

Gerry Manalo Wins \$7,800 & 2nd ABTA Title For His Superb Performance at CAL Bowl

LAKEWOOD — Super CAL BOWL was our host this year for our Annual Labor Day Event. It was a Good One, as 493 entrants came to compete and had fun in the process. The cut scores were Daily separate boards, and results of Thurs., Friday and Saturday are in the Standings in this paper. Sunday however saw Cut Scores of Men +71, Women +61. Re- Entry Squad was Men +73 and women +52. Also added Super Seniors Jim Smith +60 Fred Ringor +60, and Roger Romero +55 (men), Joyce Charles +55 and Teresita Abing +29. We now enter the semifinals with 78 Bowlers.

Top Qualifiers in the event were Ramon Alliman (men)+178 and ladies were led by Emily Yeung +122. Each get a paid entry to a future regular ABTA Event.

Ramon drew for the Match Series, worth a nice \$1,730. He drew a 449. Three bowlers matched that score, Carolyn Rousseau, Ken Seiple Sr. and newcomer Thurman Ashley in his First Event.

We estimate the pot at \$2,200 Saturday as there is a \$430 Carryover! In the 3-6-9 Roll-off worth \$3,000.

Kelly Wynn was last stand-

ing and unable to get the five 9 counts or better. So we are still at \$3,000 Saturday at Chaparral Lanes. Mr. Wynn got \$100 for Beer Money as a consolation.

In the Mystery Doubles, 1st were Dave D. Godinez and Henry Sanchez \$100 with Ramon Alliman and Lee Li 2nd 494 and \$80. 17 places were paid the Mystery Doubles, 100% payback of \$880. Low to cash is 454.

The Semifinals took to the floor and after the three games we saw Gerry Manalo lead with a huge +184. Right behind was Scott Johnson at +142. Gerry will sit out and bowl for the Title with Scott entering in the second round of the Elims.

Gerry had the honor of drawing for the Match Game pot worth \$3,845. Four of our regulars, Will Samson Anthony Borci, Tony Jilek and Ben Bagaoisan hit the 137 Game 3 and took home a nice \$961 each. We estimate the Match Game at \$1,900 Saturday.

The finals began and the 15 losers in Round #1 got checks of \$210 and in Round Two eliminated were Florinda Rosario, Rachel Macias, Roger continued on page 5

PBA's 50th Anniversary Tournament of Champions Highlights ESPN Schedule

Live coverage of three major championships on tap as 34th season on ESPN begins on December 14

SEATTLE – The Professional Bowlers Association's 34th consecutive season of coverage on ESPN begins on Sunday, Dec. 14, and includes 16 weeks of national television coverage for the world's best bowlers, including live coverage of three major championships: the 50th anniversary Barbasol PBA Tournament of Champions, PBA World Championship and United States Bowling Congress Mas-

ters.

Paul PBA Celebrity Invitational. Over the course of the season, PBA competition will be seen by more than 50 million bowling fans across North America and in selected markets around the world.

The broadcast team of Mike Jakubowski, color analyst Randy Pedersen and sideline reporter Kimberly Pressler will return to handle ESPN coverage. Pedersen, a 2010 PBA Hall of Fame inductee, returns to the broadcast booth for the 14th consecutive season. Pressler, Miss USA 1999, made her debut as PBA's sideline reporter during WSOB II in 2010. Jakubowski, the voice of PBA's Xtra Frame, is back for his second season as ESPN play-by-play announcer. The highlights of the 2014-15 schedule will be the historic 50th anniversary PBA Tournament of Champions, sponsored by Barbasol and hosted by Woodland Bowl in

Indianapolis, along with PBA World Championship finals from South Point Bowling Stadium in Las Vegas on Sunday, Jan. 11. The five players who qualify for the World Championship stepladder finals during GEICO PBA World Series of Bowling VI at South Point in late October will return to Las Vegas for the live telecast.

The USBC Masters finals from Green Bay, Wis., on the Sunday preceding the PBA Tournament of Champions cept for the four PBA animal pattern championships which will be four-player, one-hour shows, and the Chris Paul PBA Invitational, which will be a 90-minute telecast in its traditional timeslot on Super Bowl Sunday, Feb. 1. Eleven of the 16 telecasts will begin at 1 p.m. ET, and the Jan. 25 telecast of the World Bowling Tour Men's and Women's Finals presented by the PBA will air on ESPN2.

SEATTLE – Effective September 2, the Professional Bowlers Association will enter into a shared services agreement with Luby Publishing, publisher of Bowlers Journal International and other periodicals, and move its operational headquarters to Luby's home in Chicago, Commissioner Tom Clark announced today.

The move, Clark said, is designed to improve the organization's operational efficiencies, taking advantage of Luby Publishing's expertise in membership services. The PBA will sub-lease space in the Luby Publishing offices and use Luby's staff for many of the PBA's day-to-day operational needs. The PBA will retain its IT staff and services in Seattle. "The PBA has been a pioneer in the virtual office arena ever since it moved its administrative office from Akron, Ohio, to Seattle in 2000," Clark said. "The organization has successfully functioned with key staff members living in areas across the United States ever since. We anticipate there will be no major change in the way we do business other than having

a new mailing address." Putting the PBA and Luby Publishing together in the same office space unites two of the oldest business entities in the sport. Luby began publishing Bowlers Journal magazine in 1913; the PBA has provided competitive opportunities for the best bowlers in world and mass-media coverage for the sport since 1958. We are happy to assist the PBA by sharing our office, as well as in sharing some of the operational duties to the benefit of both companies," said Keith Hamilton, president of Luby Publishing. "The pro-cessing of the PBA memberships is nearly the same as the processing of circulation for LPI's magazines." Barb Wilt Retires After 44 Year Career of Service to PBA and its Members

SEATTLE — In the 56-year history of the PBA, there is no one who has personally experienced as much of the history and evolution of the sport's professional organization than Barb Wilt, who will bring her 44-year career with PBA to an end when she retires

Wilt began her career with PBA in a clerical position in July 1970 when PBA's offices were located in Akron, Ohio, and there were just five people working in the office. Over the next 44 years, she created a legacy of service to the organization and its members.

"It's impossible to thank Barb Wilt enough for her professionalism, reliability and talent over an amazing career with PBA," said PBA Commissioner Tom Clark. "Without ever having thrown a ball in competition, Barb has been the heart of the association and no one has meant more to the enduring history of the PBA.'

It was an employment agency ad that led Wilt to the PBA for a job that involved public relations.

"Public relations," she laughed, "meant running press releases on the mimeograph machine and stuffing them in envelopes and then mailing them."

Over the years, Wilt processed all PBA Tour entries and payments, sent out membership and media mailings and became involved in keeping tournament and player stats which would become increasingly important with the development of the senior and regional tours. Part of her PBA experience was not working for the organization, but helping PBA founder Eddie Elias with his Eddie Elias Enterprises clients and projects.

'Eddie represented a lot of people in entertainment and sports," Wilt said. "He would get scripts and unpublished books and he would pay me on the side to read them and tell him what I thought. I got to meet movie and TV stars, professional golfers, and, of course, the greatest bowlers in the world.

"I always loved bowling," she added. "I watched it on ABC before I started working at PBA, so I was really excited to get to meet all the bowlers. I think of all the things I've done, being part of the PBA School was really high up on my list. More recently, seeing PBA's growth internationally, changes in technology and to see people like Jason Belmonte and Osku Palermaa revolutionizing the sport with their two-handed delivery have kept working with PBA very interesting to me." In retirement, Wilt will continue another important role - as a grandmother to eight-month-old Will - when she moves to Asheville, North Carolina to be closer to her daughters Angie and Amanda (who lives in Carrollton, Ga.) and their families. She also plans to do some volunteer work with the Asheville Humane Society. If there was one guiding principle Wilt had throughout her career it was the dedication to customer ser-Last Weeks Solution vice. "I would often get the same question a hundred times, but I had to make each person or player feel like they were getting the best part of me and they were getting the best service possible," she said. "You have to always remember that these were people who cared a lot about the sport and it was their passion, and in many cases their dream.'

2015 PBA League Draft Set for Live Xtra Frame Coverage on October 31

Team managers to draft new rosters during PBA World Series of Bowling VI in Las Vegas

SEATTLE - Who will be the first player selected when the Professional Bowlers Association conducts its 2015 PBA League Draft on Friday, Oct. 31, during the PBA World Series of Bowling VI? Reigning Player of the Year Jason Belmonte? Hall of Famer Pete Weber? A left-hander, right-hander, budding future star?

A live international audience watching the third annual PBA League draft on PBA's online bowling channel, Xtra Frame, will be the first to know as eight team managers select all-new team rosters in preparation for the PBA Tour's first-ever visit to the state of Maine.

The eight-team PBA League will compete in two days of team competition for delayed telecast on ESPN on Saturday and Sunday, March 28-29, at Bayside Bowl in Portland, Maine.

The PBA League in 2015 will feature the same eight teams it fielded during its first two seasons, but the only thing about the teams that will remain the same is their names and team managers. After a random draw to determine the draft order, managers will fill their rosters with five players who will compete in Maine in two days of intense competition featuring Baker-format elimination rounds leading to the Elias Cup Finals. The Elias Cup will be decided by points earned in singles, doubles, trio and Baker team matches.

Highlights of the 2015 program include:

• The 2015 draft will be held on Friday, Oct. 31, during PBA WSOB VI at South Point in Las Vegas and carried live on PBA's Xtra Frame online bowling channel. Team managers will be: Mark Baker (defending Elias Cup champion Silver Lake Atom Splitters), Carolyn Dorin-Ballard (GEICO New York City WTT KingPins), Johnny Petraglia (Brooklyn STyLES), Norm Duke (Dallas Strikers), Tim Mack (Pittsburgh Jack Rabbits), Jason Couch (Philadelphia Hitmen), Andrew Cain (L.A. X) and Del Ballard Jr. (Barbasol Motown Muscle).

• Players eligible for the 2015 PBA League Draft will be the top 50 in PBA Tour competition points between the 2013 World Series of Bowling V and the 2014 Oklahoma Grand Casino and Resort Summer Swing, plus any player who was on a PBA League roster for 2014, but didn't qualify based on points (see the complete draft-eligible player list below).

• For the draft, eligible players will be ranked based upon their position on the points list. The first player elected by each team must be taken from the group of players ranking 1-10 on the points list. The second player drafted will come from the group ranked 11-20 in points, plus any undrafted players from group one. The third player drafted will come from those ranked 21-30 in points. The fourth player will come from those ranked 31-40 in points, and the fifth player will come from the players ranked 41-50 and previous team members not among the points leaders. Players undrafted in each round will be eligible in the following round, expanding the pool of players as each round continues. The draft exception will be Dallas player-manager Norm Duke, who finished 39th on the points list, will draft himself in the fourth round.

• The only draft-eligible woman on the list is Colombia native Clara Guerrero, who last year became the third woman in history to bowl in a nationally-televised final when she qualified for the PBA Cheetah Championship stepladder in WSOB V, eventually finishing fourth.

• Draft-eligible players must declare their desire to participate in the PBA League. Players may begin declaring for the draft on October 1. The deadline to declare is October 15.

• A random draw will determine the team draft order. The draft will then be conducted in "serpentine" format whereby Team No. 1 will pick first in the first round and last in the second round, and Team No. 8 will pick last in the first round and first in the second round, etc.

In the 2015 PBA League playoffs, players will compete for a projected \$250,000 in prize money.

The three-day visit to Portland will include a day of practice and pro-am activity where Maine adult, youth and senior league bowlers will have a chance to bowl with the stars of the PBA, followed by two days of Baker-format team competition for delayed telecast on ESPN. The quarterfinal round will include four best-of-two-game Baker team matches, with all five players bowling two frames per game. The four winning teams will advance to the two-game, Baker format semifinal round which will produce two winners to bowl for the Elias Cup.

The Elias Cup will be decided based upon total pinfall for a singles match (with 10 bonus pins to the winner), alternate-shot doubles match (15 bonus pins), trios match (20 bonus pins) and five-player Baker team match (50 bonus pins).

• ESPN will televise the PBA League quarterfinal, semifinal and Elias Cup Finals on four consecutive Sundays, March 29, April 5, 12 and 19.

The Perfect Game by Steve Feleg

Part 2

Editors note: In the Aug. 21 edition of the Bowling News we published a thought-provoking article submitted by Lance Pound titled, "Low Scoring Drives Bowlers Away." Last week Steve and I discussed the frustration caused by lane conditions. Afterward we continued the conversation about its effect on bowling participation. It went something like this:

Carol: Steve, Lance has considerable experience with our sport and blamed low scoring conditions as contributing to the decline in the number of bowlers. I have my own thoughts about that, but nobody listens to me. What do you think?

Steve: I think nobody listens to me either!

Carol: I have a newspaper to fill up, so you've got to do better than that!

Steve: Okay, but remember, you asked for it. That article opened a real "can of worms" because every lane condition is frustrating to someone; some patterns more than others. But let's be honest, bowlers are always complaining about something and making excuses. Those who don't are the ones who quit.

Carol: Can you explain that?

Steve: Sure. As I said last week, bowlers get frustrated and angry because they still care. They get mad at themselves because they know they can do better. They are the ones who keep coming back to get better. Bowlers that don't get mad have lost their passion for the game, and I don't believe it has anything to do with oil.

Carol: You don't think low scoring conditions are causing bowlers to quit?

Steve: Low scoring will cause bowlers to quit going to certain tournaments or houses. It will not make a bowler quit bowling.

Carol: So......what do you think is the real cause of the decline Lance mentioned?

Steve: Our culture is changing and bowling isn't keeping up. As Lance noted, scoring conditions are just one piece of the puzzle. Understanding the larger picture is key to reversing that trend.

Carol: Well, let's give that a shot.

Steve: Okay. First we need to look at why people bowl. Then we'll look at why they stop bowling.

Carol: That sounds simple, but I don't have room to list all the reasons people bowl! Everyone's different.

Steve: True, but bear with me. Why did you start bowling?

Carol: Well, because my friends and family bowled.

Steve: Bingo! If somebody you know bowls, the more likely it is that you will be introduced to it. Family outings, youth groups, churches, school and other social functions serve as a doorway to this sport. In other words, the biggest reason people bowl is simply because they were introduced to it.

Carol: Oh, baloney! A lot of people are introduced to bowling but never come back!

Steve: We're not talking about them. We're only discussing bowlers; the ones who do come back.

Carol: Fair enough. Why do some keep coming back?

Steve: Again, the individual reasons don't matter. As a species, we seem to be hard-wired to play this sport. Its premise has an almost universal appeal.

Carol: Why do you say that?

Steve: Because it's been around, in some form, for over 5,000 years and, it's global! It's had a long and glorious past and I feel confident stating that it will have a long, glorious future.

Carol: Okay wise guy, if we're hard-wired for this sport, why are so many people quitting?

Steve: People have always left this game for one reason or another, so a better question may be, "Why are more people leaving the sport than taking it up?"

Carol: Okay, "Smart-Alec," why is that!

Steve: Sounds to me like a marketing problem.

Carol: You think marketing can turn the numbers around?!

Steve: It's the logical place to start. Look at what marketing has done for golf, soccer, NASCAR, baseball and the list goes on.

Carol: I've always wondered how people can sit and watch those . They're boring on TV. At least with bowling, you're actually doing something.

Steve: Unless you're watching it on TV!

Carol: I can never find it!

Steve: Me either!

Carol: You know what I miss most about watching bowling?

Steve: No. What?

Carol: The good-guy versus bad-guy matchups! I was always on the edge of my seat for those!

Steve: You mean like Earl Anthony going against Mark Roth?

Carol: Oh, man! What I wouldn't give to see that kind of bowling again!

Steve: Maybe the new pro teams will morph into something like that.

Carol: I'd watch that!

Steve: Exactly! If marketers can get people excited about watching paint dry, imagine what they could do for bowling! Carol: But bowling isn't boring!

Steve: No it isn't, but it has never really had to make much of an effort to promote itself. It was a family tradition, leagues were full and self-perpetuating, the pros were on TV and millions were watching! Open bowling was at a premium.

Carol: Those days are gone.

Steve: And they won't be back, but we're not discussing that, we're trying to figure out how to get more people to participate. Carol: Marketing?
