WOODLAND HILLS – What would bowling be like without its colorful language?

It just wouldn't be the same.

One of bowling's Hallof-Fame terms is "grandma's teeth," and one can just visualize why it's so aptly named.

This label denotes the 4-6-7-10 split or any of the "big five" split combinations because it looks like a mouth with missing teeth. Veteran bowlers see the strike ball crash into the pins with this sorry result and laugh and cry out "Grandma's teeth!"

Still, "grandma's teeth" is less known than the ubiquitous "field goal," which is a ball rolled between two pins of a wide split. "Field goals" pop up regularly in league play but, alas, three points are not awarded for the miss

There are actually dozens of fun bowling terms and they trigger the consciousness of experienced bowlers virtually every night.

Some of bowlers' fa-

imaginative language by reporting that Justin Anderson "smashed" a 299 game and Scott LaLuzerne "blasted" a 299. Even though Aaron Shepit didn't get as close to a perfect game, he still got credit for "blasting" a 278.

Carol Kroll was far down the food chain but she still "fired" a 212 game, according to greenbaygazette. com

Poor Tracy May. Tracv outscored Carol Kroll by more than 20 pins, but did no better than "rolling" a 235.

If bowlers bowl high games, then they should be rewarded and it's appropriate to say they "blasted" or "smoked" or "blistered," or "crushed," or "scorched" their way to the top.

So how do 300 bowlers like their games to be described when they "shoot" (very basic term this time) a perfect game. That was the question posed to Alfonso Alvarez, one of the L.A.area bowling aces who bowled a 300 five years ago at AMF Woodlake Lanes in Woodland Hills. Did Alfonso "blast" his perfect game or "crush" it or "blister" it?

Alfonso, ever the individualist, said none of those highfalutin terms fit his perfect game.

"It was just the opposite," he said. "I just tried to stay focused and calm and collected. I don't have any exciting terms for you.

"It was more like a zen-

PBA Rookie Cameron Weier Wins First PBA Tour Title in Qatar Open

DOHA, Qatar - Professional Bowlers Association rookie Cameron Weier of Tacoma, Wash., won his first PBA Tour title Wednesday when he defeated Sean Rash of Montgomery, Ill., 453-431, in the two-game title match of the 15th PBA-World Bowling Tour Qatar Open at Qatar Bowling Center.

Weier, a former Robert Morris-Illinois University star. took a 218-197 lead over Rash after their first game and locked up the \$40,000 first prize with a 235-234 margin of victory in the second game.

Weier advanced to the championship match by eliminating former Robert Morris teammate Marshall Kent of Yakima, Wash.,



542-516, in the semifinal round while Rash held off Denmark's Thomas Larsen, 481-467, in the other semifinal match.

In the semifinal round, Kent threw back-to-back 258 games at Weier, but Weier answered with games of 264 and 278 to win their

PBA Tour title winner, took a 57-pin lead with a 267-210 performance in the first game, and outlasted Larsen, who rallied in the second game, 257-214.

Diandra Asbaty: A Fierce Advocate of the Sport

So the Professional Women's Bowling Assn. tour is in the books for 2015 after a hiatus of nearly a dozen years.

And what better person than Diandra Asbaty to reveal what life on the lanes was like during the PWBA's eight regular-season events, three nationally televised majors and stops from coast to coast.

Asbaty is a no-holds-barred, tell-it-like-it-is bowling ambassador who's served as a sideline reporter and commentator for ESPN.

She's also an award-winning writer who knows how to turn insights into words – and she does that in her website blogs and as a senior writer for Bowlers Journal magazine.

The 35-year-old Asbaty also happens to be an elite woman bowler who rose to fame when she won the 2012 United States Bowling Congress Queens tournament title and the \$20,000 first-place prize.

Talking about the 2015 PWBA tour in a first-person story in Bowlers Journal, Asbaty made these observations:

On the crowds the PWBA events triggered because of all the bowlers and spectators: "Many days during qualifying, I couldn't move through the bowling counter because there were so many inside watching (If you were one of those people, thank you!) The bowling proprietors really took care of us. They were just as excited to have the tour at their facilities as we were to be there, and they didn't hesitate to show us. At almost every stop, the proprietor had meals provided for us between blocks Each host also threw us a welcome party that included dinner and a gift bag. These may seem like little things but they were huge things to the players."

On the difficulty of balancing bowling with her personal life: "For me, it involved balancing not only my bowling life, but also the lives of my kids and family. Trying to figure out who was going to watch which child, how they were going to get home from school Thursday and Friday, and making sure there was food in the refrigerator when I was gone were all part of the balancing act."

On what it was like to be part of an "exclusive" PWBA group: "We formed a bond. One that will never be broken. One that hopefully will lead to bigger and better events, stories and experiences."

Asbaty, a resident of Chicago, is a fierce advocate of the game, but she does have a light side. She also refuses to let slights to the game go without a response.

A few years back, she fired back after hearing about an L.A. Times sports column that had a demeaning reference to bowling.

Responded Asbaty: "I've been practicing since I was 5 years old and I've been playing tournaments. I sweat. I throw a 15-pound ball. I fail and I win. I want bowling to get the respect it deserves."

To that end, Asbaty leaves no stone unturned in trying to promote the sport.

Asked after winning the 2012 Queens tournament what her bowling goals were, Asbaty said, "I really would like to be remembered for what I offered bowling. My goal isn't to be known as the best bowler of all time.

"I'd rather be remembered as someone who did a lot for bowling – and that's more important than any award.

Will Bowling Ever Be An Olympic Sport?

What I write may be controversial and even offensive to some. I make no apologies and only ask that you hear me out.

I am a bowler. I love bowling. I have bowled my entire life and currently bowl in three leagues. I watch every bowling television show on the airwaves and have been in the bleachers at several international tournaments and dozens of PBA tournaments. I write from the perspective of an experienced fan with no ax to grind and wanting the best for bowling.

The best thing that could ever happen to bowling is becoming an Olympic sport. It would be good for bowling's image, good for business, good for participation, good for USBC membership and good for growth and youth appeal. That is why the September 28 announcement by the **Tokyo Olympic Committee (TOC)**, that bowling would not be included in the 2020 Olympic Games, was so disappointing. It truly was one of the saddest days in bowling history. Sad because bowlers know our sport belongs in the Olympics.

Bowling is a "real" sport that requires a great deal of skill when competed on a sport condition. Bowling should be an Olympic sport, especially when compared to sport climbing and roller sports. Bowling is older than these sports, has been organized longer, is better organized, is competed in more countries by more participants and yet they are in and we are out. What gives?

The \$64,000 question is: Will bowling ever be an Olympic sport? **MAYBE**. Hey, miracles happen. While the deck is stacked against us and the road to redemption would be difficult, there is a little light at the end of the tunnel.

In the past I always thought bowling was not selected as an Olympic sport because the system was corrupt and rigged. That unless an applicant sport was willing to pay millions in "payola" money there was no chance of selection. We will never know if my suspicions are true but with the recent FIFA scandals you have to wonder.

Then this year I began to think my suspicions were either unfounded or things had changed. It appeared that the 2020 selection process would be transparent and bowling had a great chance. In our favor was the fact that the 2020 Olympic Games would be held in a bowling friendly venue (Japan) with recommendations and decisions being made by bowling friendly officials. We still weren't selected. So what went wrong?

From everything I have read about the recent TOC decision bowling was not selected because of several shortcomings. One of these was our sport's **IMAGE**. We are told that bowling is still perceived as a recreational pursuit, a fun night out, a party game played by fun seekers. Can we overcome our reputation and create a new image?

While the PBA and PWBA bowlers do a great job demonstrating the difficulty of competitive bowling this demonstration of skill is not apparent to the casual observer and non-bowler. As a result I am skeptical of our ability to overcome our current image.

Next we were told bowling lacked **FAN APPEAL**. Bowling does not generate sufficient television ratings or bleacher numbers to raise eyebrows. I'm sure this fact didn't escape the TOC's attention. They know that higher ratings equal greater television revenue. Unfortunately bowling doesn't provide the excitement todays sports fan craves.

Today fan appeal is generated by risk, danger and violence. The big tackle, the big punch and the big scrum are todays favorites. There is nothing physically risky, dangerous or violent about bowling. Bowling doesn't provide any helmet to helmet, any punching, any kicking, any knockouts or blood and guts. I repeat, bowling doesn't have the animal magnetism todays fan craves.

Then we are told bowling lacks **YOUTH APPEAL**. While bowling probably has more youth participants and better organized youth programs (leagues, tournaments and clinics) than some of the sports selected for the 2020 Games, it wasn't enough. I don't think the TOC was looking at these bowling advantages. I believe the TOC was again looking at the risk, danger and excitement generated by our sport compared to that generated by such sports as sport climbing and roller sports. Let's face it, they beat us when it comes to physical contact and shock value.

Is there any hope for bowling in the future? **WILL BOWLING EVER BE AN OLYMPIC SPORT? MAYBE.** While bowling is losing today, because of **WOW VALUE**, seasons change. Spring follows winter. Bowling may be in winter hibernation now but watch out. Look at Curling. Curling has been selected as an Olympic winter sport while having the same drawbacks as bowling.

So how do we comeback? First, we need a strong leader and luckily we have one. Our secret weapon and best hope is **KEVIN DORNBERGER**. There has never been a better ambassador for bowling. Not only is he a positive force for change, he has superior people skills and is a willing negotiator. He is a tireless worker who has earned the respect of

the international bowling and sporting communities.

Second, if we are to overcome our **IMAGE** and **APPEAL** shortcomings we will have to develop a worldwide plan that includes contributions from every bowling national governing body on earth. This plan will have to address bowling's image and appeal. This plan will have to be Dornberger's first order of business.

In my opinion the key part of any comeback plan to resuscitate bowling's image and appeal will have to involve the media. I don't mean just the bowling media. Bowling will have to catch the attention of our national sports media and then the world sports media.

Bowling will have to find it's way on to the sports pages of city newspapers, not just bowling papers. Bowling will need to leap from our regional bowling papers to USA Today. Bowling will need to be written about in Sports Illustrated and discussed on ESPN. We will have to see our ESPY winner presented his or her award on live television not just listed in the show credits.

To get this done Dornberger will need substantial support from BPAA, USBC, IBMA, World Bowling, other national governing bodies and every industry product manufacturer.

Bowling's road to prominence will be long and difficult. Any chance for success will depend on our leader's will and commitment. I do not have the resources to formulate a complete comeback plan but I will suggest a first step. I believe the above organizations must raise enough money to fund a professional media and public relations staff for Mr. Dornberger. The sole purpose of this staff would be to publicize bowling at the national and international level. I believe the only hope for bowling being noticed by our national media and then by the world sports media is a media/ public relations team tooting it's horn. If we don't tell bowling's story no one else will.

BOWLING NEEDS TO GET IT'S STORY OUT THERE. If we do, MAYBE someday bowling will be an Olympic sport.

World Cup Champions Not Deterred by Physical Ailments By Jim Goodwin exclusive for the Bowling News Network

Guererro on top of her game despite health issue

"It's incredible; it feels like a dream," said World Cup Champ Clara Guerrero after successfully defending her title. She was representing her native Columbia in the 51^{st} QubicaAMF World Cup. "Just to win one is amazing. You work so hard for so many years to win titles like these; so doing it back-to-back is just a dream. I don't have words... its like I haven't arrived there yet – it is just amazing!"

The win was even more impressive when we factor in that only two bowlers had ever won back-to-back titles in the 50 year history of the event, Jeanette Baker of Australia ('82-'83) and Aumi Guerra of the Dominican Republic ('10-'11). Guererro's opponent in the final match, Team USA's Shannon Pluhowsky, is also a two-time champion. She won the event in 2002 and 2004, and she seemed to have the momentum going into the final match.

"Shannon is an amazing player, and I respect her very much. I had some physical issues in the final match and I was just focused on one shot at a time, so I never felt like I was in control or that I could relax. I knew when we started that it would take everything I had, so I stuck to my plan and never let up until it was over," said Guererro.

Another factor in the victory may have been Guererro's year of bowling against very tough competition on the new Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour.

"The tour helped me a lot," she said. "I had a good tour, but my best finish was 4th. I struggled with a leg injury, and I am still getting treatment. I've had to make some physical adjustments, but the tour gave me a lot of tournament experience and kept me mentally focused."

Guererro, who now makes her home in Texas, shared that she has had an inflammation in her hip for months, and the pain has affected her entire upper leg.

"Last week I bowled in the Columbia National Games, so I arrived here a little tired and with my leg hurting. I plan to take some time off and get some treatment and rest after the World Championships in Abu Dhabi and the World Series of Bowling in Vegas; and then in January I have a couple of other events, but by the end of January or February I should be able to give it a rest."

Will she return to the PWBA Tour and the World Cup next year?

"I will definitely be on the 2016 PWBA Tour and the idea is to arrive in top physical shape this time; and I am really looking forward to next year in this event."

With health issues behind him, Wu was ready to win

Hong Kong's Wu Siu Hong won his first QubicaAMF World Cup title after winning a much more serious battle. In March of 2014, the 31-year old Team Hong Kong star was diagnosed with testicular cancer. He underwent surgery and chemotherapy immediately after the diagnosis, and was away from bowling for three months.

"Even though my doctor told me it was curable, I didn't want to tell my team as I didn't want anybody to worry about me," Wu said last year in an interview following the Asian Games.

Wu's primary coaches have been Team Hong Kong Head Coach Bill Hoffman and assistants Mike Seymour and Del Ballard Jr. Seymour and Ballard made the trip to Vegas.

"An amazing story after Hong beat cancer last year," said Seymour. It was a sensational performance by him. He was solid all week. A couple of glitches on the first day saw him in 12th place after that round, however he wasn't too far from the top 8. Our goal was to be in the top 8 or close to it after the 24 qualifying games. After the first day Hong seemed to be more focused and he never looked back. It was an outstanding performance."

The only thing I really want to add is that he is a very good bowler," said Ballard. "He has gone through a lot in the last couple of years to accomplish such a goal. He has the talent to bowl on tour and wish he could. It was an absolute pleasure to work with him."

"For sure I could not have done this without them. I also want to thank Storm for everything they have done for me," said Wu.

World Cup Runneth Over

Cross another major event off of the Goodwin bowling bucket list.

CJ and I had the privilege of attending the 51st Annual QubicaAMF World Cup Tournament in November. The event was held at Sam's Town in Las Vegas.

This prestigious event has only been held in the United States twice before; in New York City in 1981 and in Las Vegas, also at Sam's Town, in 1999. This year, players from 88 nations took part, and by all accounts, the event was another huge success. Congratulations to Champions Clara Guerrero, who became only the third person to successfully defend a World Cup title, and to Siu Hong Wu from Hong Kong, who was coached by a very familiar face, Del Ballard Jr.

What is so amazing about this tournament is that bowlers from around the world continue to come together in the spirit of friendly competition regardless of what is happening elsewhere in the world of sports, politics, or international security.

On the eve of this particular event, Radical Islamic Terrorists connected to the ISIS group carried out an attack in Paris. The aftermath consumed the 24 hour news channels throughout the event; but the bowlers carried on. We were told that this was not the first time that troubles in the world have provided a backdrop for the competition.

It must have been a very tough week for the two French bowlers, Mike Bartaire and Amandine Jacques. Their minds may have been on bowling, but their hearts were breaking for their homeland. To their credit, they both did well, finishing 24th and 13th.

We did not have the opportunity to speak with them, but did get to talk with our friend Bernard Mora. Bernard is a bowling journalist in France who has covered more World Cup events than anyone. He thought this was his 42nd. The only other writer who comes close is former Bowlers Journal owner Mort Luby Jr., who said he thought this was his 37th or 38th.

Mora said the Paris attacks happened just five hours after he departed for the USA. His was one of the last flights out of the country before all transportation was shut down as authorities searched for the terrorists.

We have been to Las Vegas so many times that we can easily drive around the city without getting lost. Our first trip was in 1979 shortly after Sam's Town opened, bringing a major bowling venue to the south end of Boulder Highway, just a few miles south of the famous Showboat Hotel and Casino, the place that hosted bowling events from the early days of the PBA until it became the Castaways and closed its doors for good in 2004. In the early years, Showboat hosted most of the professional events, and we attended several PBA and other events there, and made many friends. In the 80's and 90's, Sam's Town became a home base for the LPBT and PWBA, and we enjoyed all of their events until the PWBA stopped in 2003.

We first got involved in megabuck style bowling at Sam's Town when they partnered with LPBT to host the International Eliminator Tournament. The Mini Eliminator became a spin off of that event, and was held there a few years before moving to The Orleans.

Getting back to the World Cup, we were struck by several things. Being there for the first time, we felt a little like fish out of water, but most of the officials were very friendly, and we enjoyed seeing many dear friends who were also enjoying the event; people like Bob Johnson, who now lives in Vegas, Our friends Herbert Bickel from Germany and world class photo journalist Hero Noda from Japan, former AMF executive and now top coach Dale Neimela, Wes Pye and Dave Symes from Storm, Mike Kaufman, Bill Supper, who is doing well after heart surgery, and many more, including the lovely Jeanette Robinson and her amazing husband Dick. We even had a chance to stop at South Point before leaving to chat with our buddy Mike Monyak.

No trip to Vegas is complete without time spent with Jeanette and Dick. They are two treasures that we consider part of our family, and every moment we spend with them is our privilege and honor, and this time was no exception. We also enjoyed hearing Jeanette reminisce with Mort Luby and Paul Lane about her days as a member of the AMF Pro Staff.

Lane is another very interesting man. He shared that he had managed the World Cup for several years during his time working for AMF, and that he cherished being able to return to see what a success the event has become. I especially enjoyed swapping a few Dick Weber stories with Lane. I am one of the lucky people who knew and loved Weber and got to spend a little time with him over the years, but Lane spent years traveling the world with him and knew him as well as anyone.

Tournament Manager Anne Marie Board and her staff seemed very organized, but it was difficult getting much info on any of the players. One saving grace was that our great friend from Dallas, Cliff Adair, has been associated with AMF and the event for many years, and he provided some insight; but we did not want to bug him too much because he was very busy. We were also surprised that the event got little if any attention from the local media.

QubicaAMF Chairman Pat Ciniello was kind enough to invite us to the closing banquet, but we ended up sitting at a table with a group that spoke very little English, so it was a bit awkward; but we did enjoy the food, the award presentations, and the big announcement that next year's World Cup will be held in Shanghai, China. The dragon dance was an interesting way to present the announcement even if it did spoil the mystery of it.

Altogether, our World Cup week was a very interesting experience. It is not likely that we will be traveling to China next year or to any other far off future venues, but it was time well spent, and we salute everyone who has made this event one of bowling's crown jewels.

Simmons' lack of recognition of that day showed how far out of his memory he had put his heart attack – and how quickly he had recovered from it.

Simmons' response was that of a typical bowler with a powerful resilience, which is perhaps unlike athletes from any other sport.

Bowlers just shrug and move on.

That was the case with Simmons after his scary ordeal that took place on a date that he has termed "12-12-12" – now exactly three years ago.

Here's the background of Simmons' heart attack:

Simmons, then 66, thought something might be wrong while he was exercising at his health club.

"That's when I felt my jaw tightening and pressure in my chest. There was no pain," he said weeks later.

Simmons, with his girlfriend, left for Costco and he took five baby aspirin to limit the heart damage.

Then at Henry Mayo Hospital in Valencia, he was told he had a heart attack. "One of my arteries was 90% blocked," Simmons said. "A piece of plaque may have broken off and blocked the artery."

After undergoing an angioplasty in which he received

a stent, he was amazingly back on the lanes three weeks later with his customary marksmanship.

He returned to his league at Simi Valley Brunswick Zone and blasted a scorching 645 series – far above his 175 average. A week later, he competed in his league at AMF Woodlake Lanes in Woodland Hills and rolled a series of 156, 203 and 162.

Last year he averaged a sterling 181 in his Comedians league at Winnetka Bowl.

"I'm feeling good," Simmons says.

Jerry Simmons has definitely rolled with the punches.

Los Altos Trophy will bowl Linder's next week, after taking four out of five from DV8. This one was a much closer match than 4-1 would indicate, with only 45 pins separating them in totals. The 4-1 result however keeps Los Altos in contention for the round and has DV8 thinking about round #3. Lee Liu led the pair, in spite of having only 320 turning the corner. Lee shot 248 the last game to finish with 568.

First round winners, The Professional Approach, added five wins to their season total as they charge toward the #1 overall seed at the end of the season. Their victims this week were the J.A.T. squad. Ramiro Garcia bowled fantastic, with 209-201-255/665 for the Pro Approach. Billy Myers Jr. started slowly but finished with 219-212/590. DeeRonn Booker paced J.A.T. with a 638 one week after winning the clean 30 pot, but his team never got closer than 60 pins to a win.

Alhambra Coin Center took four out of five from Relax-Release-Repeat behind the strong bowling of T.J. Abahazy and Doug Kempt. T.J. shot an even 600 and Doug had 604. Substitute Mike Mellick led R-R-R with 228 and 605. Two of the three games were within two marks, but a big second game for Alhambra opened up their lead and they cruised home for totals.

Wowo's Smokin' Hot BBQ took the first game of the night from Pino's Pizza by 78 pins. Then they got ran over the next two to lose four games. Chris Equilos led the way those last two games with 223 and 205, after a shaky start. Both of these teams are looking forward to a fresh start in the next round.

Cook's Bowling Supply continued to ride the hot hand of Jonathan Huff as he keeps making this round look easier than it is. Jonathan shot 258-232-205/695. The other three players averaged 465, but with Jonathan striking all night, they cruised to four wins over the Threadworks squad.

Sysco took all five games from Herzog Insurance. Scoring was low on the pair, as Gabriel Martinez led the way (by quite a bit) with 575. An interesting side note, with Sysco winning five and J.A.T. losing five, it evens up those two teams once again. With every week being position round, the possibility is there to bowl a team more often. Next week J.A.T. will bowl Sysco...again. It'll be the sixth matchup between the two teams in 14 weeks.

The final pair of lanes saw GJC Janitorial win all five from the Cremation Centers of CA in a battle of two teams looking to hit the reset button for this round and move on to the next one.

As mentioned earlier, Jonathan Huff stayed hot, and it won him the first and second sidepots (258-232). The third game super pot went to Lee Liu with his 248 for \$216.

The Financial Advisors pot was won by DeeRonn Booker. DeeRonn shot 247 for \$220. Huff got 2nd place for \$100. The round ends next week.

Come down and see four teams battle for the second spot in this year's playoffs.

Meanwhile, the rest of us are happy to see this one end and start the long oil round the week after.
