## PWBA ATHIETES FIND SUCEESS AT 2021 IBF WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

ARLINGTON Texas sion. They were joined on The Professional Wom- the lanes by 2016 PWBA en's Bowling Association was well-represented last month at the International Bowling Federation World Championships, with several members and past champions claiming medals while representing their countries in Dubai, United Arab Emirates.

The event featured the IBF Super World Championships, inaugural IBF Para Bowling World Championships and IBF Masters (formerly Senior) World Championships taking place at the Dubai International Bowling Centre from Nov. 6-26.

At the Super World Championships, medals were presented in singles, doubles, trios, mixed team and team competition, with the most valuable players and most valuable federations also being recognized in the women's and men's divisions.

Shayna Ng and Cherie Tan won three medals each at the IBF Super World ChampionshipsTwo-time PWBA Tour champions Shayna Ng and Cherie Tan each collected three medals while in Dubai and helped Singapore earn the Most Valuable Federation award in the women's divi-

Rookie of the Year New Hui Fen and Iliya Syamim. Ng kicked off the 2021 Super World Championships by winning gold in singles competition, defeating Tan in the best-oftwo title match in a roll-off, 2-1, to capture her second career gold medal at the World Championships.

Ng and Tan went on to capture bronze medals in trios with New and Syamim and mixed team with Ray Han Cheah and Darren Ong.

PWBA major champions Kelly Kulick and Missy Parkin teamed to win two medals for Team USA and shared Most Valuable Player honors in the women's division.

Kulick and Parkin joined fellow PWBA Tour champions Danielle McEwan and Jordan Richard to win team gold at the Su per World Championships, marking the first win for the United States in team competition on the women's side since 2015

Kulick and Parkin also teamed with Professional Bowlers Association Tour stars Jakob Butturff and Kristopher Prather to earn a silver medal in the new continued on page 7

# Does Anybody Really Know When No-Tap Bowling Started?

A couple of bowling publishers recently asked me if I might have any information on the origins of no-tap bowling, a unique form of kegling that rewards a strike when a nine count is rolled on the first shot of any frame. I had never really given it much thought, because for me, no-tap bowling was always there.

In fact, my very first trophy was in a Christmas No-Tap Doubles Tournament with partner Monte Schulz, the eldest son of Charles M. Schulz, the creator of the Peanuts comic strip. The year was 1961, and L \& L Lanes in Sebastopol had just opened. It was operated by a couple of loggers, Louie and Lonnie Headrick, who had decided that bowling might be an easier way to make a living. While I was researching online to try and find information about the origins of no-tap bowling, the lyrics to a famous 1960's song by the pop rock group Chicago kept "popping" up in the search results, and provided some interesting correlations:

Does anybody really know (what no-tap bowling is) Does anybody really care (when no-tap bowling started) If so, I can't imagine why (because it's so much fun) We've all got time enough to (try no-tap bowling)

As a youth I remember when the California Bowling News would arrive at L \& L Lanes on Friday afternoon. It was filled with all kinds of tournament activity, including many no-tap events. In my estimation, it would be safe to say that if no-tap bowling did not originate in Southern California, it certainly became an art form in Tinseltown, with the most imaginative and creative forms of tournaments and leagues.

I once again called upon my new friend Bud Horn, who grew up in Los Angeles, and at the age of 84 is probably the best source to ask when no-tap bowling started. "I remember bowling in no-tap tournaments while still in grade school," said Horn. "That would have been in 1949 or 1950 at the Rancho Bowl, an eleven lane bowling center on Pico Boulevard in West Los Angeles."

My personal memories of no-tap tournaments piqued when I discovered the Hot Pot No-Tap, a fabulous tournament run by bowling promoter Nick Mancini at the 60-lane Grand Central Bowl in Glendale, a suburb of Los Angeles. I have written about my experiences at Grand Central many times. It was the perfect way to spend a Saturday evening whenever my duties while working for AMF would allow. Everything about Grand Central Bowl was fun, from the difficult lane conditions (that made the no-tap format enjoyable), to the "easy money" that could be had by a No-Tap 300 Insurance option. For an additional $\$ 5$, each competitor was guaranteed a $\$ 100$ payoff for every no-tap 300 game rolled during the five game event.

A special article that I wrote for the California Bowling News in 2017 summed it all up nicely: "After a couple of weeks, I realized that the Hot Pot side pots were really what this tournament was all about for a scratch bowler. The culmination of my understanding was one eventful night when I rolled four consecutive no-tap 300's, and in the fifth game I had the first eleven 'real' strikes before leaving the 6-10 on my last roll.

Within another couple of weeks, a lot of local pros, having read about the 300's, began to show up for the event. Mancini used this as an opportunity to run multiple squads and entries. Top notch players of the day including Fred Conner, Butch Soper, Jack Andolina, Hobo Booth and Phil Kapsimallis, to name a few, would join me in what began to look like a pro regional event.

Each week after the last squad, a group of us would head over to Bob's Big Boy on West Riverside Drive in Burbank for a late-night snack. It became the tradition for the night's big winner to spring for the check. Those were happy times... great memories."

I took the Hot Pot idea with me as I began to travel to different parts of the country for AMF. It was not always successful, as it took a particular type of manager with a preponderance of local scratch bowlers. One of the centers that excelled with the concept was AMF Forest Lanes in Lyons, III., which is still operated by the Bowlero Corporation today. Manager Bob Liquori would often write to share his phenomenal turnouts, which ranged from 200 to as many 600 entries on any given weekend. He ran a total of 5 squads, two on Saturday (Noon and 2PM) and three on Sunday (Noon, 2PM and 4PM). Liquori would go on to host America's toughest bowling tournament, the Petersen Classic, at AMF Hoffman Lanes in nearby Hoffman Estates, III., from 1994 until 2014, when the center closed. (The Petersen Classic continues to this day and is currently being held at Bowlero Wauwatosa in Wisconsin).

## Junior BRYAN BAKER Bowls 300/800 Sets Empire Bowl Record <br> by Frank Weiler

REDLANDS - At the age of 13 Bryan Baker has been Bowling for over a decade. Yes, he started bowling two handed at the tender age of 2 years! He may be the youngest bowler ever and he hasn't stopped knocking down pins since his "BOWLING GENESIS". Yes, Bowling Genesis, his start as a bowler. Every bowler has a Genesis along with a "BOWLING ENLIGHTENMENT". A bowler's enlightenment occurs when he or she learn to become a proficient bowler.

Bryan began bowling at Fontana Foothill Lanes (now Bowlero Fontana) because his father, STONEY BAKER, bowled in league there. Hey, "ACORNS AND NUTS NEVER DROP FAR FROM THE TREE". With his dad being a great


Bryan Baker bowler, regularly averaging 220 with multiple 300 games, you would expect Bryan to be the same and he is. A great bowler.

While a few junior bowlers have rolled perfect 300 games at Empire Bowl, Bryan is believed to be the first to roll a 800 series. His 800 (300-279-221) is believed to be the record high series for an Empire Bowl junior kegler. Bryan used a Storm Dark Code to roll his honor scores. It's his favorite bowling ball because it's smooth roll and rotation has resulted in his highest scores. Quoting Bryan "that ball always comes back hard when you roll it correctly".

Bryan's secret to rolling strings of strikes is to focus on one shot at a time. Focus on each shot as if it is the first frame of the game. Also, don't dwell on the possibility of a high score, instead distract your mind with other thoughts between those championship frames.

How does a young bowler like Bryan Baker possess wisdom beyond his years? Bryan speaking of focus, mind control and mental distraction is amazing when you know that he is only thirteen years old. I think the sport of BOWLING is responsible for such early maturity. Competitive bowling teaches a variety of "survival skills" such as mental concentration, mental acuity and the recognition for mental and physical adjustments.

Bryan's favorite professional bowler is OSKU PALERMA because he helped revolutionize the sport of Bowling by being one of the first professionals to introduce the two-handed style to the world. Palerma is probably the greatest bowler ever to come from Finland. He shocked the Bowling World when he made the television stepladder finals at the 2002 U.S. OPEN and just missed winning the title, losing to WALTER RAY WILLIAMS JR. by just a few pins.

Bryan, like his dad, loves our sport because of the comradeship existing among bowlers. He loves being around other bowlers. Bowlers are the best people in the world and they're fun to be around. Also, the electric atmosphere surrounding tournament competition gives a bowler that "BUZZ" sometimes referred to as "BOWLERS HIGH". It is a sensation experienced in very few other activities. Bryan is learning to love that "BUZZ".

Bryan has been a proud member of the THE NATIONAL BOWLING ASSOCIATION (TNBA) for four years now. He loves volunteering at the TNBA Inland Empire Senate Junior Program. He enjoys helping other junior bowlers improve their bowling game. His participation as a "junior coach" demonstrates that Bryan appreciates what his Bowling mentors and the sport of Bowling have given him and his willingness to give to others. Outstanding work Bryan. Unlike yourself, many adults have not learned that "HAPPINESS IS ROOTED IN GIVING".

If Bryan doesn't succeed as a professional bowler he would like to be an astrophysicist or a politician. A fellow named WERNER VON BRAUN of NASA fame would be impressed. Besides setting Bowling records Bryan has also scored the second highest Mathematics score at Martin Luther King Junior Middle School's MWEA growth assessment program. Again, outstanding work Bryan. Unlike many adults, you are aware that "LIFE'S DREAMS DON'T ALWAYS COME TRUE". You already recognize that your dream to become a professional bowler may not materialize. Your success as a mathematics student show that you are preparing for life after Bowling and life as an astrophysicist or politician.

Bryan is GRATEFUL to his EMPIRE BOWL and TNBA coaches ART GUZMAN, TERRY LANKSTER and MIKE RADDEMAN for making him a better bowler. He is especially grateful to his father Stoney for being his number one coach and mentor. Stoney has spent numerous hours coaching his son. Bryan realizes that his success is the product of hard work both by himself and his coaches. Outstanding Bryan. At a young age you are aware that "SUCCESS IS THE PRODUCT OF HARD WORK" and that "WE ALL STAND ON THE SHOULDERS OF OUR PREDECESSORS AND MENTORS". Many adults never learn these life lessons with sometimes tragic results.

strikes, including an 859 series in 2018 and 879 in 2020.
His 879 also started with back-to-back 300 games, before a 4 pin early in Game 3 ended his streak. He leaned on what he learned in that experience as he approached his final few frames.
"I got to the fourth frame, I believe, before the ball checked up a little and I left a 4 pin," Schmitt said. "I think that experience helped me Tuesday night, too. Once I got past the fourth frame of the third game, I thought maybe I do have a chance at this."

As he got to the 10th frame of Game 3, a Facebook Live video from the Anchor Lanes account turned its attention to lanes 11 and 12, as Schmitt looked to roll three more strikes.

His second shot in the 10th was left of target but was able to hold line to the pocket, but his final shot left little doubt, earning him a spot in the USBC record book.
"I don't really think there's a way to prepare your mind for going up for a chance at 900 ," said Schmitt, who had 22 USBC-approved 300 s and 18800 s prior to his 900 series. "I just focused on having good mechanics and throwing the shots I needed to make. The second ball in the 10th definitely was not my best pitch. I missed inside, but I had that miss room. When you shoot a big series, there has to be some amount of luck that goes into throwing it. I got the lucky breaks, and the pins were going the right way for me."

Schmitt became the fourth bowler to roll 900 in Wisconsin, joining Tony Roventini (1999), Mark Wukoman (2006) and PJ Giesfeldt (2007).

He needed every pin to set the house record at Anchor Lanes, as well. John Reiss rolled 899 on the same pair of lanes in January 2000.

Through social media, Schmitt has received countless well wishes and congratulations for the achievement, highlighted by six-time Professional Bowlers Association Player of the Year Jason Belmonte and PBA Tour commissioner Tom Clark.
"It has been extremely overwhelming," Schmitt said. "So many people have reached out to wish me congratulations, and I'm the kind of person that wants to thank every single person. Even if I don't get to everybody, I really do appreciate all the well wishes. It's something that's really humbling and cool."

While his hot streak continued with an 853 series (289-287-277) just two days after his 900 set, Schmitt is most appreciative of the individuals he was able to share the moment with at Anchor Lanes, including his parents, Dan and Linda.
"It certainly is special to do this at your home center in front of everybody you grew up with," Schmitt said. "My dad was the one filming the Facebook Live video, and my mom was there working. It's cool to have your family there for sure. One of the first things I did was hug my dad. There's not a lot of people that get to do that with their family present, and it's something that's really special for me."

The first USBC-approved 900 occurred Feb. 2, 1997, when Jeremy Sonnenfeld rolled three consecutive perfect games in Lincoln, Nebraska.

Blair, 18, put together games of 300,267 and 257 for an 824 set on March 28,2021 , during the Spring 21 Youth/ Adult Scholarship Travel league at Bowl 10 in Fairborn, Ohio.
