indianapolis provides a great venue in the heart of the Midwest to keep the momentum for another successful Masters in 2016."

The USBC Masters first was contested in 1951. It's only appearance in Indianapolis was in 1974, when the event took place at the Indiana Convention Center alongside the USBC Open Championships.

Competitors at the Masters bowl 15 qualifying games over three days before the field is cut to the top 63 players, plus the defending champion, for double-elimination match play. Match play continues until five players are determined for the stepladder finals.

In 2015. Australia's Jason Belmonte became the first bowler in the 64-year history of the Masters to win the event three consecutive times. Belmonte beat AJ Johnson of Oswego, Illinois, 202-157, in the title match at The Ashwaubenon Bowling Alley in Green Bay, Wisconsin.

The Senior Masters will be held June 19-25 at the 56-lane Sam's Town Bowling Center in Las Vegas. The tournament made its debut in 1993 and uses the same qualifying and match-play format as the Masters.

In 2015, USBC and PBA Hall of Famer Amleto Monacelli of Aventura, Florida, beat fellow hall of famer and top seed Pete Weber of St. Ann, Missouri, twice - 192-190 and 254-243 - to capture his third PBA50 major title.

Pete Weber Dominates Statistical Categories On His Way To a Milestone PBA50 Player of the Year Season

CHICAGO – It hardly seems possible that Pete Weber, in his 35 years of PBA competition, had never won PBA Player of the Year recognition despite a Hall of Fame career that included 37 PBA Tour titles, a record-tying 10 majors including a record five U.S. Open titles, and nearly \$4 million in career earnings, among his most notable accomplishments.

But during the 2015 PBA50 Tour campaign, at age 52 and in his third campaign with the 50-and-older generation, Weber finally had the breakthrough season he had pursued ever since earning PBA Rookie of the Year honors as an 18-year-old in 1980.

Thanks in part to his win in the 2015 Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open, along with a runner-up finish in the United States Bowling Congress Senior Masters, Weber dominated the PBA50 earnings, average and competition points standings to earn the 2015 PBA50 Player of the Year crown, the first PBA Player of the Year honor of his illustrious career.

"Marshall Holman wasn't here to take it away from me," Weber said kiddingly when referring to the 1987 Tour season when he finished second to Holman in PBA Player of the Year voting, the closest he had ever come to that goal.

In 1987, Holman earned the award based largely on seven championship round appearances including three runnerup finishes and leading in average and tournament points, but he didn't win a title, while Weber won his first Tournament of Champions title and led in Tour earnings. "It took me 35 years to do it, but I've got a Player of the Year title. PBA Tour or PBA50 Tour, I don't care. I'll take it,' said Weber, who will turn 53 on Friday (Aug. 21). "I didn't have a lot of wins this season, but I had a lot of top finishes and I did well in the (PBA50) majors, which was good enough to achieve another goal in my career."

Weber's Senior U.S. Open title win was the fourth PBÅ50 title of his career and his second major to go along with his USBC Senior Masters title in 2013. With his Senior U.S. Open win he joined fellow Hall of Famer and 2014 Senior U.S. Open winner Norm Duke as the only players to win U.S. Open titles on both the PBA Tour and PBA50 Tour. During the 2015 season, Weber also finished second in the Treasure Island Resort & Casino Open and Johnny Petraglia BVL Open, and third in the PBA50 Miller High Life Classic. His seventh-place finish in the season-ending DeHayes Insurance Group Championship gave him enough competition points to secure PBA50 Player of the Year.

Weber led the seasonlong points list with 239,964 points. Second was 2015 PBA50 Rookie of the Year Mike Scroggins with 207,108. Scroggins was the season's only three-time winner, winning the DeHayes Insurance Group Championship, Johnny Petraglia BVL Open and UnitedHealthcare Sun Bowl In The Villages.

Weber also led the PBA50 Tour in average (227.82 for 327 games bowled), edging fellow Hall of Famer Parker Bohn III who ranked second bowling at a 227.54 scoring

pace. Bohn was a two-time winner, capturing the seasonopening Pasco County Open and the Treasure Island Resort & Casino Open.

Weber, who won the earnings title with \$36,875 over runner-up Amleto Monacelli's \$33,675, tied with Scroggins with most championship round appearances (five) and tied with five other players with most match play appearances with nine.

Another player who had a hallmark season was Hall of Famer and four-time PBA50 Player of the Year Tom Baker of King, N.C., who earned his first PBA60 Player of the Year award for players 60 and over. Baker had five top-10 finishes including a third-place finish in the UnitedHealthcare Sun Bowl in The Villages and a fourth in the Miller High Life Classic.

The top eight players in competition points earned paid entries into the GEICO PBA World Series of Bowling VII in Reno, Nev., in December along with berths in the PBA50 Challenge Finals qualifier which is part of WSOB VII. The eightgame head-to-head match play qualifier will determine two finalists who will compete in the PBA50 title match which will be televised by ESPN on Jan. 24, 2016. The qualifiers are Weber, Scroggins, Bohn, Walter Ray Williams Jr., Monacelli, Brian LeClair, Jack Jurek and Bob Learn Jr.

The winner of the PBA50 Dick Weber Sportsmanship Award, selected by PBA50 Tour players, will be announced later.

LAS VEGAS - South Point Plaza and Lanes hosted the just completed Military Vets Team Classic with nearly four hundred teams participating. There were several teams competing from the Citrus Belt and dozens more from California.

A team from San Bernardino, The Few and The Proud, was the top finishing foursome from the Citrus Belt. The team was led by Joseph De La Torre to a sixth place finish and a \$2,500 check.

De La Torre's teammates were Robert Dowell, Rodney Johnson and Ted Tedford. The foursome rolled a scratch score of 2531 and handicap total of 2852.

De La Torre rolled a solid 692 scratch series and 773 with handicap. Joseph's score was bowled in the new South Point Plaza on a 41 foot oil pattern considered challenging by most of the competitors I spoke to. Joseph's performance doesn't surprise me. He is a seasoned tournament competitor with a smooth con-



sistent game. He is a certified bowling coach who is familiar with bowling adjustments and is quick to make such adjustments when he is bowling.

The top overall tournament competitor from the Citrus Belt was Larry Stephens. Larry placed first, fourth and twenty-third in mixed doubles. He placed 51st in singles, 35th in regular doubles and 15th in the second sweeper. He also cashed in All-Events. His total winnings exceeded \$1,000 excluding his bracket winnings.

Some other SoCAL cashers include Therese Lloyd Weiler (Singles) and Jim Sorrels (Doubles). Scott and Teresa Poddig led a team from Bowlium Lanes, the Bowlium Brats, to a 34th place finish. Not bad when you realize there were nearly four hundred teams competing. Teresa also cashed in No Tap Singles.

Here's a Bowling Terminology Quiz

To enrich one's bowling experience, it's often helpful to know the jargon that other players toss around.

- For instance, if a player's first shot leaves the 3-4-6-7-9, one often will hear a remark that the bowler will now have to deal with "grandma's teeth." And those in the know will chuckle along with the quipster.
- So what is "grandma's teeth," and what are some of the oftenused bowling terms and their meaning?

To answer those questions: the very first Bowling Terminology Quiz.

But first, here's some bowling humor to get you in the mood of taking this quiz:

"When bowling, remember you don't have to join the union to be striking.'

Now that you're ready (hopefully!), here goes the very first Bowling Terminology Quiz:

1 – What is "Grandma's teeth?"

- a) A random group of pins that is left standing from one end of the lane to the other.
- b) A split that occurs after a slow-moving and lightweight ball enters the "mouth" of the pins.
- c) A straight-on shot typically rolled by a senior bowler with little "bite" to it.

2 – What is a "clean game?"

- a) A game in which a player finishes without an open frame. b) A game in which a team "throws in the towel" and
- concedes when it falls too far behind its opponent.
- c) A game in which a player shoots 10 open frames.

3 – What is a "field goal?"

- a) A score of three pins in a frame.
- b) A ball rolled between two pins of a wide split without knocking down either pin.
- c) When a player kicks the ball return after a poor shot.

4 – What is "smashmouth" bowling?

- a) Rolling a blazing fastball at the head pin.
- b) Bowling before the pins are re-set.
- c) When a bowler's shot results in the chipping of a pin, which then has to be replaced.

5 – What is a "garbage hit?"

- a) A direct hit on the head pin on a strike ball that nets only five pins.
- b) A hit that causes a pin to wobble but not fall.
- c) A badly thrown shot but one that still results in a strike.

6 – What is "throwing rocks?"

SAN BERNARDINO – Is there such a thing as a homelane advantage?

Ron De Maio of San Bernardino certainly made a case for it this month. De Maio, 77, won a West Coast Senior Tour title at his home grounds at Del Rosa Lanes in San Bernardino.

It was the 11th WCST championship for De Maio, who also won a WCST title in San Bernardino (San Hi Lanes) in 2000.

"He's been bowling there [Del Rosa] since junior leagues," said Dick Sanders, the WCST's owner and director, "and that was 99 years ago."

De Maio is the oldest bowler to win a WCST tournament, Sanders said. The tour is in its 23rd year.

De Maio's previous WCST title came in August 2011 in the San Bernardino County city of Fontana. De Maio ranks in a four-way tie for 12th in all-time WCST championships. Kevin Gannon of Lakewood, who did not bowl in the San Bernardino event, is far and away the WCST leader with 45 titles.

De Maio was the eighth and final qualifier in the 31-player field in the 60-and-older tournament. He averaged 225.5 during the eight games of qualifying. Russ Davies of Las Vegas averaged a scorching 245.4 to rank as the top qualifier.

But in a sign of things to come, De Maio scored a narrow 202-200 victory over Davies in the first round of double-elimination match play. De Maio finished with five victories in

avenged a second-round loss to Craig Kisro of Granada Hills by upending Kisro, 255-214, in Round 5. That victory allowed De Maio to reach the finals in which he needed to beat thenundefeated Chip Willett of San Diego twice to claim the title.

And that's what De Maio did, scoring a 256-253 victory in Round $\hat{6}$ and then winning, 225-206, in the match that gave De Maio the crown.

"We had a good crowd," Sanders said, "and they were all of Ron's relatives. Everyone knows him there."

De Maio rolled seven perfect games at Del Rosa Lanes from 2006 to 2011.

He earned \$800 for winning the WCST title. Willett picked up \$615 for finishing second. Kisro (\$515) took third, Davies (\$415) placed fourth and Jim Lesiuk of Rancho Cucamonga (\$350) and Mike Rick of Redlands (\$350) tied for fifth.

Alvin Lou of El Cajon (\$300) and Jim Sheppard of Highland (\$300) tied for seventh.

Davies and Rick were the lone left-handers in the tournament.

The most exciting match of the day was the first championship match between Willett and De Maio. De Maio missed a 10-pin spare in the 10th frame, leaving the door open for Willett to win the title by one pin if he could roll three strikes in the 10th.

Willett nailed a strike on his first shot, then rolled another strike on his second. But Willett mustered only a six count six matches. on his final shot, leaving him three pins short - and De Maio in his final three matches: He with the home-lane victory.

delin, who became the first U.S. woman to win the QubicaAMF World Cup in 1976. "As with previous Team USA events, winning the gold medal in the team event is always our ultimate goal. We've had two years to compete at various events and have seen each other's game and plan to share our knowledge with each other to play the lanes smart. The bond and respect we have for each other should help us combat any challenges that come our way.

Singles, doubles and team competition at the 2015 World Bowling Senior Championships will consist of six qualifying games to determine the four players who will advance to the championship round. The combined qualifying totals from singles, doubles and team will determine medalists for all-events.

So you've followed the five bowling guidelines provided by Star Lanes in Royal Oak, Mich. – the ones that guarantee a perfect game – and you've still failed to bowl that 300?

And perhaps you haven't even come close.

Well, the reason could be that Star Lanes may not have provided the complete answer when it declared that it possessed the formula for reaching that glorious perfect game.

Star Lanes said unequivocally that a bowler could expect to "have that perfect game in no time" by adhering to its sure-fire suggestions.

To refresh, Star Lanes said a bowler must: 1 - Pick the right ball. bowler who has rolled five perfect games. Perhaps his crowning achievement came three years ago when he crushed a certified 800 series (818: 276, 276, 266) at AMF Woodlake Lanes in Woodland Hills. And he did it at the age of 62.

So Rick definitely has the credentials to opine on matters as what it takes to roll a 300.

Rick, via email, said Star Lanes "forgot to mention BY FAR the most important step. MENTAL TOUGH-NESS. Most bowlers' minds won't let them bowl a 300 because the closer they get, the farther they get mentally. Just my opinion."

Soon after Auerbach made those comments, two area bowlers – Frank Martinez Jr. and Mike Weekley – smoked 300 games. It was the ninth perfecto for Frank, the 10th for Weekley.

Both bowlers are as nice as they come off the lanes. But while they're in the midst of their perfectos, one can view the focus and determination in their eyes. When they get close to that 12th strike for a perfect game, their expressions make it clear that they won't be denied.

They definitely have mental toughness.

That makes for a winner and a 300 bowler.



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Liz Rogers Enjoys a Memorable 'Thirsty Nite Out' at Winnetka Bowl

WINNETKA – So what was all that fuss about last week at Winnetka Bowl?

That was an outpouring of affection for Liz Rogers, who was celebrating her 80th birthday. Rogers, who has been bowling for 50 years and has been the beloved secretary for four Valley-area bowling houses, was toasted by dozens of fellow bowlers and friends during Thursday's "Thirsty Nite Out" league competition.

"I was shocked and surprised. I was just standing there and the whole bowling center stopped and sang 'happy birthday' to me. It really touched me. It was really neat," said Rogers, who was draped with a pink sash that read, "Birthday Princess."

Rogers is currently serving as secretary of the "Thirsty Nite Out" league. "Liz is the sweetest ever," said Amy Lew, a top bowler in the league. "She takes care of everyone and has the biggest heart. She's the sunshine of our league."

The right-handed Rogers averaged in the 180s in her heyday and still averages a more-than-respectable 159 in the "Thirsty Nite Out" league. "That isn't bad for an 80-year-old," said Rogers, laughing.

She finished her Thursday night action with a stirring 178 in her third and final game. "And I had an open in the 10th," Rogers said.

Rogers, a Woodland Hills resident, has served in key administrative bowling positions throughout the years. She was president of the San Fernando Valley women's bowling association and a board member of the Los Angeles men's bowling association in the '90s. And at the start of the new decade,



All the while, she worked as the league secretary at now-defunct Granada Bowl in addition to AMF Woodlake Lanes in Woodland Hills, Corbin Bowl in Tarzana and Winnetka Bowl.

As secretary at each of the centers, she diligently worked to expand membership. Granada Bowl was just one example. "Granada Bowl was a big center with 48 lanes," Rogers recalled. "The league got so big, we had to cut it into two and call it '1A' and '1B.' "

Among her bowling achievements, Rogers remembers, are a few 600 series along with a 250 game. But she downplayed her bowling achievements in relation to the social benefits of meeting so many people through the years.

"In the 'Thirsty Nite League,' so many of us have bowled together for so many years that each week it's like meeting family," said Rogers, tracking the league's origins to the 1970s at Woodlake Lanes.

Rogers has gotten a firsthand look at the top Valley bowlers through the years. One who made an impression on her was Kelly Gold, who has bowled eight perfect games, including back-toback 300s.

"She was just a natural bowler," Rogers said. "She came in as a brand-new bowler and in her first season, she was averaging 200. I had never seen that happen where someone could just walk in and do that."

Asked about her goals now, Rogers, a retired schoolteacher, cited one.

"As I was blowing out the candles," Rogers said, "I wished for another 10 years [in bowling]."

Her image is as clear to me now as the first day I saw her and because of that, I often wonder how my little sheep see me.

All in all, it was a grand experience and I suppose I am living proof that she did her job well. I fell in love with the sport and a few fellow team mates along the way. Nothing could make me trade this time of my life for anything...except maybe being a really outstanding bowler.
