Chris Barnes Makes National TV Appearance

NEW YORK-Chris Barnes, six-time Denny's Professional Bowlers Association (PBA) Tour titlist, appeared live on ESPNEWS Tuesday, October 11 at 5:50 p.m. EST.

Barnes, who won last season's 62nd U.S. Open presented by Odor-Eaters for his first career major title, will be interviewed live at the ESPN Zone in Times Square in New York City where he is taking part in a media tour. The tour is a joint effort of the PBA and the United States Bowling Congress (USBC) to promote the upcoming 2005-06 Denny's PBA Tour season as well as the season's first major event, the USBC Masters in November.

Barnes (Flower Mound, Texas) had another strong season in 2004-05. He won his sixth career title and his first major in North Brunswick, N.J., in a thrilling 213-212 title-match win over eventual 2005 PBA Player of the Year Patrick Allen. The win gave Barnes a three-season exemption on the Denny's PBA

The 1998 PBA Rookie of the Year, Barnes also finished the season 2nd in the 2004-05 PBA World Point Rankings and his \$194,300 in season earnings ranked 3rd. Barnes finished the season on a high note, winning the season-ending PBA Motel 6 Roll to Riches presented by GEICO, a special event that awarded Barnes a PBA record \$200,000 top prize. The 2005-06 Denny's PBA Tour season begins with the 2005 Tulsa Championship October 26-30 in Owasso, Okla. The arena finals will be telecast live on ESPN Sunday, Oct. 30 from the Donald W. Reynolds Center in Tulsa, Okla.

SEATTLE-After missing the last two events of the 2004-05 Denny's PBA Tour season with a shoulder injury, Weber showed this weekend he's healthy and ready to return to form in 2005-

Weber won the PBA Midwest Region Knittig's Bowl Open last weekend, holding off fellow exempt bowler Steve Jaros in the title match, 258-244.

The regional title was the 34th of Weber's career and his first since 2001. His 65 career total PBA titles (31 Denny's PBA Tour and 34 PBA Regional Tour titles) ranks 2nd behind Walter Ray Williams Jr., who has 66 (40 Tour, 26 Regional Tour). Williams won two regional titles this summer.

Louisiana Bowlers Talk About Their Horrifying Experience Surrounding Hurricane Katrina

LOUISIANA-What was it like leans in 1969 and has lived there her to live through the biggest national disaster in U.S. History? We can't tell you because we only experienced it from afar. But for our great friends Page Dew and Shannon Duplantis, it hit much closer to

Page Dew, a silver level U.S. bowling coach, is a fifth generation New Orleanian who now lives with his wife Patsy in Colorado, but he grew up in the beautiful Garden District of the Crescent City. He spent the final week of August trying to find more than two dozen relatives still living there. Patsy's family is in the Baton Rouge area, and she reports that, thank God, all are safe; but for several nervous and anxious days, no one knew their status.

Shannon Duplantis is the undisputed best woman bowler ever from the state of Louisiana, with five PWBA regional titles, including the prestigious PWBA Regional Players Championship. In 2000, she won the WIBC Bev Ortner Award for a national high score of 867. It was the best of seven 800's she has rolled. She also has 22 perfect games. She is a former Player of the Year and Rookie of the Year in both the Southeast and Southwest PWBA regions, and won the coveted Southwest Sportsmanship Award. She is the current President of the New Orleans Women's Bowling Association. Duplantis was born in New Or-

entire life. She shares a home with her parents, Lorraine and Gene Duplantis in the Bywater section of the city, aptly named because it is surrounded on three sides by the river, the lake and the canal. She has a BA degree from Loyola University where she works as a head cashier in the Bursar's Office. She has been working at Loyola for the past seven years. Her best bowling friend Judy Vogel, who is also a PWBA regional champion, has been working at Loyola for 31 years. She lives in Slidell which was also devastated.

We thought about writing a story about this horrible storm and inserting a few choice quotes from our Louisiana friends, but their stories are so compelling and filled with very justified emotions; we couldn't possibly convey it properly - so here is a first-hand account of what those terrible days were like for two New Orleanians, in their own words.

Next month, we'll have an update from both, and add more chapters in the months that follow. As this goes to press, Judy Vogel and the Duplantis family are fleeing their temporary homes in Houston to get away from another category five storm, hurricane Rita. Neither has seen their home since evacuating before Katrina. Our prayer is that they will be able to return soon and start rebuilding their homes and their lives. — Jim Goodwin

A Little History, Honesty and Worry from a Fifth Generation New Orleanian

I am originally from New Orleans, my wife, Patsy is from Baton Rouge. On her mother's side, the Duvics, are from Baton Rouge, but many of her father's people, the Terrebonnes, live not far from Grand Isle where hurricane Katrina struck Louisiana. The Terrebonnes have experienced many hurricanes, so they tend to leave when they approach. We assume they followed their usual precautions. All of the Duvics are safe.

For the past week I have been working the phones and the internet trying to locate my relatives. I have six first cousins, 15 second cousins and numerous third cousins who live in the Orleans, Jefferson, St. Bernard, and St. Charles parishes. So far, I have located all of my first cousins and it appears the rest of the cousins are safe. As with every family from that area my people are now scattered across the South. One of my cousins is a retired police officer and has a police ID which allowed him to return September 6 to Metairie where he lives. He was lucky, he only has about 6 to 9 inches of water in his house. He lives in an area that never floods (Not counting this time) I expect him to be able to return permanently once essential services are returned to his neighborhood.

What we are seeing is what every native New Orleanian, such as I, has known since they were born, that is the City is not a safe place at any time, but especially when a hurricane arrives. The dirty little extended secret New Orleans officials never want to admit is the City has not been a safe place since its founding in 1718. Flooding has been ongoing for centuries, the last the result of Hurricane Betsy in 1965, which I witnessed. In 1927, New Orleans was also a victim of a flood that encompassed the entire Mississippi Valley, witnessed by one of my cousins. Over the centuries, diseases such as yellow fever, and cholera have decimated the Isle of Orleans. Crime has always been a part of the City. Violence, including murder, is embedded in its historical fabric. The looting and other crimes we have seen on television is not a surprise. I have warned visitors that planned (prior to the "Perfect Storm") a visit to "The City that Care Forgot" to be careful and not to venture away from the star city attractions. My family has been there at least five generations, so we understood and understand the benefits and hazards of living in America's most unique city. Those who chose to live in the Crescent City are now living a nightmare scenario. I am very lucky to have been born and to have been a part of the culture of the area. I am also fortunate to now live in Colorado, high,dry and safe.

Race relations in New Orleans have always been different from the rest of the country. Slavery is an ugly scar upon the South, yet New Orleans was different even during that period. New Orleans people of color fought on both sides during the War Between the States. Many blacks in New Orleans have French names and are Catholic, unlike in other Southern states. The University of New Orleans, Tulane, Loyola, Dillard and Xavier Universities are well-known educational centers with prominent alumni. The leadership of the City has been African-American for approximately thirty years. Few racial incidents have occurred since desegregation began with the 1954 Brown vs Board of Education Supreme Court decision. The city has been majority black for several decades. A large Vietnamese population can also be found in East New Orleans.

Already the finger pointing has begun, but it is a useless endeavor. The fact is every level of government failed the people of South Louisiana. As a Republican I would love to say the current administration is not culpable, but I cannot. The President's leadership network has performed poorly, both Democratic and Republican Congresses have ignored the obvious flooding dangers for years, even decades. Many local and Louisiana State authorities were slow, incompetent or both. The political structure of the area has been corrupt forever, leading to poor service. You can think of the New Orleans and Louisiana political framework as a house of cards. When any stress is put upon it, it falls, and it was no match for Katrina. On the positive side, cudos to the state of Texas, particularly Houston and Dallas, our military (Thank God for General "Kick Ass" Honore) bless the U.S. Coast Guard, the Red Cross, The Salvation Army, our churches and individuals who have opened their homes and hearts to others. The real test will come over the months and years to come. It is easy to provide for others for a few days or weeks, but after a while the providers will run out of patience. What then? The future is not bright for my home state, contrary to what our politicians have opined. I do not believe the city of New Orleans or the area down the Mississippi River will ever return to a place of prominence. Those with little before the storm will not return. Why should they? The city itself will again rise from the waters, but not as before. The next census will definitely tell the story far better than mere words. For many years I lived and worked in Baton Rouge, our State

Capitol only an hours drive west of

New Orleans. It is a diverse city with

It is home to refining and chemical

I Prayed To God To Let Us Get Through This Hurricane Safely

August 26 - Life seemed normal on Friday night as I bowled in my Patio Mixed League at Colonial Lanes in Jefferson, LA. As my fellow teammates and I discussed our plans for the weekend, we discussed whether or not we thought the hurricane would come our way. Many of my teammates thought that this was going to be the "Big One" that everyone warned us about, but I hoped and prayed that God would spare us once again. Little did I know that Hurricane Katrina had plans of her

own and had my home in her sight. August 27 - Saturday morning, I had attended a fundraiser breakfast at the Treasure Chest Casino in Kenner with my local women's bowling association. As we were eating breakfast, we started to hear announcements made by the Treasure Chest that they were closing the second and third decks of the casino. As I heard these announcements, I wondered if they knew something that the local citizens didn't know. While watching everyone move to the first floor, one could see the fear among the citizens. Various televisions were reporting local broadcasts of Hurricane Katrina's projected path and giving mandatory evacuation notices

As I drove home from the fundraiser, I was stunned to see the amount of traffic leaving the city. I could not believe that the lines to the gas stations and banks were miles long. Stores of all types were closing early and boarding their windows and doors. Having never experienced a hurricane of this catastrophic strength before, I felt a fear starting to build inside of me. I tried not to reveal this fear to my family because I wanted to remain strong for them. My family and I went to mass and our mass celebrant dedicated the mass for our city's protection. While at mass, my fear of this hurricane was growing stronger and stronger. Later that night, as I watched the latest forecast models and the hurricane's movements, I knew we were going to experience the worst. My parents did not want to leave, as they had experienced Hurricane Betsy and Camille and had very little damage. They felt certain that we were going to be fine. August 28 - Sunday morning,

more mandatory evacuations were given, and then I heard the worst...a mandatory evacuation of Orleans parish. My parents still did not want to evacuate their home; they felt it was not necessary. My imagination began to soar as I feared the unknown. Many of my friends started to call me to ensure that I was going to evacuate with my family. The more calls I received the more my fears grew. A close friend, Johanna Clark, called and asked me to evacuate to the 12-lane Pine Tree Lanes bowling center that she manages in Picayune, MS. She was concerned about the high tidal surges that were going to come from the hurricane. I convinced my family to do so at the last minute since we are surrounded by three bodies of water...the Industrial Canal, the Mississippi River and Lake Pontchartrain. My mom, dad and I packed up the car with our immediate necessities including a cockatiel and a four-month-old puppy. My sister and brother-in-law came along with us and transported

my cat as well. Eastbound traffic on the twin ans to the Slidell are congested and even more so since contra flow was in effect and drawing to an end. My dad knew various backstreets to the area and we were able to get to Picayune within two and a half hours. This drive normally takes fifty minutes from my home on a good day. Once I arrived at the bowling center, various businesses were boarding up and lines to the gas stations began to form for blocks long. Thoughts went through my head as to whether or not, I was getting my family far enough to safety or was I taking them from the frying pan into the fire? I hoped and prayed that the building was sturdy enough to withstand the hurricane. Nightfall approached and squall lines from the hurricane began to come through the area. As the night progressed our eyes were glued to local television broadcasts with their updates of the hurricane August 29 - Around daybreak on Monday, the winds were getting stronger and the squalls were getting bigger and bigger. We eventually lost power to the center around 7:30am. The winds were getting stronger and stronger and the rains were falling

harder and harder. As I watched the

heavy rains fall and the grey clouds

move in, I prayed to God to let us

get through this hurricane safely. We could hear tree limbs and various items blow across the tin roof of the bowling center; which seemed to us as if the roof of the center was tearing off. At times, it sounded as if someone was bowling on the roof. Sounds of freight trains started through the area; therefore, I knew somewhere close tornadoes were touching down. Time went by so slow and when the winds and rains started to settle, the next band of rains seemed to come down even heavier. Trees were blowing over and falling down. Many of these trees were uprooted with the cement still attached. I never dreamed that strong winds could cause that much

damage. Late morning approached and it seemed that this was going to be the worst of the hurricane. Ceiling tiles within the building were being sucked in and dropped down as if the ceiling tiles were breathing on their own. The air conditioner units, smoke eaters and ceiling fans began shaking back and forth. More and more sounds of freight trains coming through were getting closer and closer. Then all of a sudden, it sounded as if the whole roof was being torn off and we all ran for cover into the bathrooms. My family and I began saying the rosary to spare the lives of the small children that were with us at the center. Their ages ranged from seven weeks to three years old. The winds had to have been at least 160 mph. Objects were flying all over, signage from various businesses were torn apart, shingles from homes and anything that the hurricane wanted to toss in the air. I have never seen anything like this in all my life. I have witnessed gusts of winds, but none with the power and strength as these. The building next door had 15 feet roll up aluminum doors; which the wind literally destroyed. Segments of these doors were all over. While watching all this happen, all my family and I could do was pray.

Soon the rain and winds began to calm down while the eye of the storm passed just south of us. As we went out to access the damage to our building and the buildings around us, we noticed a gas leak in the area. Then the bowling center started to take in the gas smell. We called 911 and were told that someone would be sent out after the hurricane...no sooner. Thank God we had a plumber with us who waded through the waist high water, found the gas leak and turned the meter off. At this time, we lost all land and cell phone lines. Talk about feeling trapped and lonely. We noticed the buildings on the sides of the bowling center were heavily damaged. The damages sustained to the surrounding buildings were as if tornadoes ripped through the area. I guess that was the freight train sounds that we heard while the hurricane was approaching. Thank God none of those destroyed our building.

After about an hours break, the winds and the rain began again. This time it wasn't as bad as before. I could handle winds and rains of this type. About an hour later, the sky became normal again. I looked into the sky and began to see beautiful blue trying to peak through the grey clouds. This was truly a sight for sore eyes. Even though the hurricane left a devastating mark on Picayune, MS, I thought for sure I would be able to

So many horror stories being broadcast and no means of communication with the outside world were driving me crazy. As I sat and watched the tears fall from my parents eyes, I prayed to God asking how could this happen to us. I thought God would always be there to protect us and not let anything like this happen to us. My family has always taught me though that God does everything for a reason. One may not know the reason now, but God would make it known. For three nights, my family and I slept in the pit of lanes 9 and 10 and each night I cried to sleep for I knew the life I was accustomed to would be no more.

August 30-31 - The next two mornings as one looked at the sky, they would have never known that a hurricane came through the area, but when you looked on the ground, the visible evidence was everywhere. My mind could only imagine the damage that was done in my neighborhood, especially my home. Would life ever be the same for us again?

My family and I stayed at the bowling center until Wednesday afternoon. Being an avid bowler and loving the sport so much, when someone asks me if I could live in a bowling center, I now have a different thought of that question. The days seemed to go by so slow and the normal everyday commodities that each person takes for granted were missed so much. Trying to feel fresh was just not going to happen. Desperate measures caused me to use a garden hose outside to wash my hair to feel somewhat refreshed.

September 1 - Thursday morning, we decided to leave Picavune and headed for Houston. I had no family members in the Houston area, just some friends. My family and I had to go somewhere because at this point, we were homeless. That night, we stayed in the reception area of a banquet hall in Tomball, Texas, managed by Joanna Clark's sister. The next morning, the game plan was to search for an extended stay hotel or even an apartment because we were not sure how soon we would be able to get back into the city. Many hotels were already booked and many companies started to rent apartments for their employees to relocate. After going through various pages in the phone book, we came upon an apartment that would be willing to take my family, including my animal family.

Various tasks were set before me that I never thought I would have to undertake before in my life. Visit-ing a Red Cross Shelter for registration was something I never thought I'd have to do. But each step of the way, so many people were caring and helpful to my family. I guess you could say that their outpouring of caring and love made the bitter pill easier to swallow. In all my 35 years, I've never had to nor thought I would have to apply for food vouchers. To me, this was so humiliating to do, but money was really short, especially when all you had is the clothes on your back when you left home. As frequently as I pack when I travel, I never dreamed when I packed to leave for the hurricane that I would be displaced from home for so long.

September 12 - It has been two weeks since the hurricane and I am still living in Houston, TX. When I will be allowed to go home is still not in my control. From watching the news broadcasts, water is still being pumped out of the city of New Orleans at a rate of 4 to 5 inches per day. Officials estimate the first week in October to have all water pumped out. Then I am sure, government officials will have to decontaminate the city and clean the area before we will be allowed home. Life will take a long time to get back to the way that I was used to living. As much as I love bowling, that will have to take a side burner right now especially since all of my equipment is home under water. There are other things that will be taking priorities in my life. Especially, rebuilding my home, which I am sure, will have to be done. I know the upcoming months will be rough on my parents since they have 47 years of memorabilia to go through, but with the grace of God and the support of great friends, my family and I will endure. September 20 - I am currently working in a satellite office for Loyola University at the University of Houston and now have another hurricane to contend with. I just started to feel settled and safe while away from my home and now I may be on the run again. Will the running ever end?

make my way back home to New Orleans soon....or so I thought.

That night we hooked up generators to supply the bowling center with fans, radios and lights for the evening. While listening to a local radio station, we heard the most horrific news of all, the news that the levee systems in New Orleans had breached in three places causing the "the New Orleans bowl" to fill. This was everyone's worst nightmare. The levee had breached at the 17th Street Canal and then on the New Orleans East side of the levee, which caused the water in Lake Pontchartrain to be equal to the water in the city of New Orleans. Soon the levee breached at the Industrial Canal, which flooded homes from Arabi to Violet, Louisiana. These waters surpassed many if not all roofs in the area. As I heard this news, I felt so lifeless. Then we hear that the major roadways to the east, the Twin Span bridges were de stroyed. The water and winds eroded the spans in sections. Hearing news of this nature just caused my heart to sink. What was going to be left to the city that I called home, would my home still be there? To top off our night, 2 young men tried to steal our generators. They weren't successful.

Yep. Like...three ER visits, stays at two hospitals, plus a pair of jolly stopovers at the Guantanamo Rehab Center in LV. It has been a 5-month spree we'd gladly rent out. Not near 100% yet, but we seem to be gaining, slowly.

Golly, the Kingpin Million Dollar Challenge has been "postponed". That went belly-up was no surprise to this author. Slated for the National Bowling Stadium in Reno the last week in October, the event was supposedly gonna pay a million bucks to the winner and a guaranteed prize return of between \$1.4 and \$2.2 million, depending on your source, or the number picked from a hat for that day.

The Kingpin was to have six separate divisions, apparently, each with an equal number of entrants, and they would bowl as individual tournaments...the winner of each division would meet on TV for a one-game shot at a mil. Swell. Check out the divisions: Seniors, women, three "age" groups, under 30, 31-44, 45-59, and the open group for non-title-winner pro's. There was also "wild card" hocus-pocus that would earn a 7th TV spot. A 230-average player didn't have to bowl against other big average stars in the "open" division. He or she could bowl in an "age" group...taking on lugnuts with 185-averages who thought they might have a chance to win a mil. What genius thought of that?

This ill-conceived, horribly promoted tournament was in the flusher from the outset in my book, which I duly suggested to a couple of folks. Illness halted us from columns, or you would have seen it here, often.

WHY? It was illegal to sanction. The ABC/USBC rules have stated since written by Moses, "in any sanctioned event, 2nd place must be guaranteed at half of 1st place...in this case, \$500.000. The half dozen falling short on TVshould have been declared tied for second and split the loot. I'm dreaming!

Instead, the Kingpin chaps visited the USBC and offered come "special incentives", (a polite term for "bribe" has been suggested by several)...and...viola! The USBC all but wet themselves rushing to throw out the rule as they have been offered a free spot on the telecast to promote the USBC. The USBC also jumped aboard in numerous other ways to suppor the tourney, rumored to be monetary aid, which has been denied by the USBC. I wonder why they have never offered proprietors such help as they've done for these "outsiders"? USBC also chucked the rule stating 1st place can be no more than 40% of the guaranteed prize fund. Add to the immense entry fee, you'd get to spend several days in lovely downtown Reno, you'd have the cost of food, rooms, airline or gasoline expenses, re-entries (about \$200 I'd guess), to say nothing about a few coins in the slots...and you are looking at \$2,500. You'd have 1,950 losers if they got 2,000 entries and paid off properly. Hell, paying off six divisions, 3rd, 4th and 5th will be worth about 5-bucks each. This thing was a dog from the get-go, and bowlers can count and figure out prize return.

San Gabriel Valley News for BOWLERS

by A Concerned Bowler COVINA–On Sunday October 23, 2005 at 10 am, there will be a very special meeting being held at BRC Covina Bowl. I would like my feelings heard along with passing on some information to my fellow bowlers.

I have been involved with bowling for a long time and have gone through a lot of changes and been in different organizations and this is the biggest change that will be taking place. There is going to be good and bad things with these changes. I feel that most of it should be good but we all have to stand up and state what is to happen and who is to run our association.

The secretaries of the leagues know more about the difference with the association officers at this time and have their likes and dislikes from all three associations (BA, Women, & Youth). Now for those that don't know what is happening, lets start with there is no longer a ABC, WIBC or YABA. We are all known as USBC (United States Bowling Congress) as of January 1, 2005 and starting with this winter season your registration card (Sanction Card) will have USBC on it. If the associations are not merged (which at this time ours is not) the card will state BA, WBA or Youth to show which group you are registered with. Also remember all you women bowlers if you registered with the BA and plan on bowling in the CA Women's State, SGV WBA City Tournament or any other women's tournament vou must be registered with the SGVWBA which means you need to pay a transfer of \$ 8.00

or if you registered with the WBA and want to bowl in the BA tournaments you need to pay a transfer of \$ 8.00. I know there is a lot of wrong information out in the bowling centers and that is why I'm writing this letter and hoping that you all show up at the meeting on October 23, 2005. Now onto the explanation of this merger and how it is suppose to happen.

There are 10 steps that the current associations are suppose to do in order for the merger to take place. The way things are happening at this time they are skipping most of them and doing their own thing. I remember that all three organizations had meetings and that the bowlers voted for the merger to happen. Now we are going through this once again. On the transition board there was supposed to be representatives from all three organizations but there was none from the youth side to give their opinion. They are not asking who wants to be on the board or doing a Nominating Committee who will send out for resumes from those interested in being part of the new organization. They have come up with a slate and who the officers are to be and we are to vote on it. This is not how it was supposed to happen. The nominating committee was to go through the resumes and determine who should be recommended for the board and then the bowlers to vote on those names based on the number of members allowed per the by-laws. A proposed bylaws is to be done and present to the bowlers to vote on and then based on those elected on to the board then the officers would be elected at that time then applications are to be accepted for the Association Manager position.

After these two steps are done then the new board would work on programs and services. Each association is to dissolve by doing an audit, deciding how to distribute money (if any) for different things (scholarships, hall of fame, donated to charities, go into new organization, etc.). This is up to the bowlers not the board.

Once this is all done then we move on to the next things getting a new name, Employer Identification Number, filing for Tax-exempt and incorporating.

Then comes the Organizational meeting, which is what they are jumping to as number one, except as with the transition board they have not invited the youth to come in and voice their opinions or set up the Youth Representatives. The final step is applying for USBC Charter.

I feel this will be a good thing for all involved in bowling, but needs to be done correctly or we will end up in the same boat we are now; with a dictatorship rather than the bowlers deciding what they want and how things should be handled.

I encourage all to read up and get all the information you can about how and when this merger in our association should happen and be at the meeting to speak up. A lot of you have complained about how things are going now and about people that are currently running the board, but when it comes to speaking up at meetings you say nothing. Well if you keep quiet nothing will change and I'm afraid for the youth and adult bowlers that we will not have an organization, and awards will not be given and the sport of bowling will be lost in the San Gabriel Valley.

So please join the meeting and have your voice heard. I have contacted National about my concerns and hope that they will send someone out for this meeting just to look out for us bowlers.

If you are interested on being on the new board I would say write up a resume saying why you should be nominated to the board and send it in or bring it with you at the meeting.

lar Challenge had been "postponed until sometime next year." Postponed, baloney! That tournament is now deader than week-old roadkill. Personally, I think the promoters of what was to be an historic tenpin event simply panicked. Their reason for postponing the King-

pin Challenge was pretty flimsy, blaming hurricanes Katrina and Rita for causing bowlers to cancel their entries. How many bowlers from Louisiana and Mississippi did the promoters expect to get. A dozen? Two dozen? By postponing the Kingpin Challenge, originally scheduled to be

held Oct. 22-30 at Reno's National Bowling Stadium, the promoters made the worst mistake possible. Why? Because the Kingpin Challenge has now lost all its credibility.

If the tournament is rescheduled next year, will anyone enter it, for who's to say the promoters won't postpone, or cancel, the Kingpin Challenge again?

Does anyone want to know how Tenpin Slants feels about the postponement? Well, I'm going to tell you anyway. I'm madder than a wet hen. With apologies to David Letterman, here are 10 reasons why I'm so upset:

10) I had made extensive travel plans, and even bought a new wardrobe for the occasion. Those plans had to be changed, but I guess I'm stuck with the wardrobe.

9) I purchased my airline ticket more than two months ago so I could get the best fare possible. The ticket is NONREFUNDABLE.

8) I'm also embarrassed and humiliated. I had written five columns praising the Kingpin Challenge, its promoters and the personnel involved. They included Hall of Famer Dave Husted, commissioner of the Kingpin Challenge; Frank Ellenberg, executive director of the tournament; and Joan Romeo, who was hired as a consultant.

7) In an early column, I had conducted an "unscientific poll," in which I contacted 10 prominent bowling personalties and asked them whether they thought the Kingpin Challenge would get off the ground. I got eight replies, five of whom said no, two were doubtful, and one said maybe.I should have listened to those who were skeptical, for they are the ones who were proven to be right, so far. But I chose to take the opposite point of view, and I listed five reasons why I believed that the tournament would definitely be held. Boy, was I wrong! 6) By being wrong, I lost face. And that makes me even more

upset 5) Not only did I lose face, but I have now lost faith in all future so-called "million dollar" bowling events. The Kingpin Challenge, after all, is just another event in a long line of million dollar tournaments that have never gotten off the ground.

4)By postponing the Kingpin Challenge, the promoters have given the sport of bowling a black eye. And that upsets me.

3) I'm also upset because I've had to explain to several bowling acquaintances why the Kingpin Challenge was postponed, and why postponing it was such a dumb thing to do.

2) I'm especially upset when I think about all the bowlers—particularly those from nine foreign countries-who purchased nonrefundable airline tickets, made hotel reservations, possibly purchased new bowling equipment to use in the tournament, and in some cases had arranged to take time off from work to compete in the Kingpin Challenge.

1)Did I mention "loss of face"?

The Kingpin Million Dollar Challenge is dead...long live the king! I guess that now makes me a skeptic. So be it.

Relatives and friends paid their final respects to Bobbe North on Sept. 25, when Betty Mivelaz-Bobbe's best friend-hosted a memorial at her home in Tujunga, a foothill community just north of Los Angeles.

The memorial was more like a social gathering, but I think that's the way Bobbe would have wanted it. Most of the ladies on hand were either Bobbe's former teammates or had competed against her in the Western Women Professional Bowlers tournaments during the 1960s and '70s.

Some hadn't seen each other in more than 20 years. Therefore, much of the time was spent in getting reacquainted with each other and asking questions like, "What's so-and-so doing now?" Or, "Is so-and-so still alive?

There were many well-known faces there, including three WIBC Hall of Famers. In addition to hostess Betty Mivelaz, the other two were Donna Adamek (Bobbe's prized pupil) and Virginia Norton. Also present were three members of the SoCal Women's Hall of Fame: Joan McRae, Carol (McHaffie) Slater and Connie (Pick) Wannomae.

Memories were relived, and many stories about Bobbe were recalled. Helping to make it easier for everyone to remember the past were two of Bobbe's scrapbooks and several photographs, most of them being old team pictures.

And I found out that Bobbe's maiden name really was Ong, for among those who survived her were a sister-in-law, Mary Ong, and a niece, Cathy Ong, both of Pomona.

You should have been at the memorial as Betty and her daughter, Sue Mivelaz, had prepared enough food and drinks to feed an army. FINAL ITEM: WIBC Hall of Famer Robin Romeo, who retired

from the PWBA Tour after winning 17 national titles, including two majors, still hasn't lost her skill with a bowling ball. Robin proved it by firing an 802 series recently in the Mission Majors at Mission Hills Bowl. It was Robin's ninth 800 series in a distinguished career that is still far from over... And SoCal Hall of Famer Larry Gray-once dubbed "Lawrence of Torrance" by a witty pin scribe-rolled a 300 game in league at Palos Verdes Bowl. What made the 300 so special was that it was Larry's 50th sanctioned perfecto
